

'Marginal' Districts To Determine Result Of Tuesday Election

Washington — (U.P.)—The decision voters make in what politicians call "marginal"—or balance of power—districts will determine largely whether the Republicans or Democrats win control of the House of Representatives in Tuesday's balloting.

The "marginal districts" are those that sometimes go Republican and sometimes Democratic.

'Cop Killer' Slain By Chicago Police Ending Wide Hunt

Chicago — (U.P.) — "Cop killer" Agostino Gus Amedeo, his body riddled by 18 bullets, lay in county morgue today. He died in a gutter Friday night to end one of the greatest manhunts in Chicago history.

Amedeo lost his personal war with the Chicago Police Department only eight days after he killed a policeman while shooting his way out of a trap.

Fifty-eight grimly revengeful officers cornered the 26-year-old fugitive on a North Side intersection. Amedeo got in the first shots — two of them. Then he staggered crazily across the street under a rain of bullets and fell dead.

Detective Lt. Frank Pape, leader of the police detail and one of the most feared policemen in Chicago, called up central headquarters and said with quiet satisfaction: "I got him."

Biggest Manhunt
Amedeo became the object of Chicago's biggest manhunt in recent years when, on Oct. 21, he killed Police Officer Charles Annerino. Annerino and two other officers had trapped Amedeo, an escaped convict, in a tavern.

Ironically, he was lured to his death by the sister-in-law of the woman who smuggled a gun to him in the Criminal Courts Building last June, enabling him to escape.

Nixon's Food Found Not To Be Poisoned

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — A laboratory analysis of a supper which Vice-President Richard M. Nixon ordered in his hotel room here Saturday night showed today that it contained no poison.

An anonymous caller telephoned Nixon Saturday evening and warned him his supper had been poisoned. When the meal arrived at his room in the Benjamin Franklin Hotel, Secret Service agents took it away to be analyzed.

Nixon said before his departure for Denver yesterday on his campaign tour that he believed the warning was the work of a Halloween prankster. Authorities were unable to trace the call which came from outside the hotel.

Secret Service agents, who supervised preparation of a second supper for Nixon Saturday night, questioned several hotel employees, but no one was held.

Surplus Farm Crops Scheduled for Sale

Washington — (U.P.) — The Agriculture department will sell \$60,000,000 worth of surplus farm crops to Yugoslavia and Pakistan under a new surplus disposal program.

The department has announced that Pakistan will buy \$47,000,000 worth of surpluses and Yugoslavia, \$13,000,000. Officials have not given a breakdown by commodities, but wheat and cotton were said to be the chief crops involved.

Wife, Son Murdered By California Man

Lancaster, Calif. — (U.P.) — A mailman shot and killed his estranged wife and 16-year-old stepson and critically wounded his stepdaughter Saturday because he blamed the children for breaking up the marriage, the sheriff's office reported.

Oscar Hugo Brust, 45, a Lancaster postman, admitted the shootings and then calmly told sheriff's deputies:

"I have no regrets."
Killed were Brust's wife, Mildred Jean, 40, and her son, Curtis Charles Johnson, 16. Critically wounded and not expected to live was the woman's daughter, Kay Marie Johnson, 15.

Hamlet Hopes To Be First To Cast Ballots

Hart's Location, N.H. — (U.P.) — This tiny White Mountain hamlet tonight hopes to become the first in the nation to cast ballots in the 1954 general elections.

The mountain folk will gather around an oval table in the parlor of selectman Cornelius Griffin's newly painted home. At the stroke of midnight they plan to vote, by the light of flickering kerosene lamps.

"We're all set. We plan to finish voting at one minute past 12," Griffin said and was sure has community would win momentary fame as it did in the 1948 presidential election. The town has 11 eligible voters.

Carnegie Award Go To 31 Across U. S.

Pittsburgh — (U.P.) — The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission Saturday cited 31 women, men, and teenaged boys and girls who risked their lives to save others with the top award going to a Florida trucker who dived into a canal among alligators and poisonous snakes to save a drowning girl.

