

WIDE ASSORTMENT OF TOPICS OCCUPY OREGON POLITICIANS

Oregon candidates, with only a week left before the Nov. 2 general elections, yesterday and last night spoke on subjects ranging from employment and power to fishing rights and congressional record publishing costs.

Cordon, campaigning for reelection to his Republican seat in the U. S. senate, directed an attack upon the oratory of his junior colleague, Independent Sen. Wayne Morse. Cordon told Portland Jaycees that Sen. Morse has cost taxpayers \$268,601.65 in Congressional Record printing costs by his 10 years of senate oratory.

Neuberger Proud
State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Democrat, who opposes Cordon in the election, told a Democratic rally at The Dalles that he was proud of having "defended the welfare and rights of Indian fishermen at the last session of the state Legislature."

Neuberger also spoke out in favor of civil rights legislation and fair employment practices.

Neuberger last night, along with his wife, State Rep. Maurine Neuberger, spoke at the annual conference of the Oregon

State Nurses' association at Salem.

Casson Raps Claims
At Bend, Democratic gubernatorial nominee Joseph K. Casson Jr., said that record payments of unemployment compensation this year belied Republican claims of prosperity in Oregon. Casson said that in April and May alone more than 7,000 Oregon workers exhausted their unemployment compensation after 26 weeks of registered unemployment. He added that the state's compensation reserve fund was 41st in the nation and well below the national average, and asked Gov. Paul Patterson to explain these figures in the light of statements about Oregon prosperity.

The Oregon Public Power Committee, in a five-page statement, reaffirmed its position in support of Sen. Cordon and said his opponents "deliberately misrepresent the truth for personal political gain." The committee, a group of seven public power figures, was formed last week.

C. Girard Davidson, former Assistant Secretary of Interior, told a meeting of Portland carpenters last night that the National Rural Electric Cooperative association's compilation of Sen. Cordon's record showed him to have voted "wrong" 27 out of 35 roll call votes since 1944. He said he considered Cordon "a definite enemy of public power."

Cold Snap Piles Foot of Snow in South Dakota Hills

The coldest weather of the season moved out of the West today in the wake of snows that piled up as high as 12 inches.

Temperatures skidded deep into the 20s in the Rocky Mountain states and Western Plains and got as low as 17 at Ely, Nev. Another cold mass dropped the mercury to 28 at Caribou, Me.

Wide Temperature Range
The oncoming cold front created temperature ranges of almost 50 degrees in Texas—from 28 at Delhart to 75 at Galveston.

Ahead of the cold front light rains or drizzles spread from the Great Lakes through the northeast states.

The blanket of fog that shrouded the Midwest yesterday was blamed for the crash of an air force F80 jet near Bluffton, Ind., in which the pilot was killed.

Slick highways and poor visibility caused scores of auto accidents.

The cold chased snow clouds from the West and Great Plains, leaving 12 inches on the ground in South Dakota's Black Hills.

In East Texas, meanwhile, the Sabine river was above flood stage.

A crest of about 10 feet above flood stage was expected to hit Gladewater early next week, threatening serious damage.
