World Disarmament Treaty Plans Head Good News for Week

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

THE GOOD

1. The United Nations Political Committee voted unanimously to start a five-nation subcommittee at work on a world disarmament treaty. The subcommittee will consist of delegates of the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France and Russia. There is no indication that Russia is ready to agree to a system of inspection which would keep it from cheating. But delegates of the Western powers have some hope that an agreement to stop the arms race and outlaw nuclear weapons may finally be worked out.

2. Russia's first attempt to sabotage the Paris agreement for the armament of Western Germany failed quickly. The day the agreement was signed Soviet

Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov called for a Big Four foreign minister's conference on unifying Germany and negotiating an "All European" security organization. The United States and Britain said at once that they will hold no meeting with Russia before France and Western Germany ratify the Paris pact. After that, they said, may be Molotov can have his conference—if he still wants it.

3. Revelations made by Josef Swiatlo, a high Polish secret police official who came over to the West, forced the Polish Communist government to free Hermann Field, an American citizen whom it had imprisoned for five years on false charges. Field, his brother Noel and Noel's wife, Herta, disappeared in 1949. Swiatlo told how the Poles arrested Hermann Field and the Hungarian Reds arrested the Noel Fields. Neither of the Red governments ever had admitted the arrests. There is now hope that Noel Field and his wife may be released also—if they are still alive.

THE BAD

1. The wives of two American Embassy officials were forcibly detained in Moscow for 90 minutes when they tried to photograph a group of children. The Russians alleged that one of the women slapped a "worker" and said she was "undesirable." The embassy and the State Department took a serious view of an insult to two American women. The entire question of the safety of American diplomatic personnel in Russia was involved.

2. Warfare broke out in Egypt between Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and the terrorist Moslem Brotherhood, which accused him of selling out to Britain in the Suez Canal agreement. A member of the Brotherhood tried to assassinate Nasser. A state of emergency was proclaimed throughout Egypt. The Brotherhood assassinated Premier Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashy in 1948 after he outlawed it.

3. The new Communist government of northern Viet Nam in Indochina lost no time in making sure that its relations with the United States will be bad. It announced that it "does not recognize" the United States consulate general. It accused Consul General Thomas Corcoran of making statements "injurious to the sovereignty of the democratic Republic of Viet Nam. It was indicated that Corcoran and his six aides may be forced to leave the country.

LONELY WIDOW NEEDS
A CHANGE OF SCENERY

When one's residence or work are not to one's liking or do not offer what one wants in life, the solution to the problem is a change of scenery. A woman writes:

(Q) "I am 41 years old, a widow, and childless. Could you suggest ways of meeting available males? I have not been able to meet any through my church and friends. I am a prison maid. My work is very depressing and certainly affords no means of meeting anyone worthwhile. The field of eligible men seems very small and since I was happily married, I'm suffering from the worst kind of loneliness."

(A) If you are to get a better perspective on life and be reasonably happy you must get out



of the work you are doing and go to a place where life is more cheerful. I am sure you can get work in a more congenial atmosphere.

Then, if the community in which you live is too small to offer you any opportunities of meeting available men of suitable age, go elsewhere. As you are alone in the world, you can go where you wish and not feel that you are being unfair to anyone.

Furthermore, it would be a good morale builder for you to get a complete change of scenery. There are too many memories of your happy married life where you are living. That, combined with the type of work you are doing, makes life seem even duller and drabber than it otherwise would be in your present state of loneliness.

Why not talk to the person under whom you work and ask if some arrangements cannot be made for you to transfer to a different type of work in another community? There you would join community organizations and meet people. A larger community offers greater possibilities along these lines than does a small community. Furthermore, a newcomer in a community often has a better chance to attract available men than have those who have always lived there.

Woodworkers To Wind Up Testimony For Fact Finders

Portland — (U.P.) — CIO International Woodworkers of America representatives will complete their testimony today at the second session of the seven-man fact-finding panel investigating issues in the summer-long lumber strike in the Pacific Northwest.

Justice Frederick G. Hamley of the Washington State Supreme Court, chairman of the panel, said the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers had entered their complete testimony at the opening meeting yesterday. Both unions made introductory remarks.

90-Day Time Limit
Judge Hamley said outcome of the meetings would not be known for some time. Management will enter its case next week and time for rebuttal will be allowed, the chairman said. The panel is under a 90-day time limit.

The panel was appointed by Governors Paul L. Patterson of Oregon and Arthur B. Langlie of Washington to look into the strike issues and report on its findings.

The industry-wide walkout

started last June and continued through the summer over union wage increase.
