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Adlai Charges GOP 'Tearing Nation Apart'

Sen. Morse Charges Liberalism Dead in Republican Party

Urges Vote for Demos In Union Address

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne Morse, (I-Ore.) charged Saturday night that "liberalism in the Republican party is as dead as a dodo."

Morse, speaking here before leaders of the Aero-Mechanics Union (AFL), urged voters to "return Congress to the people of the United States by electing a Democratic Congress."

Takes Issue With Ike

The independent senator, a Republican until 1952, took issue with President Eisenhower's campaign statements that a Democratic Congress would engage in a cold war with the President.

"If there is a cold war," said Morse, "it will be declared by the President."

He said Democrats in the present Congress had supported the President far better than had the Republicans on many issues. Morse also slammed at Vice-President Richard Nixon's campaign techniques and the "Big smear, big lie techniques of reactionary Republicans." Nixon made a major address here tonight, also, speaking at a public rally.

Attacks Nixon Stand On the issue of Communism, the Oregon senator charged that Nixon, himself, had "worked on the back of the Senate floor," to urge defeat of the Humphrey-Morse bill which outlaws the Communist party.

Morse accused the Republicans of doing nothing to relieve unemployment in the nation. He said there were 5,000,000 persons out of work at present, and that lesser figures being quoted by Nixon were not complete.

Republican farm policy, said Morse, had reduced the purchasing power of farmers by 22 percent.

BOMB FOUND IN AUTO OF OHIO CONGRESSMAN

'Hallween Bandit' Armed With Broken Bottle Robs Woman

A "Hallween bandit" wearing a rubber mask and armed with a jagged portion of a beer bottle forced his way into an apartment at the Brownell motel, 1102 North Riverside ave., Friday night, injured the attendant, Mrs. Thelma Aliene Netherland, on both arms with the weapon and made off with \$14, city police reported.

Mrs. Netherland, 505 Putman st., told officers that the robbery occurred about 8:10 p. m., while she was attending the motel for owners, Mr. and Mrs. George E. Brownell, while they went to a school carnival.

Answered Knock She heard a knock at the door and, when she answered it, the man said, "Trick or treat," she informed officers. Mrs. Netherland replied, "You are a little old for that," and the man said, "I guess I am." She stepped back into the apartment to get some candy and, as she did so, the man took what appeared to be the broken neck of a beer bottle out of his pocket and tried to force his way in.

The woman reported to officers that she tried to shut the door but that she was hit several times on the arms and forced back into the room. Instructed "to get the money I had," Mrs. Netherland stated to officers that she just stood still. The bandit hit her in the stomach and said, "Get it." She went to the cash drawer and, after concealing a \$10 bill, she gave other currency to the man. He then left.

Description Given Mrs. Netherland described her assailant as being 5 feet 6 or 8 inches tall and weighing 130 to 140 pounds. She said he was wearing a green jacket with a fur collar and a blue or green color, and indicated that his voice sounded like that of a teenager.

Police later found a broken, bloodstained beer bottle near the scene.

former mayor of Cleveland, charged the bomb was planted by "stupid, ruthless racketeers." Dynamite Charged He said two sticks of dynamite had been placed on the back seat of his automobile. The ends of the sticks were charred but the dynamite had failed to go off.

He found the charred remains of a six-foot fuse lying across the floor and speckles that he believed were white pieces of an exploded dynamite cap.

The crudely-made bomb was discovered after Bender's wife, Edna, drove to the post office to get the morning mail. Bender said he was in his pajamas when his wife returned asking "what's the funny smell in the car?"

He dressed and investigated, finding the dynamite sticks. Didn't Notice Bomb "They must have been placed there after I got home last night," he said. "I would have noticed them when I took some things out of the back seat after I parked the car in the driveway."

Bender blamed the attack on "labor racketeers." He is chairman of a House subcommittee that held hearings into labor racketeering in Cleveland last month.

Bender said he ruled out political connection with the attempted bombing. "I can't conceive of any political implication at all," he said. "I don't see eye-to-eye with the Democrats on a lot of things, and I know they don't see eye-to-eye with me, but it's out of the question that politics had anything to do with it."

Famed Wilbur Shaw Dies in Air Crash

Decatur, Ind. — (U.P.) — Wilbur Shaw, who flirted with death hundreds of times as three-time winner of the Indianapolis 500-mile auto race, was one of three persons killed Saturday when their plane plunged into a field near here.

Shaw, president and general manager of the Speedway, was returning to Indianapolis from the Chrysler corporation's Chelsea, Mich., testing grounds where he had viewed the firm's new autos. He would have celebrated his 52nd birthday tomorrow.

State police said the pilot was Ray Grimes, 40, Greenfield, Ind., sales manager for Sky-harbor Airport in Indianapolis from which the party left Saturday morning.

Nixon Calls for Continuation of Economic Policies

Sees 1955 as Best Year Ever in U.S.

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — Vice-President Nixon's press secretary said Saturday night an anonymous caller telephoned the Vice-President's hotel room here to tell him that his supper had been poisoned.

"The Vice-President dismissed the call as a prank," Klossner said, "but the secret service insisted that the food be examined and sent it to a laboratory for analysis."

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — Vice-President Richard Nixon said Saturday night a Republican controlled 84th Congress would make 1955 America's best year ever, in war or peace.

"Continuing economic policies which have brought America its best peacetime year in history will increase America's gross national production to \$500,000,000,000 in the next 10 years—an increase which will mean 3,000 real dollars in additional income to every family in America," he said.

Winds Up Campaign Nixon wound up an exhaustive campaign tour through crucial states that started Sept. 15. He spoke at a public rally, presenting what he said was the "major speech" of the stump tour.

