

Employment Clinic For Veterans Set

Featured during the clinic will be information from the Veterans Administration, bureau of veterans reemployment rights, and the Department of Labor, State Employment Service, State Department of Veterans Affairs, the county veterans service office, the governor's committee on National Employ the Physically Handicapped week, and others.

Family Fare Plan Due for Trailways

Continental Pacific Trailways bus company will initiate a family fare plan Nov. 1, it was announced today by Lyle D. Rogers, Medford agent for the company.

The plan is being adopted by other Trailways companies, and will be nationwide in scope, he said. The reduced fares for families will be in effect for trips starting on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday.

The plan, similar to those in use by airline and railroad companies, provides that the head of the family pays full fare, but that all others in the family can go for half fare, with children from 5 to 11 years old going for quarter fare. Both one-way and roundtrip tickets are available, and stopovers can be arranged, Rogers said.

Farmers' Share of Food Dollar To Drop

Washington — (U.P.)—The Agriculture Department has predicted that the farmers' share of the consumer's food dollar next year will drop to 43 cents, down a penny from this year and the lowest since 1940.

A marketing and transportation report said the price of food at the farmers gate may average slightly below this year. But the cost of marketing those foods may be slightly higher. Despite the continued high farm costs, the report said retail food prices may decline "slightly" in 1955.

Strangest of World's Strange Animals Live in Octopus Kidney

New York — (U.P.)—One of the strangest of all the world's strange animals is the dicyemid. It lives in the kidney of the octopus. And it gives birth to its own grandchildren.

Dr. Mayard McConnaughey and his wife, Evelyn, who are among the foremost authorities, called the attention of science to the dicyemid today because they're stuck in their studies on a particular point.

How does a dicyemid get from one octopus to another? You rarely if ever will find an octopus without a nation of dicyemids flourishing in its kidney, but how in the world do the tiny creatures manage it?

Largest Are Small
 The largest dicyemid won't be more than 10 millimeters long, which is a little less than four tenths of an inch. The smallest is less than one half of a millimeter. They have no organs, no nervous system, no stomach, no muscles. They're worms and just about the most lowly.

They squeeze their young into the octopus kidney from any pore of their bodies. The pore closes instantly. There is no sign anything happened.

Two Kinds of Young
 Their young are of two kinds. The first kind is like the parent, only smaller. It rams one of its ends into the wall of the octopus' kidney and stays there. All that happens is that it grows and soon starts squeezing forth young of its own. Thus, the nation grows. This kind you'll find in young octopi.

The other kind looks more like a single cell creature than a multi-cell animal, which is the dicyemid. At birth they leave the kidney at once and swim freely in the ocean. This kind you'll

find in old octopi—Sometimes only this kind; other times, mixed with the other kind.

The McConnaugheys produced evidence that as an octopus gets older and older, the dicyemids in its kidney get wind that their world isn't going to last forever and they'll have to start moving on if dicyemids are to survive through eternity.

They thought that the new hormones which an octopus releases when it becomes mature sexually might be the kind that changes the dicyemid offspring from one kind to the other. Or it might be something else. But the strangest thing was that they had observed baby dicyemids swimming about in sea water with baby octopi within easy reach.

The baby dicyemid didn't make for the octopi and it seemed clear that they must live inside some other animal in order to develop enough to establish themselves in the kidney of a new octopus. This is the \$64 question—the missing link of the life cycle — which the McConnaugheys set forth in the scientific monthly, a publication

of the American Association for the Advancement of science.

Nothing To Do With Sex
 Sex has nothing to do with the kind of offspring that looks like the parent. The production of the second kind is sexual but, the McConnaugheys said, it is "highly complicated" and "indirect."

When the dicyemid reaches the time of life to produce the second kind, the germ cells in its central cell either migrate to the exterior cells or disintegrate.

"A few lucky ones escape this fate," the McConnaugheys said. Each of these gives rise to a peculiar and very small individual which lives its entire life in the central cell of its parent. Some of this child's cells become egg cells; some become sperm cells which fertilize the egg cells. Thus, the grandchild develops and is born, not by its parent but by its grandparent.

