Mayor Diamond Flynn will talk about the city manager plan. The Rev. Thomas McCamant will discuss the measure concerning establishment of a mental hospital in or near Portland. The Rev. Mr. McCamant served on the mental health committee of the City club, Portland, before coming to Medford and is familiar with the backgrounds of this subject.

J. E. Jorgensen will present both sides of the measure to repeal the milk control law. All other measures will also be presented, those in charge state.

Eight of America's Oldest Homes Opened for Public

Richmond, Va.—(U.P.)—Eight of the oldest and most famous homes in America have been opened to the public.

These plantation homes along the James river include the homes of three presidents, the longest house in the nation, the second oldest house on the eastern seaboard, and the home of the mother of Gen. Robert E. Lee.

Oldest of the eight homes on display is Upper Wyanoke, built around 1650. It is the only remaining one of eight brick forts built along the James to protect early settlers from the Indians.

Never Open To Public—Upper Wyanoke is now opened by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bahnsen of New York and has never before been open to the public. Berkeley plantation, first settled in 1619, is said to have the oldest three-story brick house in Virginia. It is the ancestral home of a signer of the Declaration of Independence and two presidents—William Henry Harrison and his grandson, Benjamin Harrison.

The house itself dates back to 1726. In 1862 it was the Civil War headquarters of Gen. George B. McClellan, Union Commander, and it was here during that period that the famous bugle call "Taps" was composed.

Berkeley also was the site of the first American Thanksgiving observed according to Church of England services.

Sherwood Forest was the home of another president, John Tyler. Built in 1780, the house is 300 feet long and only one room deep. It is believed the longest dwelling in America.

Three-Story Stairway—Gen. Robert E. Lee's mother lived at Shirley, a mansion built in 1770 on a land grant originally settled in 1613. Shirley's outstanding feature is a three-story stairway with no visible support. The home also contains the finest collection of original portraits, silver, china and furniture of any old home in the country.

Money raised from the public tour will go to restore Westover Parish Church, built by members of the first band of permanent English colonists who landed with John Smith at Jamestown.

The deceased was born May 11, 1902, in La Grande, Ore., and was a veteran of World War II, serving as a private in the Air Force from Oct. 10, 1942, to April 6, 1943.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Bertha Groves, Tacoma, Wash.

ALFRED HENSLEY—Services for Alfred Hensley, 78, who died Saturday, will be held in Conger-Morris chapel Tuesday at 3 p.m. with the Rev. J. Gordon Buller of Phoenix Presbyterian church officiating. Interment will be in Phoenix cemetery.

The deceased was born Oct. 22, 1876, at Chicago, Ill. He came to Oregon 44 years ago. On Jan. 1, 1913, in Fern Valley, he was married to Jennie A. Fornes, who survives. A daughter, Florence, preceded him in death.

Other survivors include a son, Thomas J., Albany, Ore.; two daughters, Mrs. Charles Doyle and Mrs. Charles Swingle, both of Medford; nine grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Hillah Shriners Schedule Annual Fall Ceremonial

Ashland—Hundreds of Shriners from the area served by the Hillah temple of the Shrine will be in Ashland Saturday, Oct. 30, for an all-day annual fall ceremonial. A Shrine parade through Ashland streets is set for 2:30 p.m., that day.

Candidates for the Shrine will register at the Ashland Masonic temple from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The Camel Herders have scheduled a luncheon at noon at the Elks lounge, to be followed by initiation by that group of the Shrine.
