

Glittering Social Events Planned for Queen Mother

New York—(U.P.)—The parties planned for Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth are already being set in motion, and the biggest social event since the last visit from the British royal family.

Even top Social Register names have been turned down for tickets to the elaborate dinners. At least 1,000 elegantly dressed New Yorkers who paid \$25 for each dinner ticket, will be seated a room or two removed from the main ballroom where the queen will be. They'll see

the program on television.

"We just were overwhelmed with requests," the man in charge of one formal dinner said. "We had 3,000 requests very early, and only 1,500 can be seated in the main ballroom."

The queen mother arrived aboard the liner Queen Elizabeth on Tuesday, October 28. This is not an official state visit, and she is staying in the comparatively informal residence of Sir Pierson Dixon, England's permanent delegate to the United Nations, until November 4 when she goes to Washington, D. C.

The queen mother and her party, including her private secretary and two ladies-in-waiting, are occupying the 2nd floor of the Dixons three-story stone and brick home overlooking the Hudson river in nearby Riverdale.

But even a queen's private visit is crisscrossed with public appearances and social functions.

The Canadian club here will host her first luncheon today but this luncheon is so exclusive most members of the Canadian club can't even attend.

"We picked them by seniority," a club spokesman explained. Of the 1,410 members, just 150 of the old timers get to go to the luncheon.

Then there's a big dinner party Saturday night given by Columbia university, which is celebrating the 200th anniversary by George II. Columbia university invited the queen mother here and will award her an honorary degree.

The majority of tickets to this dinner were set aside for university alumni, but even with this restriction the demand far exceeded the ticket supply. Some 1,500 will eat with the queen mother in the main ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria, and an equal number will be seated in nearby dining rooms.

The same overflow setup helped solve the seating problem of the English Speaking Union, which is giving the most formal of all the dinner parties during the queen mother's visit.

"This is going to be the most glittering social event of the winter," a staff member at the union said proudly. The \$25-a-plate dinner is a "with decorations" affair, which means men wear their medals and women wear their fanciest dresses.
