Washington—(U.P.)—Vice-President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon plan to leave by air this afternoon for a brief vacation in Florida, his office said today.

The vice-president expects to be incommunicado after the election in a rented cottage at Key Biscayne.

Spokesmen in his office said they are not sure when Nixon will return. Presumably, however, he will want to be here for the Senate session starting Monday.

'Better Schools' Conference Slated Here Saturday

A regional "better schools conference" will be held at Lincoln school here Saturday, from 1 to 4:30 p.m., according to Viola Pomeroy, Eagle Point, chairman of the committee in charge.

The conference is under the sponsorship of the department of classroom teachers of the Oregon Education association, and will be attended by delegates from Jackson, Josephine, Lake, Klamath and Douglas counties. The purpose is to foster a better understanding of public education as it affects teachers, administrators, school board members and others.

A program has been planned around the conference theme, "Are We Interpreting Public Education?" Dr. Harry E. Dillin, president of Linfield college, will speak, and there will be discussion groups concerned with the ways of improving parent-teacher relationships and understanding. A panel will present the ideas of the discussion groups, summarizing the ideas and opinions given.

Couple Charged With Manslaughter

Cathlamet, Wash. —(U.P.)—A young Cathlamet, Wash., couple was charged with manslaughter yesterday in connection with the death of their three-month-old son here last Wednesday.

Prosecuting Attorney Mitchell Doumit filed an information in the Wahkiakum County Superior Court charging that John Peter and Charlotte Hart, both 18, kept the baby in a "condition of filth and contamination and failed to provide proper care."

Dr. Charles P. Larson, Tacoma specialist in criminal pathology, performed an autopsy with two Cathlamet physicians as observers. He said death was due to multiple-infected skin ulcers brought on by neglect, and bronchial pneumonia.

Doumit, who was called to the Hart home in downtown Cathlamet Wednesday morning by Dr. T. O. Manning, called in the pathologist. Dr. Larson estimated the child had been dead about nine hours when Dr. Manning was summoned.

The Hart couple told police officers they returned home early Wednesday morning and found the baby apparently sleeping quietly. Superior Court Judge John J. Langenbach fixed bail at \$1000 apiece. No date for arraignment was set.

Painless Method Removes Tattoos

Melbourne — (U.P.)—Tattooing is going out of fashion here, and business was never better for the skilled tattoo remover.

Use of a new French method for the painless removal of tattoos has become so popular that two Melbourne grandmothers, each with a tattooed ankle of swallows, have decided to part with their tattoo marks. The method is painless and leaves no scar.

A leading physiotherapist explained that the method he uses to remove tattoos freezes the area around the mark. This causes an irritation beneath the skin which rises, bringing out the tattoo pigment. Within a week or two the skin heals and the tattoo is gone.

The physiotherapist declined to give his name on the ground of professional ethics. He explained the anti-tattoo trend with a terse, "Men don't like them on women, and women don't like them on men."

Many of the people who call to have their tattoos removed shyly reveal that the "Gorgeous Grace" or "Big Jim" have to come off because the husband or wife, as the case may be, want no former attachments around in tattoos.

The physiotherapist blames American servicemen, nearly 2,000,000 of whom visited Australia during World War II, for Melbourne's tattooed women. He classified most of the designs on the women as "American," explaining tattoo styles run to different designs in different countries. Furthermore, he added, most of the women who come to him were between 16 and 20 years old at the time the Yanks were here.

Pact Said Step in Printing Industry

Rochester, N. Y. —(U.P.)—A new agreement in the graphic arts field between Columbia University and the Rochester Institute of Technology is being hailed as a step forward within the printing industry for college graduates with a liberal arts background as well as technical competence.

Beginning with the 1945-55 academic year, students from RIT's department of printing will be able to receive the Columbia degree of bachelor of fine arts after completion of additional requirements in liberal arts courses. The arrangement will run for three years.

Under the program, RIT students will be allowed to transfer credits in technical printing courses towards the graphic arts requirements for the B.F.A. degree.

A printing industry leader, Thomas R. Jones, president of Daystrom, Inc., who is chairman of the Graphic Arts Center program at Columbia, calls the program an encouragement to "young men to recognize the potential of the graphic arts as a career possibility," and predicts that it "should improve the qualifications of personnel which will be available to the industry."

Film Stars Asked To Prepare Shows

Hollywood —(U.P.)—President Eisenhower has asked film stars to "give again the gift which only they can take to the armed forces abroad" during the Christmas holidays by presenting camp shows.

The President made his request yesterday in a letter to George Murphy, president of the Hollywood Coordinating committee.

The President said he understood the Department of Defense had asked the committee to repeat the program of star tours which during the past three years "made such an important contribution to the morale of the armed forces stationed overseas."

"I have personally seen on innumerable occasions the tremendous good that comes from these visits," he said. "These people have the power to bring something of home and of relaxation to the places where wars are fought and where troops must endure the monotony of occupation duty in the aftermath of war."

David Teeple Quits As Straus Assistant

Washington —(U.P.)—David S. Teeple has resigned as special assistant to Chairman Lewis L. Straus of the Atomic Energy commission after a behind the scenes controversy over his appointment, it was reported today.

Teeple, formerly was a security officer of the wartime Manhattan district, which developed the atomic bomb, and later was a member of the staff of the House-Senate Atomic Energy committee in 1947 and 1948.

He was a close adviser to Sen. Burke B. Hickenlooper (R-Ia.) in 1949 when the congressional committee investigated Hickenlooper's charge of "incredible mismanagement" by the AEC's first chairman, David E. Lilienthal. The Democratic majority of the committee cleared Lilienthal.

Petersons Honored By Staff Members

Salem —(U.P.)—One hundred staff members of the State Agriculture Department honored director E. L. Peterson and Mrs. Peterson at a luncheon yesterday.

Peterson will close his work as director of agriculture Nov. 10 and he will be in Washington, D. C., Nov. 15 to become assistant secretary of agriculture under Ezra T. Benson.

Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry, presided at a brief program, and W. E. Upshaw, manager of the Portland branch office, presented a parting gift from Peterson's fellow workers. McKennon and Upshaw are the oldest members in point of service on Peterson's administrative staff.

Bathtub Mariner Faces Juan de Fuca

Port Angeles, Wash. —(U.P.)—Roy Bergo, 50, the bathtub mariner, faced both the strait of Juan de Fuca and aloof Canadian officials today in his king-sized trip to Alaska in a baby-size bathtub.

The former prison guard made the 23 miles from Washington harbor and chugged into port here yesterday afternoon in a little more than seven hours. His "vessel" is powered by an outboard motor and is held upright by stovepipe pontoons.

Bergo said he planned to tackle the 20-mile stretch to Victoria, B.C., as soon as he could get clearance. The Coast Guard has said he must have an escort across the dangerous strait.

Humphrey Sees 1955 Good Year

Washington —(U.P.)—Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey predicted last night that employment, income and trade in 1955 will go higher than in 1954 which he called "the best peacetime year in history."

In an election eve statement, Humphrey said "reports of improving business and employment are multiplying." He cited previously published reports by the Commerce and Labor Department and the National Association of Purchasing Agents.

Earlier, Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell declared that "widespread unemployment" in West Virginia is the fault of the Eisenhower administration and not the state's two Democratic senators.

Mitchell made public a telegram he sent to Sen. Matthews M. Neely, a Democratic candidate for reelection, deploring what Mitchell called Republican attempts to blame Neely for unemployment in the state.

Mitchell quoted Labor Department figures to show that unemployment has increased in other states that have Republican senators.
