New York Gubernatorial Race Outcome May Lead To Presidency

Albany, N. Y. — (U.P.) — The big race in New York for next Tuesday's election is the race for governor.

On its outcome may hang the 1956 choice for the Presidency. Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has retired, temporarily anyway. It is not likely he will try for the Presidency a third time. But he wants to have a hand again in picking the GOP choice as he did in helping put across Dwight D. Eisenhower.

So the gubernatorial race between Democrat Averill Harriman and Republican Sen. Irving Ives takes on a particular national significance. Particularly so should Mr. Eisenhower choose not to run again.

A Republican loss here would be almost as much a blow to Dewey as to Ives. A Democratic win would put always pivotal New York State in kingsize position at the Democratic national convention two years hence.

The race has completely overshadowed the election of 43 Congressmen by New York voters Nov. 2.

President Eisenhower made an unscheduled 41 mile handshaking tour of normally Democratic New York City in behalf of Ives. Democratic Presidential aspirant Adlai Stevenson is following up for Harriman.

Efforts by Dewey and other GOP campaign planners to make his 12-year administration the principal issue failed. After a few passes at the Dewey record, the Democrats concentrated on the economic theme. Independent polls show Harriman ahead.

Saturday at 7:45 p.m. the Rev. and Mrs. Maurice Luce, of Samoa, will speak and show a colored sound film "The South Sea Isles."

A united rally of all the as-semblies of southern Oregon will be held at the church on Sunday at 3 p.m. All the mis- sionaries participating in the convention will attend wearing costumes of the lands in which they are working.

Ives suddenly interrupted his schedule for a series of "bomb- shells." First he charged Harri- man was connected with a pier bribery case. Then he linked him with a Polish mining enterprise that "misinformed" investors, and accused him of "union bust- ing" at his dairy estate.

Harriman withdrew from a scheduled face to face debate, charging Ives with "gutter polit- ics" and avoidance of the main issues.

Not to be overlooked by any means is Rep. Franklin D. Roose- velt Jr., namesake son of the late President. Young Roosevelt

was blocked in his bid to win the nomination for governor but later agreed to accept the nom- ination for state Attorney Gen- eral. Now the Democrats are billing it the Harriman-Roosevelt ticket.

Should the Democrats win, most observers believe Harriman will be a one-term, leaving the way clear in 1958 for Junior, who is only 40, to go for the governorship.

As the campaign, nears a cli- max, political leaders expect less than 70,000 votes will separate Harriman and Ives out of a total of 5,000,000.

Father-in-Law Of Dr. Sheppard Plans To Testify

Cleveland, Ohio. — (U.P.) — The father-in-law of Dr. Samuel Sheppard volunteered to appear as a prosecution witness at the osteopath's trial for the murder of his pregnant wife, it was learned today.

Thomas Reese, father of the slain woman, indicated by his action he would not stand by his son-in-law and would willingly testify against him.

Assistant County Prosecutor John J. Mahon refused to say whether he planned to call Reese as a witness.

"I'm ready to make my open- ing statements today," was all that Mahon would say on the matter.

However, both Mahon and Chief Defense Counsel William J. Corrigan agreed that selec- tion of two alternate jurors would take up all of today's court session.

"I think we'll be able to get started Monday," Corrigan said.

Body in Bedroom
Sheppard, 30, a prominent "society doctor" from nearby Bay Village, is charged with the bludgeon-murder of his blonde wife, Marilyn, 31. Mrs. Sheppard's battered body was found in the bedroom of the couple's Lakeside home on July 4th.

The handsome young doctor claimed an intruder murdered his wife and knocked him unconscious when he came to his wife's assistance.

Trotsky's Murderer To Renew Parole Bid

Mexico City — (U.P.) — Prison of- ficials said today they had given Jacques Mornard, the murderer of Leon Trotsky, a good conduct letter.

Mornard, serving a 22-year- sentence for killing the Commu- nist leader in 1940, has been eligible for parole since last Dec. 20, but his first request was re- fused.

Friends of the 49-year-old pris- oner said he would make a second request for release "Sat- urday or early next week."

The good conduct letter, cer- tifying he "invariably has ob- served good conduct and proved it with positive facts . . . and has complied to the letter with pen- itentiary regulations" will ac- company Mornard's parole re- quest.

WILLIAM SWEET OF C
South Kingstown, R. I. — (U.P.) — William E. Sweet, a Demo- crat running for a state Senate seat, will be listed on the ballot as "William E. Sweet of C." That's to distinguish him from other William Sweets in the South Kingstown area. The "of C" stands for the candidate's father, Charles.

Automobile Smashup Cuts Phone Service

Ontario — (U.P.) — Telephone service was to be restored in the Oregon Slope suburb here to- day. About 168 telephones were put out of operation yesterday by a spectacular automobile smashup four miles north of here.

A sugar beet truck driven by George Hironaka, Ontario, was trying to make a left turn off Highway 30; he collided with a car driven by J. Mitsunaga of Salt Lake City; the Mitsunaga vehicle rolled over four times and snapped off a utility pole; the sagging lines caught on an approaching truck which pulled down two more poles; one of them rammed through the wind- shield of a passing car and shat- tered a nearby well-drilling rig; the other pole wrecked a filling station.

No one was injured.

Wreckage and Empty Rafts Sighted at Sea

San Diego, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Coast Guard reported sighting wreckage and three empty rafts believed to be from a Navy anti- submarine bomber carrying four men who disappeared off the Southern California coast.

The Coast Guard said last night that its search planes spotted three rafts floating empty in the vicinity of the wreckage about 15 miles off ocean side.

The plane was on a routine flight from San Diego Naval Air Station Wednesday night when it disappeared and was presumed to have crashed into the sea.

The navy released the names of the missing fliers as Lt. W. A. Berger, pilot, San Diego; Lt. (JG) Thomas W. Wagner, Alex- andra, Va., and crewmen L. E. Hooke, Coronado, Calif., and J. E. Myers, San Diego.
