Cambridgeshire Jinx Still Holds

Newmarket, England — (U.P.) — English horsemen wondered today when a horse is going to snap the jinx that has haunted favorites in the Cambridgeshire Stakes for more than a quarter of a century.

Turk's Blood, Alphenborn and Durante were joint favorites at 9 to 1 for Wednesday's renewal of the historic stake, but Minstrel, a 66 to 1 shot, emerged the winner in a four-horse blanket finish.

And what happened to the popular choices? Turk's Blood fared best of the trio, gaining fourth place, less than a length back of the winner. But Alphenborn and Durante wound up far back in the bulky field of 36 thoroughbreds.

It was the 26th straight year the favorite failed to win the Cambridgeshire.

Caterpillars Top Filippino Five

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil — (U.P.) — The United States team, off to a successful start in the final round of the world amateur basketball championships although it hasn't shown consistently good form, was slated to clash with France tonight in its second game.

The American team — the Peoria, Ill., Caterpillars — came from behind to defeat the Philippines, 56-43, in the opening game of the round-robin final round Wednesday night.

France also won its opening game, 57-49, over Uruguay while in other games, Canada beat Israel, 50-42, and Brazil defeated China, 61-44. Each of the eight finalists will play every other team once.

Canada moves against Uruguay tonight while Israel faces Brazil. China and the Philippines are idle.

Bathtub Voyager Believed To Have Resumed Journey

Whidbey Island, Wash. — (U.P.) — The whereabouts of Roy Bergo and his seagoing bathtub was a deep mystery today but his wife said she believed he had resumed his 1200-mile voyage to Alaska.

Bergo, a 50-year-old former prison guard, left Double Bluff on the southern tip of Whidbey

Island early yesterday morning after telling a Coast Guard patrol boat crew he was giving up his plans to reach Alaska in his galvanized tub powered by a two horsepower outboard.

However, Bergo had not contacted his wife and a check of friends of the family, the Coast Guard, the Washington State Patrol and other authorities throughout the Puget Sound area failed to uncover any trace of him.

Bergo had negotiated 12 miles of his planned voyage in his three-foot craft. He had informed the Coast Guard he was giving up the trip because the propeller shaft of his motor became sprung and he could not continue.

Bergo trimmed his weight by 34 pounds and planned to make most of the trip with his legs dangling over the side of the "vessel" originally designed for use as a baby's bathtub.

TO PICK QUARTERBACK

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — Coach Chuck Taylor of Stanford said he would announce today whether John Brodie or Jerry Gustafson will start at the quarterback spot against the Washington State Cougars here Saturday. But first string guard Don Manoukian, who suffered a slight concussion during Tuesday's drill, stayed on the bench yesterday and may not start against the Cougars.

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Game captain Ken Schwocho of the University of California Bears was taken to the hospital with an infected finger yesterday and will not see action against UCLA Saturday, according to Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf. Schwocho, regular left tackle, will remain as honorary game captain, but the field duties will be assumed by season captain Matt Hazeltine.

OSC BACKS IMPROVED

Corvallis, Ore. — (U.P.) — Coach Kip Taylor sent his Oregon State Beavers through a final workout yesterday and said the squad was in high spirits for Saturday's game against USC. He said quarterbacks Ray Westfall and Jim Withrow are much improved physically and should bolster the Beavers' offense in the tussle at Los Angeles.

INTERCEPTION EYED

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA indicated today it would try to squelch California in the same manner as it did Stanford — through intercepting passes. Coach Henry Red Sanders had Ronnie Knox and Edison Griffin both tossing passes yesterday. Fourteen out of 42 were completed, but nine were intercepted. Wingback Jim Decker picked off three.

In the Day's News

"YOUR column of Oct. 15 charges me with voting against passage of the bill which passed the Oregon legislature in 1951, to prevent the diversion of Klamath river waters.

"This charge is a complete falsehood.

"House Bill 661 (the bill forbidding diversion of the Klamath river) came twice to votes on passage in the senate. The first time it passed the Senate by a vote of 25 to 1, and you will find that Senator Richard L. Neuberger among the 25 senators who voted FOR the bill. (Official senate journal, 1951 legislature, page 249).

"After the House had agreed to the Senate amendments, HB 661 came before the Senate again for repassage. It passed the Senate 29 to 0. Once again, you will find that Senator Richard L. Neuberger voted FOR the bill. (Official senate journal, 1951, page 284).

SO MUCH for what Neuberger SAYS in his letter. Let's now bring in from the record the part HE DOESN'T MENTION.

THIS bill that sought to prevent theft of Southern Oregon's water (HB 661) was read in the Senate the second time on April 14, 1951 and was referred to the senate committee on agriculture.

The majority report of the senate agriculture committee recommended that the bill DO PASS. The minority report recommended that it DO NOT PASS.

The minority report was signed by RICHARD L. NEUBERGER.

WHEN the bill came before the Senate as a whole, SENATOR NEUBERGER moved to substitute the minority (do not pass) report of the committee for the majority (do pass) report.

In the debate on the Senate floor that followed introduction of the motion of substitution, the battle TO KILL HB 661 (the bill to prevent theft of Southern Oregon's water) WAS LED BY SENATOR NEUBERGER. He was joined by seven other senators, all Democrats — Senator Jack Bain, Senator Phil Brady, Senator Russell Gardner, Senator R. D. Holmes, Senator Tom Mahoney, Senator Ben Musa and Senator Manley J. Wilson.

THEY'VE lost their fight to kill HB 661 by the parliamentary device of a motion to substitute the minority report of the committee for the majority report.

The Senate vote on the motion of substitution was heavily AGAINST IT.

All this is fully set forth in the Senate journal for the session of 1951.

THIS is the point:

If the majority report of the senate agriculture committee (for which Neuberger fought and voted) had been adopted by the Oregon Senate as a substitute for the majority report, House Bill 661 (to save Southern Oregon's water) WOULD HAVE BEEN AS DEAD AS A DODO.

So, you see, it was Neuberger himself who wanted to kill our Cock Robin, and if his fight on the Senate floor to substitute his minority DO NOT PASS report for the majority DO PASS report had succeeded he WOULD have killed Cock Robin.

When the Senate as a whole voted decisively against his motion of substitution he knew he was beaten and on the final vote he threw in the towel with the hide and voted for the bill — as did everyone else. The final vote was unanimous for the bill.

I'VE gone into this matter in considerable detail because this letter of Neuberger's is a striking example of the shifty tactics he has employed throughout his campaign.

From the very beginning, he has been loose and liberal with words and reckless with facts.
