

CRUSADERS TO PLAY CRATER JAYVEES HERE ON SATURDAY

St. Mary's of Medford, after one idle week, returns to the prep grid wars this week as all five Jackson County B League schools have tussles.

The Crusaders of the Medford parochial school encounter the Crater junior varsity at 8 p.m. Saturday on the Medford senior high grass. St. Mary's gets back into action for the first time since clinching the B crown against Jacksonville on October 15.

Of the three additional scuffles in which the B clubs are involved, only one is an actual conference basis. That is the match which was being played this afternoon between Prospect and Talent at Prospect. Other contests find Rogue River entertaining Oakland tonight and Jacksonville going to Cave Junction to play A-2 Illinois Valley also this evening.

The Crusaders will use this week's action to tune for their District 5B championship scrap the following week with Chiloquin. Medford's parochial school has seen regular action only against its four Jackson B rivals. St. Mary's is expected to be intact for the Crater tiff although Back Laval Meunier missed three practices this week because of flu and worked out last night in sweatpants.

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City Mantle Decider Set At Portland

Two of the titans of Oregon high school football collide tonight at Coos Bay when the Medford Black Tornado goes up against unbeaten Marshfield in a non-district game.

Medford ranks number two in the Journal coaches' poll while Marshfield is just behind in third place. Medford suffered its first loss of the season last weekend, 12-7 to Eureka, Calif., while Marshfield has won seven straight.

South Salem, the number one ranked team, hopes to clear the next-to-last hurdle to an unbeaten regular season, but the Saxons host a rugged Corvallis team with enough wallop to pull an upset. South Salem could win the district 8 title if it wins and Albany should lose to North Salem.

The Portland title will be decided when Lincoln meets Jefferson with Lincoln after its first crown in 31 years. Jefferson, by losing, could drop into a tie for second place with Roosevelt. The Portland loop gets two playoff berths, and Lincoln already has one of them sewed up.

Grants Pass at Klamath
Milwaukie meets Tillamook and the Mustangs can take the district 3 crown by winning.

In A-2 play, Reedsport can win the district 2 crown with a win over Sluslaw and Dallas can wrap up the district 4 title by winning from Canby.

Beaverton and Forest Grove are favored to remain tied for the top spot in class A-1's district 4 with the Beavers hosting Newberg and Forest Grove at McMinnville. In district 5, North Bend meets Eugene Saturday night and a Eugene win would mean Marshfield would clinch at least a tie for the crown.

Pendleton, king in district 7, plays Clarkston, Wash., while Hermiston goes to The Dalles. Two of the state's strongest teams, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls, meet tonight at Klamath Falls with nothing but prestige at stake since Medford has wrapped up the district 6 crown.

Ducks Said Healthy for Husky Clash

Eugene — (U.P.) — Most of the University of Oregon football team was pronounced in good shape by Coach Len Casanova for tomorrow's game against Washington in which the Webfoots hope to beat a Northwest opponent besides Idaho for the first time since 1949. The team left here by train for Seattle at 6 a.m. today.

Washington, Washington State and Oregon State have downed the Ducks four times in a row.

Oregon also is looking ahead to next week's battle with mighty UCLA in Los Angeles and the Washington game should give an indication of Webfoot hopes against the Bruins. Washington held UCLA to a 21-20 victory.

Ball-Wether
"Our performance at Seattle should serve as a bell-wether when our campaign train arrives in Los Angeles. A victory over Washington would mean a brighter team outlook for the following week end," Casanova said.

As for the Northern end of the Pacific Coast conference, both Oregon and Washington are

"unbeaten." Oregon holds a win over Idaho while Washington downed Oregon State.

Casanova said the entire squad should be ready for the trip to Seattle, although Walt Gaffney, right halfback, has been bothered with a back injury and may see only limited action. Left half Dick James, who sat out the game against San Jose State, will see action but his leg injury may cause him to give way to Sophomore Tom Crabtree much of the time.

These thinking organizations oppose the "Salmon S.O.S. Bill"

The Oregon Voter—"The measure goes beyond purported intent of mere stream closure. There would be a serious loss of food fish catches and resultant impact on payrolls."

The Oregon Journal—"Let's not destroy an essential industry on the basis of unsound arguments—arguments that do not point the way to the best interests of all the people of Oregon."

Oregon State Fish Commission—"If we stop only 10% of the salmon (as provided in 'T') the rest of the salmon will, in almost every case, go on to certain death and complete loss."

Portland Chamber of Commerce—"There is no need for this particular measure. The bill is

poorly written and appears to have been hastily prepared. The provision . . . goes too far."

Oregon City Enterprise-Courier—"We think the bill is not consistent with good fish management. Desperation measures are not the answer and only serve to confuse the real issue."

Astorian-Budget—"If the people of Oregon want once again to have abundant salmon in their coastal rivers, they must reject this selfish initiative measure."

The Oregonian—"The bill goes a lot farther than the sponsors have admitted. The curtailment of this important part of the commercial fishery cannot be justified by any of the arguments sponsors of the measure have offered."
