

Philip Lowry Is Speaker for Local Chapter

"Are We Keeping Our Freedom?" was the topic of Philip B. Lowry, candidate for the office of state senator, when he spoke for the last meeting of Crater Lake chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. The session was held at Girls Community club.

Mr. Lowry's talk was of special interest to the members, since he is a son of the late Mrs. B. B. Lowry, Oregon DAR regent in 1938, and since he had been a pupil of several members while attending Medford schools.

Mr. Lowry traced the growth of the idea of personal freedom from its beginning in the Republic of Greece to the present. He said that while it was difficult at any particular time to point to a given freedom, it is always possible to look back and see that we had something that did not exist at any earlier time.

Although individuals may fear that we are losing our freedom, the progress that the world has made in the past points to a firm faith in the future, the speaker said.

Mrs. O. H. Brenneman presented a memorial in honor of the late Mrs. Frances H. Cochran, regent of Crater Lake chapter in 1926 who was termed a faithful worker in the affairs of the chapter until her death.

The general theme of the meeting was "Patriotism in our Homes" and Mrs. Ray K. Bailey gave an interesting talk on the exchange student program. A paper on civil defense, prepared by Mrs. Earl Bradfish, was read.

Portland, Me. — (U.P.) — Bette Davis' third husband, Rockport artist William G. Sherry, is suing the actress for \$1750 he says she owes him in back alimony payments.

Sherry, a former boxer, said in a Superior Court civil suit filed here that Miss Davis agreed in a 1950 divorce settlement to pay him \$250 a month for 10 years or until he died.

He said she promised to pay him alimony for four years in case he re-married, which he has done. His suit charges she owes him payments for seven months, from last December through June.

The actress and Sherry were divorced at Juarez, Mexico, in 1950, after five years of marriage.

North Myrtle Creek Claims Hearings End

Roseburg — (U.P.) — A Bureau of Land Management hearing ended here yesterday in which the government has sought to invalidate several mining claims on North Myrtle creek.

The hearing was conducted by Robert T. Felton of Portland, hearing officer for the bureau. He said a decision would be expected in about a month.

Opposing the government in the case were Leo A. Craget, R. G. Dieckman and Mrs. Nora Ingman Kuehn, holders of three mining claims eight miles east of Myrtle Creek.

Felton said the action was brought because Craget had refused to allow the Umpqua Plywood corporation to use an access road crossing the claim. A decision in favor of the government would declare the lands non-mineral and prohibit further mining.

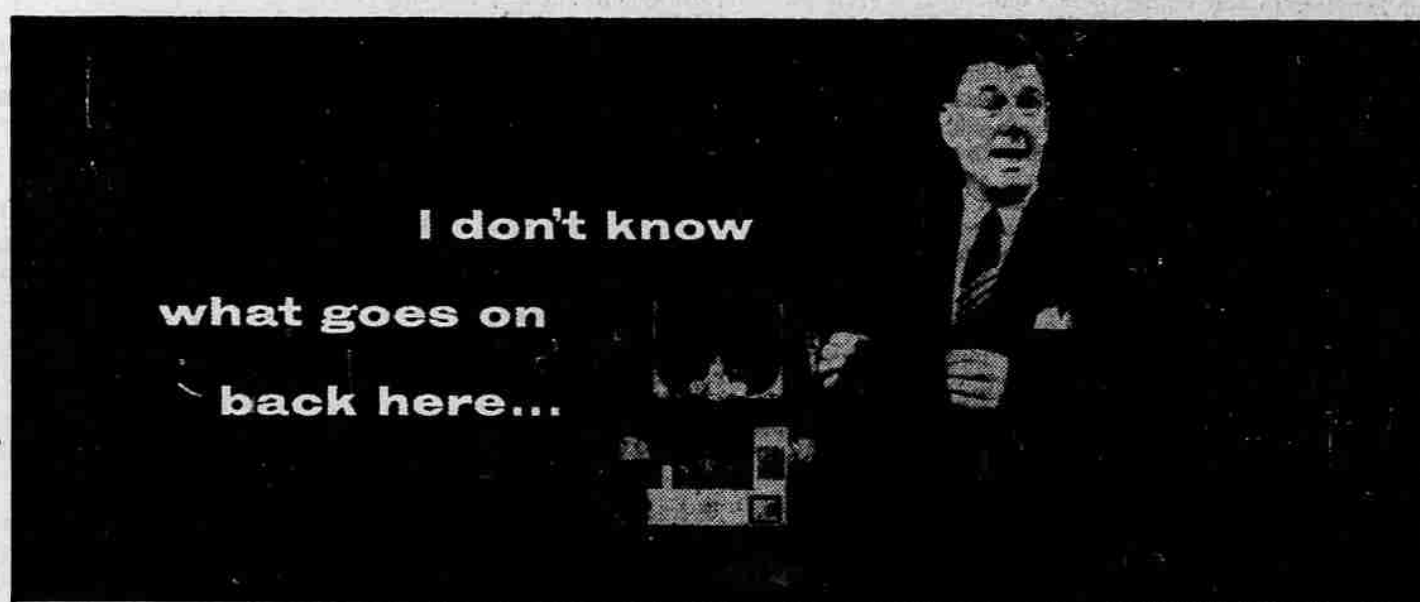
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
