Goodrich fatally injured when their auto collided with an oil tank truck on the Wilson river highway early Friday. The couple was driving to Portland to visit James, who died that afternoon of polio in Portland isolation hospital.

Two other sons of the couple, Jerry, 6, and Joe, 8, are now staying with the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Basil Goodrich, Dallas.

The Rev. J. Davis Thomas, pastor of the Netarts Friends church, will conduct the funeral services.

Survey Shows Scientists Not Eccentric, Retiring

Chicago — (U.P.) — The notion that scientists are an eccentric and retiring lot is all wrong, a survey says.

The study, which took a year to complete, analyzed the personality traits of 514 scientific and technical staff members at Illinois Institute of Technology and the Armour Research Foundation.

They also found that the more brilliant the scientist, the more outside activities he is likely to enter. The more "retiring" scientists are apt to be the "less productive" laboratory workers.

His spectacular success and current engagement to film star Debbie Reynolds are one of the year's top Hollywood stories. Hollywood — (U.P.) — At the recent champagne engagement party of Debbie Reynolds and

"There's only one thing that worries me," mused the adviser. "What will he be like a year from now?"

Whether Eddie Fisher can hold his equilibrium with his sensational success and headlined romance is a worry among his associates.

Climbed Fast
Nine years ago Eddie was the poor son of a sidewalk vegetable peddler in South Philadelphia. He used his voice mainly to shout his father's wares in side streets and alleys.

Today, at only 24, he has an audience of 41,000,000 for his popular TV program. NBC claims his radio show is heard more than any other vocalists.

Since 1952 he has been RCA Victor's top-selling record artist. He has racked up 17 song hits including three that sold more than a million copies—"Oh, My Pa Pa," "Any Time" and "I'm Walking Behind You."

Rich, Famous and Engaged
Eddie is rich, famous, and engaged to marry a movie celebrity. The romance of the "nice, young, happy" pair has caused such a fuss that Hollywood marriage-hardened reporters groan already at the thought of covering the June wedding of the lovebirds.

Behind the scenes some Hollywood observers speculate as to how long the wonder lad can keep his winning streak. As one columnist remarked, "The kid is wholeheartedly in love with his good fortune. He's having a ball. But his feet haven't started hurting yet. He has yet to face the brass tacks of life."

Mamie Didn't Like Him
Show business is an uneven existence. Eddie is one of the golden boys who hits the entertainment world once a decade. Frank Sinatra, perhaps, was the last. After a similar success he hit unhappy snags; so did Dick Haymes.

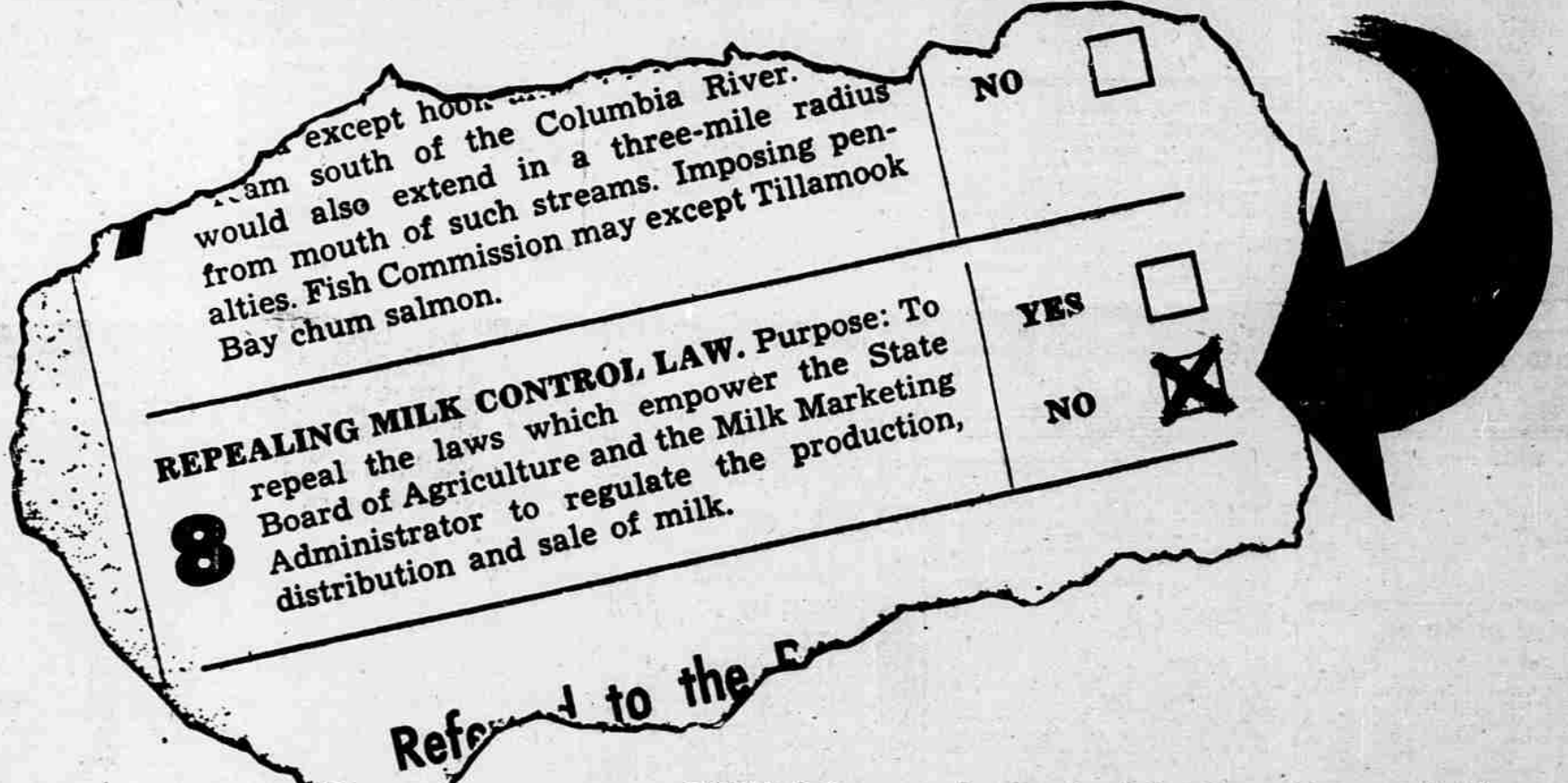
Last spring Eddie was accused of "getting too big for his britches." Once he visited Mocambo nightclub with sexy starlet Mamie Van Doren and crossly refused to pose for photographers. He left the club alone to pick up his car, asking Mamie to meet him outside. She did—to find Eddie parked across the street yelling, "Come on, hop in." Miss Van Doren snapped to friends, "This kid isn't grown-up enough for me," and never dated him again.

Called 'Cocky Kid'
Eddie was sized up by one columnist as "a cocky kid who never remembers you." But in recent months he has leveled off and appears gracious to reporters and co-workers. One friend says his romance with Debbie helped "because he has to share the limelight with her."

"I love everything this girl wears, says, thinks or does," Eddie beamed at his engagement party. When a reporter inquired if he would like her if she wasn't a movie star, he replied firmly, "Yes!"

Eddie wears a perpetually happy, friendly air and frankly says about his fame, "I love every minute of it." But his colleagues agree he is "a smart show business operator" who had an intense drive to be a star.
