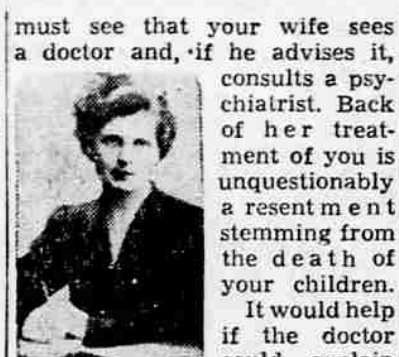

Blames Spouse for Death Of Her Three Children

Breaking up a marriage means even more unhappiness to an older person than it does to a younger one. A man writes:

(Q) "I am 57 years old and have been married for 34 years. We had three children but they all died when they were young. My wife nags and blames me for everything. She calls me names and even strikes me. I am retired on a disability pension for nerves and loss of sight in one eye. Her treatment is making a nervous wreck of me. She acts as if she hates me, and I know she blames me for the death of our children. I know she needs psychiatric care but I cannot get her to a doctor. I have stood her treatment for 34 years but I can't take it now. Yet I love her very much and don't want to leave her. Can you advise me?"

(A) Somehow or other, you

must see that your wife sees a doctor and, if he advises it, consults a psychiatrist. Back of her treatment of you is unquestionably a resentment stemming from the death of your children. It would help if the doctor could explain to her what caused the death of your children and let her see that you were not to blame in any way. That would help eliminate her resentment toward you. It would also help if your minister would talk to her.

Because you are retired, you are at home more than you would otherwise be. This causes you and your wife to get on each other's nerves and intensify existing resentments. Ask your doctor to suggest some activity, such as a hobby, that would keep you busy and out of the house part of the time. It would be good for your nerves to have something to occupy you and even better for your relationship with your wife.

You are very wise not to want to break up your marriage now. If you did, you and she would face a very lonely old age. It does not mean, on the other hand, that you should tolerate things as they are. I am sure you can improve the situation that now exists by calling on professional help.

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Business Planes Outnumber Airlines

Washington — (U.P.) — American business has taken to the skies in such numbers that today's fleet of business planes is almost 17 times larger than that operated by the nation's fleet of domestic airlines.

In fact, according to Planes, official publication of the Aircraft Industries Association, U.S. businesses own almost twice as many large, multi-engine transport planes as do the scheduled domestic airlines.

Latest figures show that business planes now number 21,500 — of which 2,437 are multi-engine, and 19,063 are single-engine. Aircraft on scheduled airlines total 1,269.

The industry publication says the sharp rise in use of aircraft by corporations and professional men, as well as by small businesses, has made this type of flying one of the major factors in the U.S. civil aviation picture.

Last year, these business planes spent an estimated 6,450,000 hours in the air, covering approximately 903,000,000 miles on business trips. This compares with a total of about 525,000,000 plane miles flown by the scheduled airlines, although the commercial airlines carry tremendously larger numbers of passengers.

Bible Program Head Slates Visit Here Thursday Morning

Dr. Gerald A. Larue, Berkeley, Calif., who recently was appointed by the Oregon Council of Churches to direct a five-year program to encourage greater use and understanding of the Bible, will visit Medford Thursday.

A meeting with local church leaders, ministers and representatives of the Medford Council of Church Women has been arranged for 10 a.m. at the Presbyterian church. Dr. Larue will explain several projects which have been worked out by various interdenominational leaders, designed to promote reading and understanding of the Bible.

Cooperative Work
The program which Dr. Larue heads will reach into many communities where individual church denominations, operating within the council, will cooperate to carry it out. The overall project will be directed from Portland, where Dr. Larue former church editor of the Oakland Tribune, will have his offices. He began the job Nov. 1.

Under the plan, according to a council bulletin, local pastors, church workers, and laymen will unite on such inter-church, Bible-centered programs as Bible film festivals, church-guided family worship, courses for lay readers, and Bible hymn festivals.

Church Leader

Dr. Larue has been a leader in church interdenominational work for several years, and is a recognized Biblical authority. Until last March he was a lecturer in Old and New Testament at the Berkeley seminary. A graduate of the University of Alberta, he holds the doctor of theology degree from the Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, and also graduated from St. Stephen's Theological Seminary in Edmonton, Alta.
