Marshfield high school's football team, which entertains the Medford Black Tornado Friday at Coos Bay, "has the horses" this season. And apparently the Pirates haven't spared them.

In the seven games the Pirates have run up 228 points while maintaining an unbeaten record. Most lopsided count was 64 to 7 over Reedsport. Other triumphs were 44 to 0 over Myrtle Point, 33 to 0 over Cottage Grove, 31 to 13 over Coquille, 13 to 0 over Roseburg.

The horses so far as the backfield is concerned are Johnny Johnson, Denny Baker and Tom Metzger, regulars, and Mike McIntyre and Ted Fischer, reserves who possess the speed, and Sandy Fraser, a veteran, who possesses the savvy at quarterback. Johnson is a two-year letterman. In the line there's End Fraser Yetter, Tackle Gene Tankersley and Guard Terry Cox, all two-year lettermen and

all on the left side on offense. The probable offensive team to start is all lettermen but one man. Clair Rood, two-year letter-winner, anchors the defensive line and Yetter and Johnson are also on that unit.

JOHNSON TOPS

Johnson is the top runner for the split T attack which Marshfield is using this year. According to Kenn Hess, sportswriter for the Coos Bay Times, Johnson has deception along with his speed and follows his blockers well, often "setting up" the opposition for his blockers. Fraser has been bothered by a neck injury in recent games and he and Jim Carille, a non-letterman senior, have been doing quite a bit of changing off.

TORNADO CHANCE GOOD

Despite the high scoring total by the Pirates there's indication that Medford can come through with a win Friday night if the Tornado crew digs in and plays up to its capabilities. Three of the high scoring victories were against A-2 schools — Reedsport, Myrtle Point and Coquille (this year). Against two A-1 foes Marshfield had it tougher as seen in the 13 to 0 verdict over Springfield and Roseburg. Medford downed Springfield 24 to 7 and Roseburg 20 to 0. The ball does bounce oddly at times in football in more ways than one, however, and Marshfield in drubbing Eugene licked a crew which had downed Roseburg 19 to 0.

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UCLA Upset Could Occur

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA Coach Henry (Red) Sanders says no one should consider it an upset if his team, the nation's top scoring-undefeated squad, is beaten by any one of its next three opponents.

Sanders, whose Bruins seized the number one spot in this week's United Press poll of the nation's teams, said UCLA could bow to California, Oregon or Southern California.

The Bruin mentor told the Southern California Football Writers association yesterday he wasn't happy over his team being made a 13-point favorite over California in next Saturday's game at Berkeley.

"California runs about the best T formation offense in football today and Paul Larson probably is the number one offensive star in the country, and he isn't bad on defense either," Sanders said.

Jess Hill, whose Southern California Trojans squeaked past California 29 to 27, told the writers he has changed his mind about Oregon's George Shaw being the only All-America prospect he had seen this year.

"Of his performance against us, I'll have to say Larson is as good or better than Shaw," he said. "We're awfully happy that we don't meet Larson again as a college player."

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Representatives of UCLA are taking a needling these days over some of the scores the Bruins are running up over their hapless opponents, 72-0 over Stanford, 61-0 over Oregon State on successive week ends.

But Vic Kelley, UCLA publicist, says that Red Sanders never would think of such a thing as humiliating the foe by purposely running up big scores.

"In fact, my records show that in both the Stanford and the Oregon State games, the second, third and fourth string men played much more than the first stringers," said Kelley.

"Furthermore, some of our third stringers have put in more playing time than the first stringers and possibly may finish out the season that way."

New York — (U.P.) — Army's current football team is being compared by some today with those invincible elevens of the Blanchard-Davis era and this comes back by a team which dropped its opening game is due in great part to a wallowing end named Don Hollender.

Before the season started, Army was touted as the class of the East. But the stock dropped almost out of sight when the Cadets lost their opening game to South Carolina, 34-20.

The fact is that Hollender missed that game.

Additional facts are that since then, the Cadets have bounced back to smother Michigan, 28-7; humiliate Dartmouth, 60-6; maul Duke, 28-14, and annihilate Columbia, 67-12.

Jordan Oliver, whose unbeaten but once-tied Yale team plays Army two weeks hence, summed up the Cadet case when he said:

"We are trying to blank Army out of our minds. We are very cognizant of the fact that this is one of the most outstanding teams they ever had. Some of our scouts say that this Army club—teamwise—is every bit as good as the Blanchard-Davis teams."

Hollender is the man who made it jell.

The six-foot, two-inch, 195-pounder from Rochester, N. Y., is a truly great end in the Army tradition of such as Bob Shuler, Barney Poole and Hank and Dan Foldberg. Red Blaik, the Army coach, isn't one to flatter his athletes, so it is eyeopening when the colonel calls Hollender "one of the best pass receivers I ever coached."

There's more to him than that, though. A varsity basketball player at West Point, the 20-year-old who once considered enrolling at Notre Dame comes by his pass-catching naturally. But he also liked the going rough and thereby is an exceptionally fine defensive end as well as a terrific downfield blocker.

