Drivers Mourn Death of Shaw

Indianapolis, Ind. — (U.P.) — Drivers and auto racing officials paid tribute today to Wilbur Shaw, three-time winner of the 500 mile Indianapolis Memorial Day race, who died in a weekend plane crash.

"I don't know how he can be replaced," said Tony Bettenhausen, former national driving champion.

Anton Hulman, owner of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway of which Shaw was president and general manager, said the auto and racing world lost a "dynamic constructive and aggressive character whose heart and soul were in doing something for other people."

Won Three Times

Shaw, one of only two men to win the 500-mile classic three times, died when the light plane in which he was a passenger crashed in a snowstorm near Decatur, Ind. He would have been 52 Sunday.

Artist Ernest Rose, a long-time friend, and Ray Grimes, charter pilot of the plane, were killed with Shaw.

Dispute Ties Up Ships at Portland

Portland — (U.P.) — Two ships were tied up here today after their crews walked out in sympathy with the Sailor's Union of the Pacific in its jurisdictional Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union at San Pedro, Calif.

SUP members refused to man the Matson Navigation company's Hawaiian Logger yesterday when it was scheduled to move down the Columbia to Longview, Wash., to continue loading lumber. Sailors also would not board the Grace Line's Santa Elisa, which was scheduled to sail for Coos Bay.

William Benz, SUP agent here, said the tie-ups were in protest "of the fact that the Pacific Maritime Association continues to fool around with the ILWA, which is not recognized as a union by the government." He said the San Pedro dispute revolves around the Pacificus, a Coastwise Line vessel.

Fort Lewis Soldier Killed in Accident

Kelso, Wash. — (U.P.) — A 21-year-old, Douglas, Ga., soldier stationed at Ft. Lewis was killed early Sunday morning in a one-car highway accident in which five other persons escaped injury.

Henry Woods was thrown from the vehicle when it went out of control on highway 99 north of Castle Rock and overturned. The driver, Clarence E. Baumgardner, also stationed at Ft. Lewis, told state patrol officers he went to sleep at the wheel of the auto.

Two other soldiers and two Tacoma, Wash., girls were also in the car but were unhurt. The vehicle was en route from Portland, Ore., to Tacoma.

Brazilians Threat To Yank Hoopers

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil — (U.P.) — Brazil rated as the chief threat to the heavily-favored United States team today in the final round of the World Amateur Basketball championships.

Brazil and the U. S. team—the Peoria, Ill., Caterpillars—are the only teams unbeaten in the round-robin final round of the championships in which each of the eight teams play each other once. The co-leaders each have three games to go, including one against each other on Friday, the final night of the tourney.

Games scheduled tonight are: United States vs. China, Brazil vs. France, and Canada vs. Philippines.

Portland Staters Shove EOCE Into Cellar Alone

Oregon Collegiate Conference ratings were unchanged by last weekend's games, as Portland State and Eastern Oregon battled for the cellar in the only conference game played.

Eastern Oregon, hampered by a weak line, bowed 27-13 to the Vikings at Portland to establish a 0-3 conference claim for last place. Oregon College of Education folded 19-6 to Pacific university in a non-league match Saturday night, while Oregon Tech blasted Olympic JC 32-6 Friday night. Southern Oregon was idle.

Only one conference game is on tap again this weekend, with OCE matching its 1-1 mark against the winless Mountaineers at La Grande. The league-leading Oregon Tech Owls host Lassen, Calif. Junior College and Portland State will play the visiting Los Angeles City College eleven. Southern Oregon invades California to play Chico State.

Neuberger Cites Official Record To Prove Charge False

Portland, Ore. — (Special) — To the Editor.—In your paper for Tuesday, Oct. 19, Frank Jenkins wrote a column accusing me of voting against the 1951 legislative bill to prevent diversion of Oregon water to California.

This is an outright falsehood—done to embarrass me on the eve of election. Evidently Mr. Jenkins thought it would be too late for the facts to be disclosed before Nov. 2, 1954.

I count on the fair play and alertness of the editor of the Mail-Tribune to help me set the record straight.

House Bill 661, seeking to avoid the diversion of Oregon water, passed the State Senate on April 28, 1951. I am recorded as voting FOR passage of the bill. (Page 249, Official Senate Journals).

On May 3, 1951, the Senate concurred in House amendments and re-passed the bill. I am recorded as voting FOR re-passing of the bill. (Page 284, Official Senate Journals).

It is true that I objected to certain phases of the bill in its original form, because I feared that they made the bill unconstitutional. My objections induced William E. Marsh, a Republican and ex-President of the Senate, to move that the bill be sent to the Committee on Law. That committee, consisting of six Republicans and one Democrat, then included in the bill many of the changes which I had proposed—in order to render it secure against attacks of unconstitutionality in the courts.

Yet Mr. Jenkins wrote in your paper the bald, flat statement that I voted against the Bill on final passage. This statement by Mr. Jenkins is a complete and utter falsehood, as the Official Senate Journal proves.

In a way, it is good to have the tactics and methods of the Cordon backers revealed. They will voice any misstatement which they think they can get away with.

This is of a piece with Cordon's recent claim at Coquille that he (Cordon) didn't vote for the Bricker amendment. Well, if he didn't, then neither did Bricker! Cordon and Bricker and the other Senate isolationists voted together on all six major Bricker amendment rollcalls—exactly in the manner opposed by Dwight Eisenhower.

