To Washington
They will leave here next week for Washington, D. C., where they will be for about two weeks before going to Tyn-dall Air Force base near Panama City, Fla., his next station.

Captain Wimer was graduated in 1940 from Medford High school and attended the University of Oregon for two years before going into the Air Force during World War II. On return from service he completed his education at the university.

Later he was stationed at Shaw Air Force base in South Carolina and before going to India he studied at the Washington, D. C., Air Force school. He also studied language at Georgetown university.

This coming week Captain and Mrs. Wimer plan to visit in Salem and in Portland; and at Klamath Falls with Mrs. Wimer's relatives. They will be here again briefly before leaving for Washington.

Lad Who Defended Dog by Threatening Teachers Set To Get Expensive Schooling

Monroe, La. —(U.P.)—Little Joe Cooper, 10-year-old fatherless boy who defended his dog with a shotgun, left a reformatory Saturday to begin a new life in an exclusive private school and later a college of his choice.

His mongrel dog, Tippe, "the only thing I own," will go off to school with him.

Judge Howell Heard Friday night at a third hearing ordered Joe released from the Louisiana Training Institute into the custody of his sister, Mrs. Lina Foy.

The judge had committed Joe to the reformatory 24 days ago, just five hours after the boy pointed a loaded shotgun at two school officials because he thought they were going to send Tippe away to be killed.

Heard also announced plans that promised a bright new future for the boy who lived with his 65-year-old widowed mother and a sister in a little shack on the outskirts of the city.

Former Governor Jimmy Noe arranged to send Joe next Wednesday to Webb school for Boys in Bell Buckle, Tenn., until he is graduated, then to any college he chooses.

Tells of Plans
Noe, a former lieutenant of the late Sen. Huey P. Long, announced over radio and television station KNOE and KNOE-TV at Monroe and WNOE at New Orleans, his plans to give little Joe his second and best chance for a good future. The ex-governor will underwrite the educational plan to start with.

He also inaugurated a Joe Cooper Education Fund to seek funds on a nationwide basis. He is setting up the trust fund, for which he hopes to get \$25,000, and make the president of the Central National Bank, the boy's mother, Mrs. I. L. Cooper and himself as trustees.

Noe, whose own son went to Webb, said "I did it because I wanted to help the boy. I am sure this education fund will provide enough to cover Joe's education."

'Faith for Living' Said Need By Speaker for Youth Council

Though Americans live in a world with more material possessions than have kings in past ages, they are more insecure than ever in history, Dr. Gertrude Boyd Crane of Pacific university told the fourth annual meeting of the Jackson County Council for Children and Youth last week.

More than 50 representatives of county organizations interested in better understanding of youth attended the all-day session at the YMCA.

"It is a faith for living which we must have, if we are to survive," she declared, in a speech on "contributing to a satisfactory life philosophy for youth."

Cites "Sick Society"
We are seeking relaxation from a common strain, but have used unsuccessful sensational outlets, she said, and increased education has failed to heal the "sick society."

Stating that a "lack of a philosophy of life" is the cause of all our problems, Dr. Crane said the answers lay in spiritual values of enduring worth. We must also present a more enduring education for our children; face seriously a need for learning discipline; and must be individuals who will make decisions against already established standards.

She said the fellowship of man must be more vital and real, and that small groups of "committed people" can produce great things, by reaching out to all men who need.

Officers Named
Fred Bruegger, Eagle Point, was elected chairman of the council, succeeding Dr. William J. Thompson. Mrs. C. B. Collins was elected vice-chairman; Clifford D. Ouellette, treasurer; Mrs. Bruce Bishop, Central Point, secretary; Jim Armonson, nominating committee; and Mrs. John Ousterhout, Eagle Point, publicity.

In a report on committee achievements during the past year, Henry DeVoss of the education committee explained findings of the committee's study of local comic books. He said it was found that most information against comics was in the form of opinion, and that it would take accurate studies on a wide scale before any actual dangers of comic book reading are known.

Dr. Alex Peterson of Southern Oregon college told the group of the recreation committee's pilot study of Ashland's recreation program, which was made to get a picture of the county's recreational possibilities. The study showed a need for good supervision after school hours so school facilities could be used to their fullest.

There is also a need, Dr. Peterson said, for more planned recreation during bad weather, and for more adults. He commended the YMCA for what the committee found to be the best single contribution to recreation in this area.

Parent Discussion Groups
Mrs. Henry Padgham, chairman of the council's child guidance services committee, reported that approximately 15 parent discussion groups are in action under the county mental health committee. She also explained the purpose of the child guidance clinic and reported on the mental health committee's plan to further a family counseling service here.

The program to find more foster homes for youth agencies in the county was discussed by Mrs. Victor Birdseye of the child welfare committee. She said knowledge of what makes a good foster home is growing locally, but that there is a greater need for a concept of what makes happy homes for children so that they may remain in their own homes.

Mrs. M. O. Groves gave a short report from the health services committee and Alex McDonald explained the youth employment program of the council and public schools.

Detention Home Need
The need for a Jackson county juvenile detention home was explained by Francis Durante, soliciting finance chairman, who declared that the present practice of placing juveniles in the county jail creates a dangerous situation greatly in need of change.

H. Dewey Wilson, Medford attorney, demonstrated weaknesses in Oregon's laws pertaining to children, and declared that the state needs a uniform children's code. He encouraged more efforts toward securing legislation giving Oregon a code similar to the federal standard act, with modifications.

A report on special education needs was made by Dr. Donald M. Wilson, head of the speech correction center at SOC. He said that in Jackson county schools generally there are no provisions for a "slow learner." There is a great need, according to Dr. Wilson, for proper evaluation of why a child does not progress normally at school and for therapists to aid children when their real problems are found.

Chapter Formed Here
Dr. Alva W. Graham told the group of the International Council for Exceptional Children, reporting that a local chapter was formed this year with the aim of better understanding young-

committee and law enforcement officials of the possibility of juvenile details incorporated in various enforcement services.

The council also adopted a resolution in favor of construction of the detention home, which will appear on the general election ballot Tuesday.
