

## Noted American And Wife Here To Visit Friends

Dr. and Mrs. Ernest Gruening are week end guests of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Schwamm, 6 South Groveland avenue. Dr. Gruening is a former governor of Alaska, and served in that office for 13 years until 1953. They are en route to Washington, D.C., and made the trip here from Alaska over the Alaska highway.

Dr. Gruening's distinguished career has included editorship of several outstanding publications in this country, including the Boston Herald, Boston Traveler and Boston Journal, the New York Tribune, New York Evening Post and the Nation. He founded the Evening News of Portland, Maine, and served as its editor and was at one time managing editor of La Prensa, only Spanish and Latin American daily in this country.

He became director of the division of territories and island possessions for the Department of Interior in 1934, and governor of Alaska in 1939.

In 1933 Dr. Gruening was appointed by President Roosevelt to general adviser to the U.S. delegation to the Seventh Pan-American conference in Montevideo, he is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, of the American Academy of Political and Social Science and of the Foreign Policy association, having served as a director of the last group.

Mr. Schwamm, a former director of the Alaska Department of Aviation, served under Dr. Gruening.

Mr. and Mrs. Schwamm entertained at dinner at their home last evening honoring Dr. and Mrs. Gruening. Among those who attended were former residents of Alaska now living in Medford.

The Schwamms are temporarily in Medford and are living in the home of Dr. and Mrs. L. L. Sanders while the Sanders are making a European trip.