The commission, whose agents roam the country throughout the year to verify acts of bravery, gave its infrequently awarded Silver Medal to Theodore Henderson Sr., 39, Tampa, Fla., for rescuing Carol Baisden, 19, from her automobile which overturned into 12 feet of water at Yeehaw, Fla., Aug. 17, 1953.

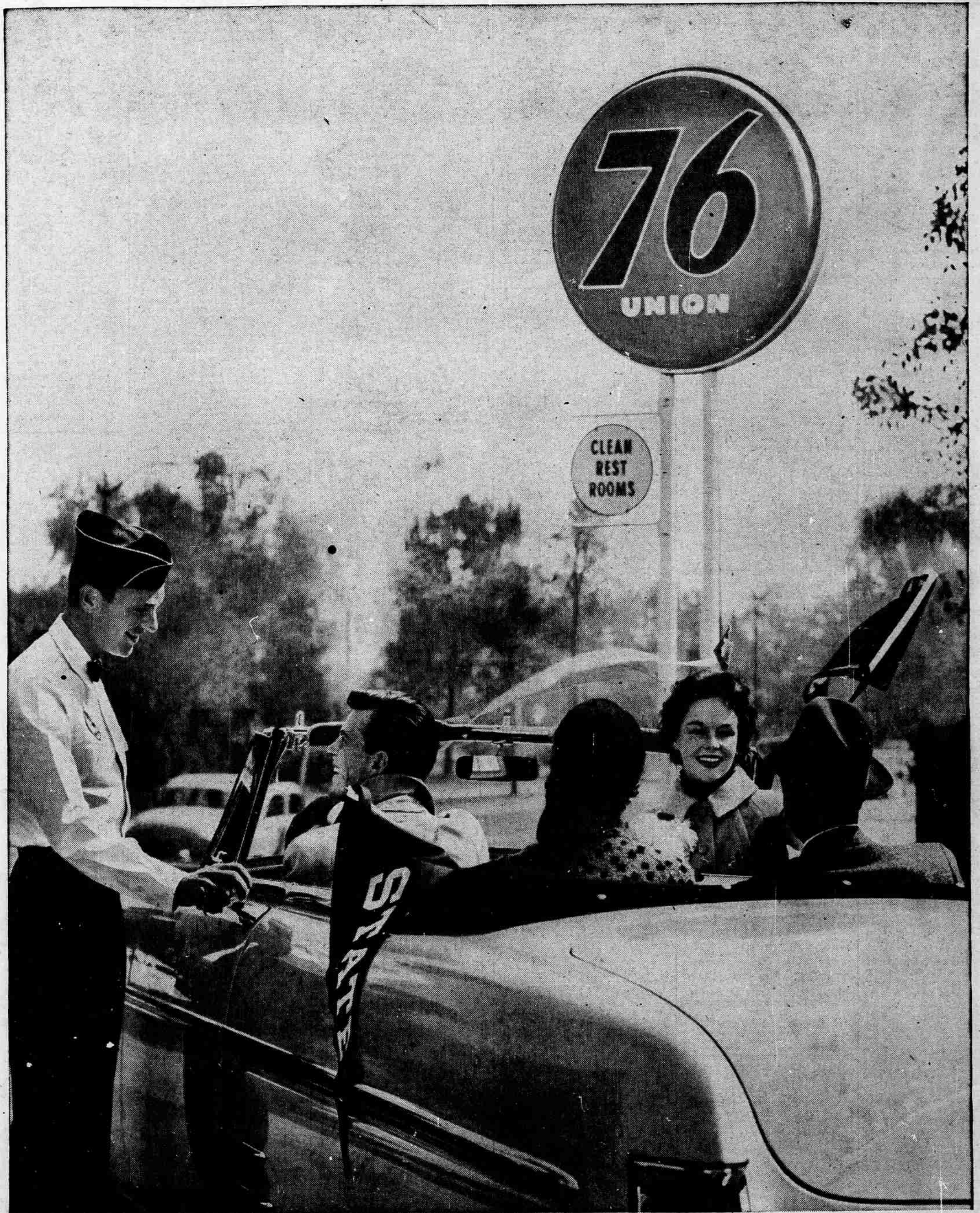
