Corvallis — (U.P.) — Charleen Woods, 19-year-old Oregon State College coed from Salem, suffered a dislocated hip Saturday night in a sorority hayride accident.

Miss Woods was hurt when a tractor and the hay trailer it was pulling went into a ditch four miles from here and tipped over on its side.

The trailer was carrying some 25 Delta Gamma sorority women and their escorts, but the only other hurts reported were minor bumps and cuts.

Body Identified In Grant County

John Day — (U.P.) — The nude body of a man found last week in the Ritter area of northern Grant county has been identified as that of Thomas Edward Rocco, 58, a transient from Arkansas.

The identification was made by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Colvin, Ritter ranchers, who told authorities Rocco had worked for them during the last three years.

No autopsy report has been received but the coroner's office said it appeared the man had died of exposure.

State CIO Group Eyes Compensation Pay for Strikers

Eugene — (U.P.) — Payment of unemployment compensation to strikers after a union has offered to arbitrate a dispute will be sought by the state CIO organization which is holding its 17th annual convention here.

Proponents of the resolution to seek legislation changing the state's unemployment compensation laws said yesterday such a law might have prevented and would have shortened the prolonged lumber strike last summer.

Not Now Paid

Under present regulations strikers are not paid unemployment compensation.

The CIO convention also called for payment of compensation to a striking worker who has taken another job.

Charles Shelley, business agent, told the convention there was no good reason for liquidation of the Doernbecher Manufacturing Company in Portland, and the delegation moved to ask Gov. Paul Patterson to prod the Oregon Development Committee into action to try to save the plant and its \$1,500,000 annual payroll.

World Fair Plan Backed

The convention also backed a world fair in 1959 to celebrate Oregon's centennial year, proposed to seek to prevent supplement medical and hospital fees over those provided for in union welfare plans, proposed that the state utilities commissioner set rates for log hauling and not grant permits for such hauling unless a need can be shown, proposed to seek measures to require sawmill and logging operators to put up a bond to guarantee payrolls, opposed the administration's "partnership" plan for development of the Northwest's water power resources, backed a federally-developed high dam on the Snake river at Hells Canyon and sought repeal of the state's anti-picketing law.

Let Doctor Impress Girl
With Importance of Health

Young people frequently do not understand the importance of taking care of their health. A doctor can often make them see the light better than parents can. A woman writes:

(Q) "I have one child, a daughter of 19. She is very beautiful and very popular. Since she graduated from high school she has had a job which pays her very well. I have never asked her to pay board, as my husband earns enough to support the family. So, my daughter spends all her money for clothes and good times. That is my problem."

"She is out every night, often until midnight or later. She goes on dates with boys, and if she has no date she goes out with one of her girl friends. I maintain she doesn't get enough sleep, even though she says she 'catches up' on Saturday and Sunday mornings by sleeping late. Then, she is so anxious to keep thin that she just nibbles. I tell her she isn't eating enough to keep a bird alive and she just calls me old-fashioned. How can I make her see that she will ruin her health if she goes on this way?"

(A) The chances are that you will never be able to convince her that she will ruin her health unless she gets adequate sleep and proper nourishment. Surely you have learned by now that most teenagers — even those old enough to hold down jobs — think they know more than their parents do. However, she would doubtless take advice from your doctor, provided he is a young, up-to-date doctor. If your family doctor is your age or older, he will understand your problem and can recommend a young doctor who can talk to her about her foolishness in overtaxing her strength and dissipating her reserve.

If you insisted that your daughter assume some of the responsibilities of the home, even if you do not ask her to contribute anything to its support, that would give her something to keep her at home. It would be good training and experience for her as well as being good for her health.

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SMOTHERLOVE

Pope Appeals for Free World To Confront Enemies

Vatican City — (U.P.) — Pope Pius XII appealed today to "tired and inactive" statesmen of the free world to confront their enemies with "firmness and perseverance."

The Pope made his appeal in a 2000 word speech in the Basilica of St. Peter where he placed two jeweled studded crowns of gold upon a time stained portrait of the Madonna and Child. Chimaxes Marian Year.

The ceremony, celebrating the queenship of Mary, was the climactic moment of the Roman Catholic Marian year. It came on All Saints' Day and the dogma that Mary was assumed bodily into heaven when she died.

Thirty Cardinals, 300 archbishops and 50,000 persons gathered in the Basilica where the lights of 4000 candles created a magnificent setting of red and gold.

At one minute before noon the Pope affixed a golden crown studded with sapphires and diamonds to the portrait of Mary and a smaller crown to the Christ child beside her.

The 78-year-old Pope showed signs of weariness and age as he performed the 70 minute ceremony, but his voice became stronger near the end. "Christians in the present hour in which the unity and the peace of the world, and the very sources of life are endangered, can only lift their eyes toward the Virgin, who now appears garbed in powerful regality," the Pope said.
