Board of Education Revises Budget for Increase of Teachers

Portland — (UP) — An unexpected enrollment increase of nearly 14 per cent in Oregon colleges and universities today prompted the State Board of Higher Education to revise its proposed budget for the next biennium to include \$1,162,000.

The fund would be used to hire more than 100 new teachers during the biennium with \$850,000 of the cost to come pal factor in the spurt of registration.

Petersen Lawyers Plan To Ask More Spy Case Details

Alexandria, Va. — (UP) — Attorneys for Joseph S. Petersen Jr., planned to ask the federal courts today to compel the government to give them more details about the espionage case against him.

They prepared to go before Federal Judge Albert V. Bryan to support in oral arguments their plea that the government furnish them a "bill of particulars" to back up charges against the physicist.

Legal Document
A "bill of particulars" is a legal document spelling out the alleged acts that led to the indictment of an individual.

Justice Department attorneys said they would argue against Petersen's attorney's request, such a "bill of particulars" would force them to reveal U.S. security secrets.

Charged With Taking Secrets
Petersen, a recently dismissed employee of the super-secret National Security Agency, was indicted last Wednesday on charges of taking defense secrets "with intent and reason to believe they would be used to the injury of the United States and to the advantage of a foreign nation."

Although the indictment did not say so specifically, the State Department revealed that the nation involved was The Netherlands.

Petersen pleaded innocent to the charge. He is free on \$10,000 bond.

from state funds and the balance from student fees.

Above Anticipation
The board had anticipated an enrollment increase of only three per cent this year. Projections were mushrooming Portland State college where early enrollments leaped from 1620 to 2360.

The board struggled with a problem of impending overcrowding at the Portland college and a student-teacher ratio considered too high for best educational results. Ratios proposed for other schools in the system over the next two years would be from 13.6 to 18.1 students per teacher. At Portland State the ratio would be 28.8 by the 1956-57 year the chancellor's office expects an enrollment of 3120.

Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State college, pointed out that "this high student-teacher ratio at Portland State puts us all in jeopardy."

Courses Added
The newest addition to the state system of higher education has been a junior college only. This year, third-year teacher training courses were added and next year it will offer a full four-year, liberal arts course, thus attracting even greater enrollments.

The Board's building committee yesterday approved preliminary plans for a physical education building at Southern Oregon college at Ashland, drawn by Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls. The structure is second-ranking building on the 1955 legislative request.

High Production Made By Locally-Owned Cow

A registered Guernsey cow owned by P. K. Nelson, Medford, produced 10,998 pounds of milk and 531 pounds of butterfat during a 305-day test period, according to information released today by the American Guernsey Cattle club, Peterborough, N.H.

This production represents approximately 5,117 quarts of milk. The cow, a senior four-year-old, was milked two times daily while on test. The record was supervised by Oregon State college.

Field Recuperating in Polish Rest Home; Swiatlo Doubts He Will Return To Freedom

Wienha — (UP) — Hermann Field, the Ohio architect released yesterday from a jail in Communist Poland, today advised his wife at London that he must recuperate in Poland "for a short while" before returning home.

Field was released from prison after the Red Regime of Poland admitted he had been jailed unjustly on baseless charges for five years.

His wife, Kate Field, said in London that she had received a cable explaining that he cannot rejoin her and their sons at once because he must recover from his long ordeal in Red prisons.

In Rest Home

Field's wife and their two sons, Hugh, 11, and Alan, 9, live in London. They formerly lived in Cleveland.

It was disclosed that Field now is at a rest home near Warsaw where he is regaining his strength and health before traveling to freedom.

His wife said "I have received a telegram from Hermann saying he is longing to come home to me and the boys, but that he needs to recuperate for a short while before traveling."

with Field at the rest home last night in the first direct contact American authorities have had with Field since he sud-

denly disappeared in Warsaw in August, 1949.

Details Kept Secret

The ambassador said he will keep in touch with Field until he is able to travel.

All details of their conversations were kept secret.

Hermann is one of four members of the Field family who were swallowed up one by one behind the Iron Curtain in 1949 and 1950.

The fate of the other three missing members of the family still is shrouded in mystery and Communist silence.

There was no news of Field's brother, Noel, his sister-in-law Herta, or their foster daughter, Erika, all of whom disappeared behind the Iron Curtain within a year of his arrest in 1949. The Red radio hinted yesterday that some of the other Fields also might have been freed.

Still Has Doubts

In Washington, the former Communist secret policeman who arrested Hermann Field at the Warsaw airport in August, 1949, said he doubts the American ever will be allowed to return to the free world.

Josef Swiatlo, who "chose freedom" last year, said it would be "difficult" for the Reds to allow Field to leave Poland.

"Field would be a very embarrassing person to have free in Western countries, where he could reveal conditions as he saw them," Swiatlo said. "I am surprised that so far that man's life has been spared. I don't know what may happen in the future."

L. A. Grand Jury Opens Smog Probe

Los Angeles — (UP) — The Los Angeles County grand jury was scheduled to open a full-scale investigation today to determine if there has been a breakdown in Los Angeles County's smog control enforcement.

Several prominent city and county officials, including Los Angeles Mayor Norris Poulson and Gordon P. Larson, head of the Air Pollution Control District, were expected to testify.

Rate citizens' groups charged smog laws were not being enforced and suggested possible dereliction of duty on the part of smog officials.

Along with the grand jury action, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors indicated it intends to fire or demote Larson from his \$17,500-a-year job.
