Mysterious Disappearance Of Major Remains Unsolved

Raleigh, N. C. — (U.P.) — The Army has closed one chapter in one of the most baffling mysteries and still unsolved disappearance of Maj. Robert Roy Clark.

After more than 10 years, Clark has been declared officially dead. But Army officials indicated they will never close the files in the Clark case until the truth is known.

Investigators have found during a decade only a few, futile clues to what happened to the 33-year-old intelligence officer of the eastern defense command.

Clark walked out of a drug store here, entered his cream-colored coupe and drove off toward Fort Bragg, N. C. 55 miles away, on March 17, 1944. Then he vanished utterly.

Almost eight months to the day after he disappeared, a hunter stumbled across something skillfully camouflaged in thick woods near Raleigh, N. C. Ripping off branches and limbs that made it invisible at 15 feet, the hunter found Clark's car covered with blankets.

The person who had hidden the car obviously had expert training in the art of camouflage.

Inside the car were Clark's uniforms, books, papers and an Army rifle. Hidden nearby in the underbrush were two overnight bags.

Many Reports
There were no indications of foul play; nothing to indicate what happened to Clark.

The Army denied rumors that he was sent on a highly secret mission or had security information.

In the 10 years that followed, Army CID and FBI agents tracked down reports that he joined the merchant marine, took an assumed name to volunteer for overseas service, or that he joined the Canadian forces. No basis for these reports was ever turned up.

Clark was a bachelor with no serious love interests. He left only a few distant relatives. He was sober, industrious, friendly and highly intelligent.

Affairs in Order
While stationed here, Clark lived in the home of John A. Park, publisher of the Raleigh Times. A check revealed his personal affairs in order and that he intended to return to Raleigh from Fort Bragg.

Clark was born Nov. 15, 1910, and had lived most of his life in Hackensack, N. J. Before being commissioned, he worked as a reporter and a copy desk.

Amateur Inventors Making Work Safer

Fort Hood, Tex. — (U.P.) — Amateur inventors in the battalion maintenance shops of the First Armored Division are making their work easier and safer by designing gimmicks, gadgets and contraptions.

One of the busiest is Cpl. Jerry Kosik, of East Bernard, Tex., who designed a mount to carry a mortar in an M-75 armored personnel carrier.

It was so successful that it was approved by the division and was adopted by all armored

infantry battalions in the First Armored.

He also developed a blackout box for field ranges so cooks can prepare meals in the dark without giving away their position. Kosik is now working on a jack to take the hull doors off M-75's.

"It's all the two men can do to lift one of the doors, and they can't set one back in place without help," he explained.

Cpl. Leroy Pederson of Oregon, Ill., has put his welder's

arc to use in making several valuable pieces of equipment, including a torsion bar puller, a tow bar to pull jeeps that won't start, an iron pipe rack to hold oil barrels and stands to hold truck wheels off the ground during repairs.

Pfc. Bobby J. Dobbs of Tulsa, Okla., a turret mechanic, has made several special wrenches for working on the traversing system of an M-41 Walker Bulldog tank.

Archeologists Find Cache of War Relics

Albany, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Archeologists working on the Fort William Henry restoration project at Lake George Village have unearthed a cache of French and Indian War relics.

The archeologists were digging in the cellar of the 200-year-old fort when they discovered a Tower musket bayonet, a large padlock, spikes which had held the fortress logs together, a Rogers Rangers hatchet head, a hewing axe and a trench shovel.
