Cost of Living Shows Sharpest Decline Since Last November

Washington — (U.P.)—A drop in food prices lowered the nation's cost of living by three-tenths of one per cent from mid-August to mid-September, the government reported today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said it was the sharpest monthly drop since last November for both food prices and the overall cost of living. Food prices declined 1.3 per cent during the month.

In a statement accompanying the price report, Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell said the average American factory worker in September "could buy more goods and services with his take-home pay than in the same month of any previous post-war year."

He said the average factory worker earned \$71.86 a week in September, an all time high for that month. His take-home pay, assuming three dependents to be counted as tax exemptions, averaged \$66.78, also a record high for September.

Can Purchase More

Mitchell said the average worker with three dependents was able to buy two per cent more goods and services and the single worker four per cent more in mid-September than two years earlier when the rearmament boom was still under way.

"The rise in wage rates in the past year has offset the drop in the length of the work week," he said.

In addition, the stability of consumer prices has made for confidence, a major ingredient of a strong and growing economy.

The September decline lowered the overall cost of living 0.4 per cent below the level of a year earlier and 0.6 per cent below the record high set in October, 1953.

The drop in food prices more than offset slightly higher costs for housing and apparel.

Mrs. Arness Joy Wickens, acting bureau commissioner, said recent declines in wholesale prices indicated that a further drop in retail food prices will be revealed in the mid-October report to be released next month.

No major "escalator clause" wage contracts, in which wages are tied to the cost of living index, were affected by today's report.

Coffee led the food price decline. After rising steadily for nine months, coffee prices dropped from mid-August to mid-September by a sharp 9.5 per cent.

Wheat Allotment Restrictions Told For Local Farmers

Jackson county farmers without a wheat allotment who harvest wheat in 1955 will be ineligible for a 1955 Agricultural Conservation payment, according to Delmar Smith, chairman of the county ASC committee.

Eligibility requirements for price supports on wheat in 1955 also specify that any person who exceeds his wheat allotment will not be eligible for price support.

Average Support Level

The chairman pointed out that the national average support level for the 1955 wheat crop will not be less than \$2.08 a bushel, 82½ per cent of the current parity price. For the 1954 crop, the national support level was \$2.24 a bushel.

Oregon potatoes, dry beans and other vegetable crops, the producer of which exceeds his base acreage of the 1952-53 years, are not eligible for price support in 1955.

An incentive price of 62 cents a pound for shorn wool, and a price of 70 cents a pound for mohair for the 1955 marketing year has been announced, the official said. Payments will be based on a percentage of each producer's cash return from wool sales, with growers urged to save all sales slips of marketings of their 1955 wool and mohair clips.

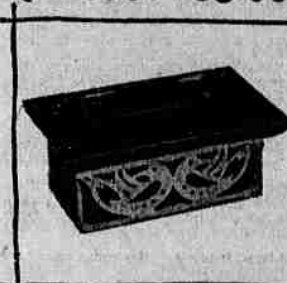