Hollender missed the start of the season when he drew a month's confinement because of piling up too many demerits. Thus he "walked the area" as punishment and couldn't suit up for the opener. And it was with an end-or-tackle option play by which South Carolina lowered the boom on Army.

Hollender was only an alternate end last season but when

ASHLAND AWARDED DISTRICT FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF SPOT

The District 6 A-2 football committee has ruled. Ashland will represent the southern division in the play-off with the northern sector winner on November 5 for the district championship and the right to enter the state title quarter-finals.

A unanimous decision was reached yesterday afternoon, according to Glenn Hale, Eagle Point, one of the district committeemen. Other committee members are Raymond Karp, Myrtle Creek, chairman, and Wayne McMurray, Coquille. The three are principals of their schools.

Action by the committee was a follow-up to the 7 to 7 deadlock by Ashland and Crater in their fracas at Ashland on Friday. The Grizzlies claimed the title on the basis of more net scrimmage yardage and more first downs. Crater officials sought the nod on the contention that they play more teams within the district and that they threatened to score oftener than Ashland in the Friday game.

Hale said that the Ashland statistical edge did influence the decision. Telephone calls between the committeemen and the two schools kept the wires hot most of Monday. The Eagle Point school official said that every possible angle was considered, even the possibility of a play-off between the Grizzlies and Comets.

As the result of the decision, Crater's tussle with Eagle Point on Friday night, will have no bearing in the district race. In the final analysis only the games among Ashland, Crater and Phoenix figured. Crater also played and defeated Illinois Valley, a district member. Eagle Point and Illinois Valley did not schedule Ashland.

The Ashlanders probably will face Coquille in the district titular fray.

Crater against Eagle Point will be out to sew up the Rogue League toga. An Eagle Point win will mean three-way tie among the two schools and Phoenix.

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — A Pacific Coast conference official has admitted a Southern California player committed a holding penalty as the Trojans scored the winning touchdown over California here Saturday.

Frank McCormick, supervisor of officials for the PCC, told the Southern California Football Writers association yesterday that Trojan halfback Frank Clayton held a Bear player as Trojan Lindon Crow scored in the fourth quarter.

The touchdown proved decisive as Southern California won the game by a narrow 29 to 27 score.

The foul was called after the score and the Trojans were penalized 15 yards on the following kickoff.

"It was a case of an official's judgment and the touchdown, of course, stands," McCormick said.

Dressen May Raise Senators

New York — (U.P.) — Eddie Yost, a guy who has seen 'em come and go with Washington, predicted today that new manager Chuck Dressen will have the Senators "fighting for third place" next season.

Yost, regarded as one of the outstanding third basemen in the majors, feels that under Dressen, Washington may be the "dark horse" in the American league race next year.

"I don't think Dressen is the type of manager who would be satisfied to stand still," Yost said. "I've read where he is going to have a free hand in running the club and the chances are he'll make several changes and improvements."

Hunting Not Allowed On City Airport Area

High-Scoring UCLA Ranked No. 1; Ohio State, Oklahoma 2nd

UCLA, the highest scoring college football team in the nation, took over the No. 1 spot in the United Press ratings today in a surprise shakeup, with Oklahoma and Ohio State tied for second place only three points behind.

It was the closest weekly contest for first place in the five-year history of the United Press ratings.

Oklahoma, which topped the ratings for the three previous weeks, received the largest total of first-place votes from the 35 leading coaches who make up the rating board. The Sooners attracted 17 compared to 10 for Ohio State and eight for UCLA.

But Coach Harold Red Sanders' Bruins, who have averaged nearly 44 points per game in achieving six straight victories, received a greater total of second and third place votes than their rivals. As a result, UCLA had 204 out of a possible 350 points while Oklahoma and Ohio State each had 301.

UCLA, which crushed Oregon State, 61-0, last Saturday had 18 votes for second place, nine for third, and one each for fourth and 10th places. The Bruins ranked third for the two previous weeks after being fourth and second for the first two weeks of the season.

UCLA Favored

UCLA, rated an excellent bet to retain the Pacific Coast Conference championship although not eligible for the Rose Bowl because it went last year, plays California next Saturday. Oklahoma faces the biggest obstacle in its path to another Big Seven Conference title when it plays Colorado, while Ohio State meets Northwestern in the Big Ten.

Oklahoma beat a weak Kansas State team only 21-0 last Saturday. Ohio State scored an impressive 31-14 triumph over Wisconsin.

Arkansas and Army moved up to fourth and fifth places, respectively, to fill the spots occupied previously by last Saturday's upset victims; Notre Dame, idle last week end, held sixth; Wisconsin dropped from second to seventh place, while Purdue, Southern California and West Virginia advanced to take over the last three berths among the top 10 in that order.

Three Drop Out
Mississippi fifth last week, Minnesota tied for sixth, and Colorado 10th dropped out of the select 10 after being beaten.

Points, awarded on the basis of 10 for a first-place vote, nine for a second, and so on down to one for a 10th place vote, were distributed as follows: Arkansas 187; Army 160; Notre Dame 134; Wisconsin 78; Purdue 75; Southern California 69; West Virginia 55.