Completion Scheduled On Hydro Unit in '55

Construction of the next-to-last of the hydroelectric units of the Toketee power project may be completed by mid-1955, according to A. S. Cummins, president of the California Oregon Power company.

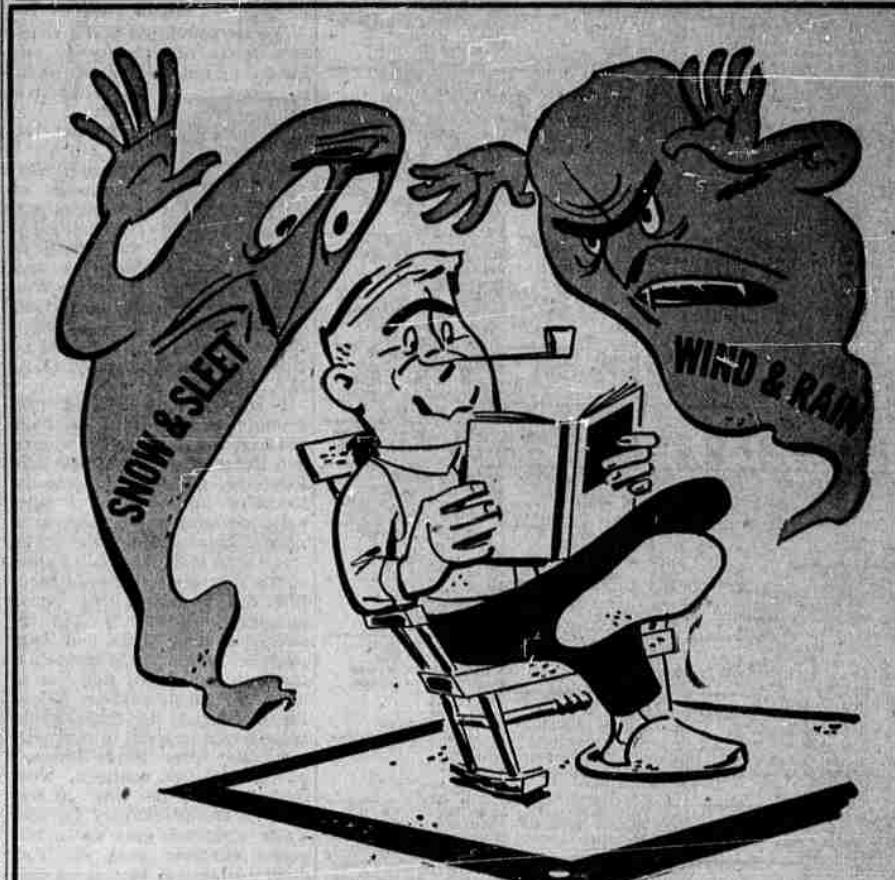
Favorable construction weather has speeded work on the project, Cummins said in a report to shareholders, and earlier estimates that the job on Lemolo No. 1 would not be finished until late in the year have been revised. Construction on the eighth and last unit of the project, Lemolo No. 2, can "begin in earnest" early next year and it should be ready by the middle of 1946, Cummins said.

Cloud-Seeding Continued
 The Copco president also reported that the company will continue with cloud-seeding operations this winter, in order to increase precipitation in the watershed areas of the project.

Cummins said that the power deficiencies in this area which were created during the war have been overcome, and the company now has "a fine modern system capable of supplying all the expected needs of our people with adequate power for all purposes."

For the 12 months ending last Aug. 31, sales to all classes of customers totaled 1,273,827,413 kilowatt hours, the report said, an increase of 2.36 per cent over the previous year. Residential electricity sales in the firm's southern Oregon-northern California area were up 5.28 per cent.

Gross operating revenue for the 12 month period totaling \$16,127,471, an increase of 12 per cent. Net income for the same period was \$3,175,918, compared to \$2,532,074 the year before.
