Tax Conference Opens in Ashland Thursday, Friday

Ashland — Accountants and tax attorneys from southern Oregon and northern California will be heard Thursday and Friday for the second annual Southern Oregon and Northern California Tax conference, sponsored by the Klamath Falls, Rogue Valley and Josephine chapters of the Oregon Association of Public Accountants.

A repeat member of the "faculty" will be Theodore Scanlon, Medford, internal revenue agent, who will discuss sales and exchanges of personal and business problems in their relationship to the changed federal tax code.

Other lecturers at the conference will be Samuel Taylor, San Francisco tax attorney; Daniel J. Brajeich, Gonzaga university, another repeat member; Jerome J. Kesselman, professor of accounting at Denver university, and Carlisle B. Roberts, chief counsel, Oregon State Tax commission.

The sessions will be held at Southern Oregon college. Brewer said late registrations will be accepted at the conference.

Bonneville Gets Bulk of Funds

Portland — (U.P.) — More than half of the \$29,010,541 Interior Department funds allocated for use in Oregon during the current fiscal year will be spent by the Bonneville Power Administration, it was announced today.

Bonneville's share is \$17,100,500. Both figures are under the 1954 fiscal year when the overall sum was \$30,124,963 and BPA got \$18,789,000.

For fiscal 1955 Bonneville construction appropriations total \$14,026,000 with operation and maintenance getting the rest. BPA said the appropriations were enough to allow "orderly continuation" of high-voltage transmission line and substation construction aimed at bringing more federal power to the Willamette valley, Coos Bay, Portland, The Dalles and southwest Oregon areas.

The Bureau of Land Management will get \$4,883,520, compared with \$4,262,985 last year. The Bureau of Indian Affairs will receive \$2,567,523, compared to \$1,907,416, while the Bureau of Reclamation gets \$1,239,614 compared to \$2,839,038 in fiscal 1954. The latter includes \$297,000 for emergency rehabilitation of Crescent lake dam.

Other allotments include \$882,400 to the geological survey; \$642,065 to the national park service; \$988,840 to the Bureau of Mines; and \$321,571 for the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Food Prices To Stay About Same In Coming Year

Washington — (U.P.) — Housewives will be paying about the same prices for food next year, but they're likely to be faced with higher costs at the beauty parlor and dress shop.

Mrs. Gertrude S. Weiss, assistant chief of the Agriculture Department's home economics research branch, made these predictions yesterday before the 32nd annual Agriculture Outlook Conference here.

Supplies To Be Ample
Mrs. Weiss said that supplies of major items are expected to be "ample" next year. She said "some evidence of lower food costs" is seen in recent price cuts for coffee, pork, and lamb.

But she said marketing charges are not expected to decrease and "retail food prices next year are expected to average close to this year."

Furnishings About Same
Barring a slight increase in textiles, she said estimates also point to little change from this year in the cost of household furnishings. The same, she said, applies to automobiles and home building materials.

But the home economist said current low inventories and increased fabric prices "suggest that clothing prices will not turn downward."

Queen Mother Starts Social Engagements On Arrival in U.S.

New York — (U.P.) — Refreshed after a quiet evening in the suburbs, Queen Mother Elizabeth fulfills today the first social engagement of her three-week visit to the United States.

Her schedule calls for a lunch in her honor given by the Canadian Club. She possibly may go sightseeing in the afternoon before returning to the seven-acre estate of Sir Pierson Dixon, her host, for a "family" dinner to-night. Later, she and her party planned to attend the Broadway musical "Pajama Game."

Liner 12 Hours Late

When the liner Queen Elizabeth docked 12 hours late Tuesday, the queen mother went directly to Sir Pierson's estate in nearby Riverdale, where she dined with her host and hostess, Sir Pierson is Britain's permanent delegate to the United Nations.

An Atlantic storm delayed her arrival and sent two of her attendants to their cabins for seasick remedies, but the queen mother, admiringly called "a good sailor" by crew members, arrived looking radiantly healthy and unexpectedly fashionable.

Inspects Ship

She surprised passengers on the five-day trip by turning up on all decks of the ship, Crew

members told delightedly how the 54-year-old queen asked to inspect all parts of the ship.

She met the engineers, inspected the engine room, presented gold cuff links to three of the stewards and gave autographed photographs to several of the ship's officers.

"She was charming, that's the only word you can say for it," a ship's joiner told reporters.

"Every body had a good word for her. She even spoke to me and I never saw her before in my life."

Ate With Passengers

Although the liner which bears her name provided the queen mother with a special three-room suite, including a private dining room, she ate with other passengers two evenings.

She looked momentarily surprised as she walked into the blinding lights set up by television and newsreel cameramen in the ship's veranda grill, where she greeted the welcoming committee, then calmly stepped to the microphones to read a brief speech of appreciation.

"Ever since our happy visit in 1939 I had always hoped that one day I might be able to come back and stay a little longer in your great country," the queen mother said.
