Around Hollywood

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Television's fall season so far has produced one bright new star, comedian George Gobel, but he's still in a state of shock that the audience laughed so hard at his jokes.

Gobel two years ago was one of those "new faces" on a summer replacement show, and this fall NBC launched him on a program by himself.

On this George announces, "Well, this is the show," and then wanders from set to set with a vagueness and mild, slow humor that brought rave reviews from the critics, carloads of mail from fans and telegrams from the big bosses in New York.

Still Feels Insecure
But despite his new fame I found the 34-year-old Gobel staring sadly into a martini at the Brown Derby and sighing, "I still don't feel secure."

"Just because you've done four shows you can't decide that's the answer," he said.

"I had talked myself into not expecting too much from the first few programs. So had the director, Hal Kantor. He had me say these lines, such as 'Now we'll walk to the next set,' and we never dreamed they'd get a laugh. But they did."

"That was the biggest surprise—that people laughed at those lines. It's amazing. You come up with a show, that is honest, and people think you're being funny."

"I am trying to get people used to the fact you don't have to be hilarious."

Eight years ago, Gobel was an unknown grocer's son from Chicago who told jokes in night clubs and conventions around the country. He got his show business start singing and playing the guitar on the radio, "as a boy soprano."

Formed Trio
After high school he formed a trio that entertained in cocktail lounges.

Zoological Casting Office Lecates Stage Struck Animals for Employment

New York—(U.P.)—Employment prospects are good for elephants and donkeys these days, thanks to the political campaigns, but Fred Birkner is thinking ahead to Christmas. His employment agency will be interviewing reindeer then.

Birkner operates the Chateau Riding Academy, which has outgrown its name in the past few years and has become New York's principal clearing house for stage-struck animals.

Animal Jobs Found
He has found jobs for dogs, antelopes, elephants, racoons, zebras, skunks, lions, alligators and trained and untrained fleas. He has placed a goat in "Mr. Roberts," a dog in "The King of Hearts," and a horse in a Metropolitan Opera production of "Carmen."

"Around this time of year I'm kept pretty busy supplying donkeys to the Democrats and elephants to the Republicans," Birkner said at his zoological casting office.

"Turkeys go big around Thanksgiving, reindeer at Christmas and groundhogs in February."

The Popular Penguin
And for some reason, he added, there are always several class for penguins on New Year's Day.

Birkner's riding academy used to cater chiefly to equestrians who wanted to jog over the bridge paths of Central Park. Now renting horses is almost a sideline.

Birkner has been called on to deliver such items as 11,000 bees, a 12 foot python and six dogs that could climb a ladder. He turned up a camel for a rug company that wanted to make exotic deliveries of its merchandise.

One manufacturing firm needed a skunk. "The skunk was used as sort of a trophy. It went each week to the salesman with the lowest sales."

One of his hardest orders to fill was for a cricket. He got the request in the dead of winter.

Flea Problem
"I searched all over, cellars, gardens, attics, but I couldn't

even hear a chirp in all of New York. So I had to go to the country, and I finally found one in the fireplace of an old house," Birkner said.

Birkner said most creatures are patient performers but on one occasion the act got out of hand. This involved a large jar of fleas needed for a show that had better go unidentified.

Somehow or other, as those things always happen, the lid was taken off the jar before the show began. The fleas dispersed into the theater.

"I had spent weeks collecting them from old dogs in the neighborhood," he said. "And I didn't get a single one back."

The theory that milk is a commodity deserving of special treatment is not one peculiar to Oregon whose voters for the third time will pass on state milk control this November. Since 1933, when the legislature passed Oregon's law, 17 states and the federal government have acted to stabilize the marketing of fluid milk in the public interest. This newspaper doubts that Oregon would gain by throwing out a system that on the whole for two decades has supplied the people with good milk at reasonable and comparatively constant prices. The competitive factor, which is the chief attraction of the repeal proposal, could be given freer play within the framework of our present law. We should all see that is done rather than take action which undoubtedly would result in substitution of federal supply for state control over much of Oregon's milk supply.