The vice-president said if the people elect a Democratic controlled congress, it would mean going back to the Truman policies. It would mean a return to "economic policies which would mean higher spending, higher taxes, and controls on the economy."

"These are the same policies which failed for 20 years to provide prosperity for America except during wartime. In 1940, after seven years of leaf-raking and boondoggling, there were still 10,000,000 unemployed in America—four times more than there are today. In 1949, Mr. Truman's last peacetime year, there were 5,500,000 unemployed—twice as many as there are today," Nixon said.

And the vice-president, looking fit despite his rigid schedule of appearances, charged a Democratic-controlled congress would mean a "return to the economic philosophy which was taking the United States down the road to Socialism."

Eugene Man Receives Call From President

Washington — (U.P.) — Republicans led by President Eisenhower and Democrats led by Stephen A. Mitchell countered each other Saturday with unusual "talkathons" and "walkathons" in last minute get-out-the-vote bids for control of Congress.

The Republicans did it by telephone; the Democrats by doorbell ringing. Ike Starts Moves Mr. Eisenhower started the maneuvers. He telephoned 10 of his supporters in various parts of the country, urging them to get out and vote.

He also asked them to telephone 10 other friends and make a similar request in a sort of telephonic "chain letter" to achieve a big out-pouring of votes. The Democrats immediately countered by staging a "Democratic walkathon."

Democratic national chairman Mitchell telegraphed party leaders and candidates that every one should match Mr. Eisenhower's unusual strategy by "walking to the homes of 14 people."

"He should tell them why we need a Congress that will take positive action to curb unemployment, give the farmer a fair return for his toll, give tax cuts to the people instead of special groups, enable the President to conduct a real bi-partisan foreign policy," Mitchell said.

Eugene Man Called Eugene — (U.P.) — A Eugene clothing store manager called by President Eisenhower Saturday and asked to telephone 10 persons to urge them to vote in next Tuesday's Congressional elections, said he would get started "right away."

Grover S. Slayter, 69, said the President called him about 9 a. m. (PST). He said Mr. Eisenhower did not specify to tell people to vote Republican. "Ike is awfully fair about that sort of thing," he said.

Stevenson Attacks 'Campaign of Fear' By Top Republicans

Pleads for Unity in National Broadcast

New York — (U.P.) — Adlai E. Stevenson charged Saturday night that irresponsible Republican politicians were "tearing the country apart in their search for votes" and have gone so far as using the Communist party line in their attacks against the Democrats.

The 1952 Democratic presidential candidate tore into the conduct of the GOP campaign in a nationally-televised 11th hour speech here following a day of politicking in wealthy Westchester county.

Calling for the election of a Democratic Congress in Tuesday's balloting, Stevenson said: Effects of Partisanship

"All thoughtful citizens have been concerned about the progressive deterioration of this present political campaign. We have observed with sorrow the effect that the pressure of partisanship and political ambition have had on the top leaders of the Republican party."

Stevenson told his nationwide audience that President Eisenhower started his campaign with his record as the only issue, but when it became apparent that it was "a very poor issue," Republican leaders, spearheaded by vice-president Richard M. Nixon, launched into a "reckless campaign of fear, misrepresentation and distrust."

No Democrat, Stevenson said, has been immune to a "savage, ally attack on his integrity, his good sense and his very loyalty... this is the end of the great crusade."

Pleads for Unity Stevenson pleaded for unity and for a discussion of the campaign issues and called upon Americans to "cleanse your minds of suspicion and hate" at the polls Tuesday.

"I fear that irresponsible politicians, tearing the nation apart in the search for votes, have recklessly damaged our freedom, our self respect and our unity of national purpose," he said.

Stevenson attacked President Eisenhower, Nixon and other top GOP campaigners for stating the proposition that prosperity in the past has been "only at the price of war and bloodshed."

"This, of course, has been standard Communist propaganda for years and is believed by many to prove that the United States is ready to precipitate war in order to save capitalism," he said.

"I am sure the President must have spoken thoughtlessly and carelessly," he added, saying that no one who sincerely believes in free capitalism would believe that prosperity depends on war.

Stevenson charged that there could be no war between Mr. Eisenhower and a Democratic Congress either "colder or hotter" than the war within the Republican party.

He said President Eisenhower has been offering several arguments why the people should "give him" a GOP congress. "At Denver he said a Democratic congress would usher in a period of cold war between the congress and the White House, but if we are to judge by the record of the last congress, there can be no war colder, or hotter, than the internal conflict within the Republican party."

He said the only solution is election of a Democratic congress, adding that it was an "irony" that the Democrats were more likely to support President Eisenhower's program than the Republicans.

"I could even add that it is the only way to rehabilitate as an effective instrument of government the Republican party, now so hopelessly divided on policy, program and philosophy," he said.

Congress To Get Paris, Manila Pacts in Nov.

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower will submit the Paris and Manila agreements on European and Southeast Asia security pacts to the special Senate session next month, the White House announced Saturday.

Ike Said 'Misled' On Dixon-Yates

Washington — (U.P.) — Gordon Clapp, former chairman of the Tennessee Valley authority, said Saturday that President Eisenhower got "exceedingly misled" advice on the controversial Dixon-Yates Power contract and may not have understood "what he was getting into" when he approved it.

He voiced hope that "when the facts are smoked out" about the still-secret contract, "the revelation of informed citizens may somehow get through to the President and have this deal squashed."

Clapp blamed Budget Director Rowland R. Hughes for giving Mr. Eisenhower a "slanted" picture of the contract, and said Hughes was guilty of "something approaching dereliction of duty."
