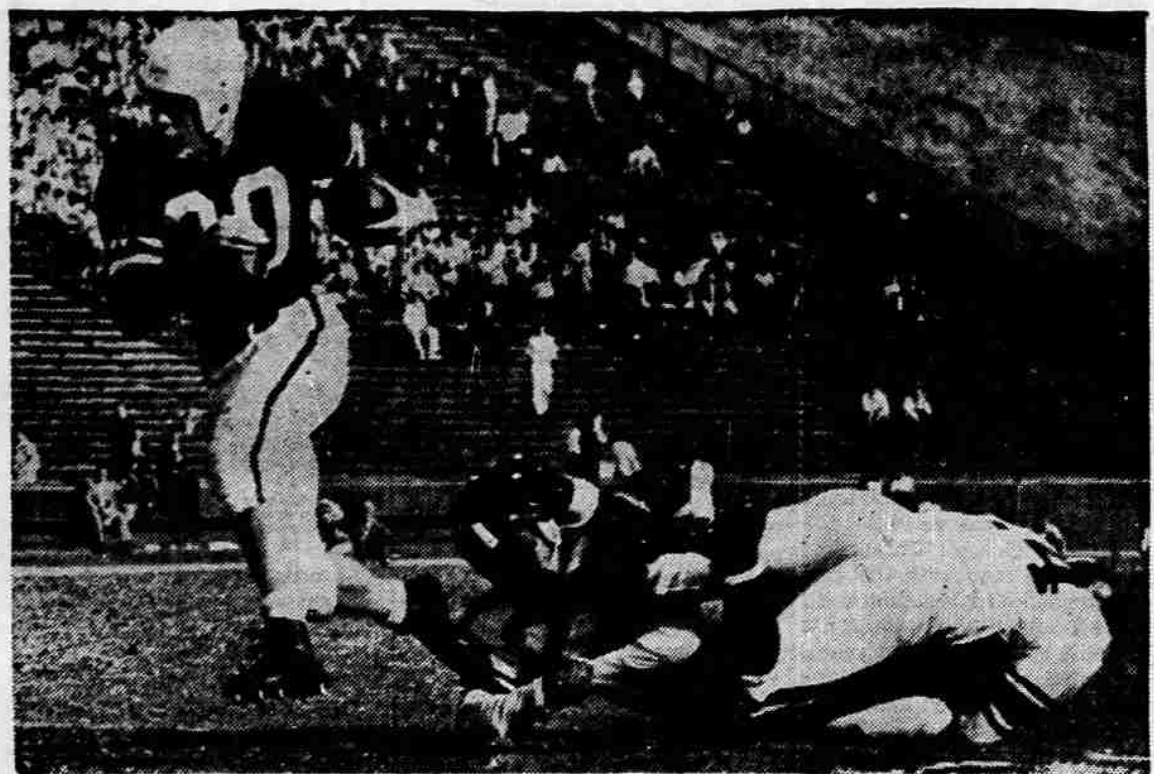

Beavers Open Casaba Drills; 10 Players Back

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Ten members of last year's championship northern division basketball squad were on hand yesterday for Oregon State's initial practice session of the 1954-55 campaign.

Some 18 candidates reported to Coach Slat Gill for the workout, including eight varsity lettermen and two non-lettermen from last year's Beaver squad, and five members of the freshman squad last year.

Wade "Swede" Halbrook, all-Pacific Coast selection last year, will be ineligible for the team until next semester because of scholastic deficiencies.

Beaver veterans include Tex Whiteman, Bill Toole and Ron Robins, who have earned three varsity letters, and Reggie Halligan, Ron Fundingland, Tony Vlastelica and Johnny Jarboe with two letters.

The Beavers open their pre-conference season against the University of Hawaii Dec. 1st at Corvallis.

Fernandez Has Brooks Buzzing Over Chico

Brooklyn — (U.P.) — Chico Fernandez, "on a par with Chico Carasquel right now," had the Brooklyn Dodgers front office making a lot of optimistic 1955 plans today, including the transfer of veteran PeeWee Reese over to second base.

The fancy-fielding, 21-year-old Fernandez "will be even better than Carrasquel in two or three years," according to players who competed against him in the International League last season and those who are seeing him for the first time in the Cuban Winter-league now.

Coach-Johnny Cherberg said sophomore right halfback Jim Thomas, who tore some ligaments in his left knee against the Ducks, is a "doubtful starter" against the Golden Bears.

DUKE MAY BE OUT
Pullman, Wash. — (U.P.) — Senior fullback Duke Washington of the Washington State Cougars may not see action against the Michigan State Spartans Saturday, according to Coach Al Kircher.

Washington suffered a sprained ankle during WSC's 30-20 victory over the Stanford Indians last week and was not able to suit up for practice yesterday. However, ends Don Gest and Ed Clark, injured early in the game Saturday, were back in uniform.

PIERCE TO PLAY
San Jose, Calif. — (U.P.) — First string quarterback Benny Pierce should be ready for action Saturday night when the San Jose State Spartans tangle with the College of Pacific Tigers at Stockton.

Coach Bob Bronzman said Pierce suffered a hip pointer in a "brutal collision" with George Veit in the first play of the game against North Texas State last week. Veit suffered a broken neck, and his team was defeated, 27-20, led by the San Jos esquad.

BEARS INJURED
Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Coach Lynn Pappy Waldorf counted at least six injuries on his University of California squad yesterday as a result of the 27-6 setback suffered last week end at the hands of the rugged Bruins of UCLA.

He said the most seriously injured were reserve left halfback Tom Kramer, who suffered a sprained ankle, and Ted Granger, sophomore fullback who sprained his ankle. Both men will be out of action against the Washington Huskies Saturday.
