New York — (U.P.) — Like any other mother, Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth takes a daughter's advice when it comes to picking the place to go on a night out in Manhattan.

Because daughter Margaret, the pretty princess who keeps up with the latest song hits and Broadway musicals, told her mother she must see "Pajama Game," a few thousand New Yorkers and a handful of tourists today are impressing their friends with stories of the queen mother at the theater.

A champagne glass with traces of pink lipstick sits atop an old piano backstage at the St. James Theater. The queen drank from it.

Three women from Cleveland, Ohio, can give a minute description of the back of the queen mother's head. Their seats were directly behind the second row where the royal party sat.

"I just never thought it would happen," sighed Mrs. Frank Stoddard at the first act intermission. The queen mother and her ladies in waiting had gone backstage to meet the stars, but Mrs. Stoddard and her two companions from Ohio had no desire to move from their choice seats. They thought the queen was "just wonderful."

"Boy, did you see those diamonds!" Janis Paige, red-haired actress who co-stars in the show exclaimed later. Her dressing room was the largest, so the royal theater party came there to meet the stars.

The queen mother making her first appearance in an evening gown since she arrived two days ago for an unofficial, 24-day visit in the United States and Canada, wore a pale blue lace evening dress glistening with silver threads, a fluffy fox stole and a dazzling diamond necklace. No tiara.

"I've heard this music buzzing around at home for weeks," she told Miss Paige and singing star John Raitt. "It is a favorite of Margaret's. She will be so jealous when she hears I've seen the show."

After a few sips of champagne the queen mother returned to her seat.
