Activated Charcoal Now Used for Tips Of Cigarette Filters

New York—The latest thing in cigarette filter tips utilizes "activated" charcoal made from coconut shells.

The gray-tinted filter consists of charcoal, activated through a chemical process, and purified cellulose. The charcoal acts as an absorbing agent; it takes out invisible gases which have little effect on tobacco taste for the smoker.

Activated charcoal has been used for many years as a purifying agent for water, air, sugar, beverages and pharmaceutical items. Now it is part of a filter-tip cigarette.

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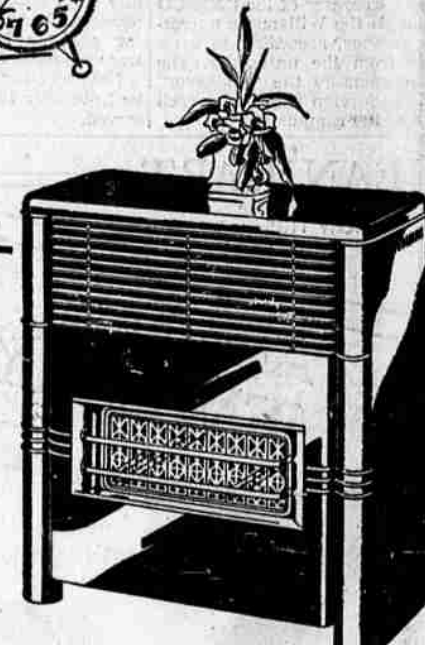
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
