Vice-Consul for Britain in City On Routine Trip

Norman R. Prickett, British vice-consul with offices in Portland, arrived in Medford today on a routine visit to this area.

While here, Prickett said, he planned to visit Miss Jean Thompson, 22, who arrived in Medford from England about three weeks ago, and who is in critical condition at Ashland General hospital, where she underwent surgery last week.

Miss Thompson is a sister of Mrs. Harold Ross, Hartley lane. The English woman became ill after arriving here for a six-month visit.

To Klamath Falls

Prickett visits this area periodically. From Medford, he planned to go to Ashland, Klamath Falls, and Bend, before returning to Portland.

The British vice-consul pointed out that his office at 715 Lewis building, Portland, is prepared to give information on imports and exports to and from the British Isles, and on business or pleasure trips in Britain. The vice-consul also aids British subjects as far as possible in difficulties they may be having in this country.

Those having questions which he may be able to answer should direct their correspondence to his Portland office, Prickett stated.

In Japan—Pfc. James Steele, 21, son of Mrs. Osa Waggoner, Phoenix, recently was in Japan on a rest and recuperation leave from Company A of the 24th infantry division's 21st regiment in Korea, according to an Army release. He is a rifleman and entered the Army in March, 1953, and arrived overseas last November.