Yet the Cordon bumper strips say: "Back Ike — Elect Cordon." Richard L. Neuberger, Oregon State Senator.

Regional Session Set for November 6

A regional conference for the purpose of fostering a better understanding of public education as it affects teachers, administrators, school board members and lay people, will be held in Medford Lincoln school Nov. 6, committee chairmen have announced. Delegates from five southern Oregon counties will attend. "Are We Interpreting Public Education?" is the theme selected. Speakers will include Dr. Harry E. Dillin, president of Linfield college, and all delegates will participate in discussion groups.

American Families Said Saving More Money

Chicago — (U.P.) — American families are saving more money this year than last.

The United States Savings and Loan league reported that net savings receipts after withdrawals of the nation's saving association amounted to an estimated \$1,679,000,000 during the first five months of 1954. This was a rise of 17 per cent over the same period last year. It was also the biggest increase on record for the first five months of any year.

Destroyers, Sub Collide at Sea

Norfolk, Va. — (U.P.) — Three U. S. destroyers and a submarine, involved in two separate collisions during Atlantic maneuvers yesterday, proceeded to port today for repairs.

There were no casualties in the collision. The Navy immediately began an investigation. The mishaps occurred in choppy waters.

The destroyer Norris, out of Newport, R. I., crashed into the submarine Buggall, out of New London, Conn., about 3:30 a. m. yesterday about 270 miles each of Norfolk.

Less than two hours later the destroyers, W. L. Lynd and the English, both from Norfolk, collided about 40 miles south of the first mishap.

All of the damaged ships were proceeding to ports under their own power and none was in danger, the Navy said.

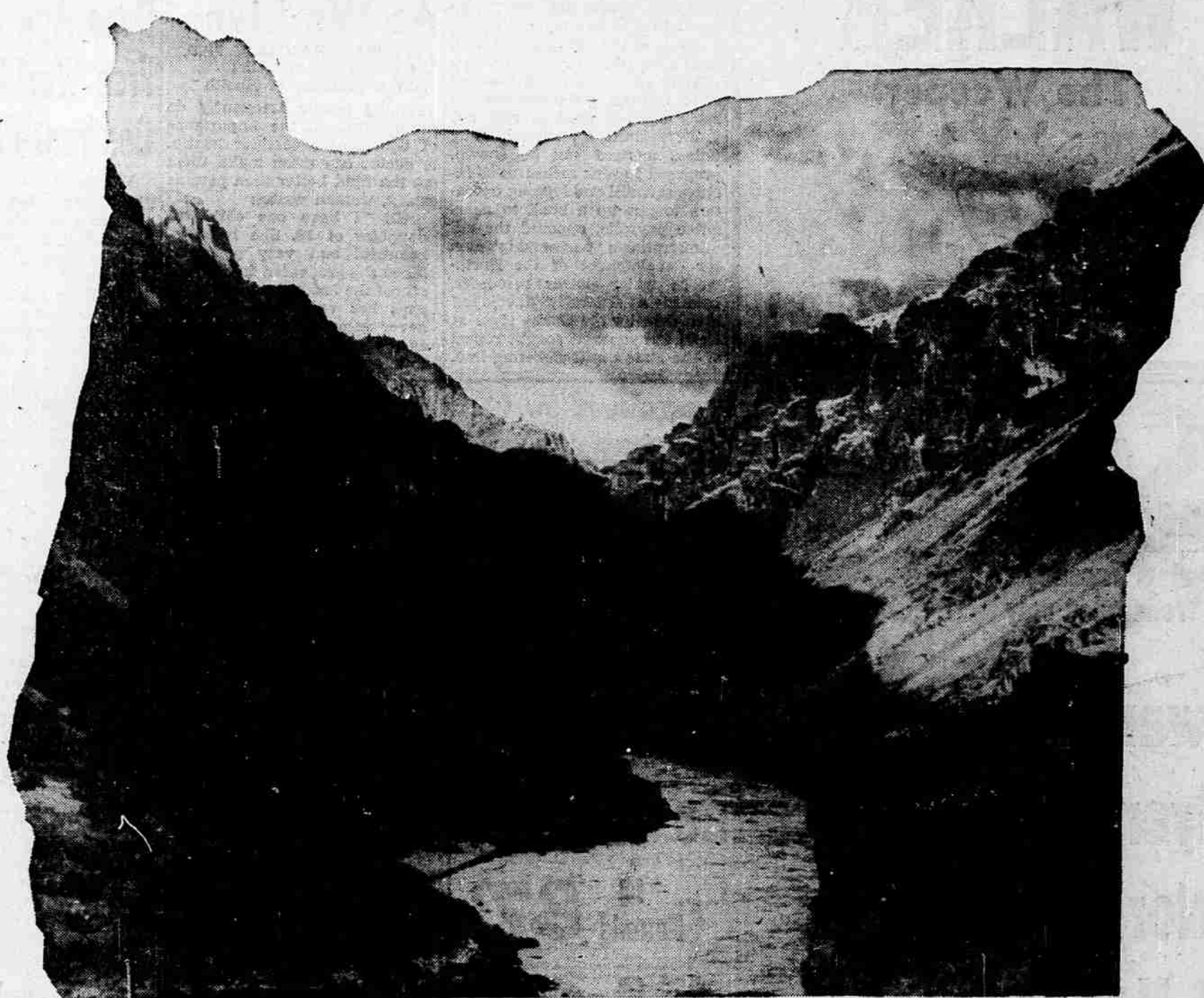
