Neuberger Replies to Nixon in TV Talk; Blasts Cordon Record

Portland — (U.P.) — State Senator Richard L. Neuberger, speaking to a television audience Friday night, said Vice-President Richard M. Nixon was ill-advised in citing Republican foreign policy as a reason for supporting Sen. Guy Cordon for reelection.

Neuberger, Cordon's opponent for the United States Senate seat, said Cordon had opposed the Eisenhower administration on several key foreign policy issues.

"Cordon has consistently sided with his fellow isolationist Republicans, Bricker and Jenner and McCarthy, in fighting against the Eisenhower program for the free world," Neuberger asserted.

Neuberger's speech was billed as a reply to the Vice-President's speeches in Corvallis and Portland last Tuesday.

He listed five major phases of foreign policy in which he said Cordon had failed to support the President:

McCarthy Declares Campaign So Close He Can't Predict

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy said Saturday the Republican campaign has been gaining strength in the past few days but said the election looks so close he would not predict the outcome.

"Two weeks ago it looked like the Democrats were in," the Wisconsin Republican said. "But the Republicans have been picking up strength."

McCarthy, meanwhile, prepared to mail to Senators and newspapers 9000 copies of a pamphlet entitled "Throw the Bum Out, Official Communist Party Line on Sen. McCarthy."

2. "Eisenhower had to exert all his influence to block the Bricker amendment by a single vote, but Cordon sided with Bricker and against Eisenhower on every rollcall.

3. "Eisenhower has backed reciprocal trade, a program consistently opposed by Cordon.

4. "Despite Eisenhower's support of Point IV, Cordon has voted against Point IV, on seven out of eight rollcalls.

5. "Even when Eisenhower was insisting that the Mutual Security program was essential to our defenses, Cordon voted against the program."

Farm Crop Prices Drop Two Per Cent Up to October 15

Washington — (U.P.) — The average prices farmers received for all their crops in the month ended Oct. 15 dropped almost two per cent.

The slump was led by a seasonal drop in hog prices and an unusually sharp drop in citrus prices, the Agriculture department said in a monthly farm price report Friday. Prices of potatoes, corn and cattle also fell, partially offsetting price rises for milk and vegetables.

Farmers' costs also dropped during the month, but only one-third of one per cent. This was not enough to keep prices from sliding to 87 per cent of parity, down one per cent from last month and three per cent below a year ago.

Parity is the government yardstick of a "fair" price for the things a farmer sells in relation to his costs.

Friday's report was the last before Tuesday's congressional election in which the farm issue may play an important part in some areas.

Polio Takes Oregon Youth After Parents Die in Crash

Portland — (U.P.) — James Goodrich, 11, died in a local hospital Friday several hours after his parents were injured fatally in an automobile accident while hurrying from their Netarts, Ore., home to see him.

The young boy was brought by his parents to a hospital Thursday night and his condition was diagnosed as polio. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn W. Goodrich, returned home.

They were contacted by police early Friday and told their son's condition had taken a turn for the worse. While returning to Portland their car skidded on ice near the summit of the Wilson River highway and crashed into a gasoline tank.

The father was killed outright and Mrs. Goodrich died a few hours later in a Tillamook hospital.

The boy died about 5:30 p.m. Friday, without knowing what had happened to his parents.

The truck driver, Norman Steele of Gladstone, said he tried to avoid the skidding Goodrich car by pulling off to the shoulder.

Two other Goodrich children

are being cared for by Goodrich's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Basil Goodrich of Dallas.
