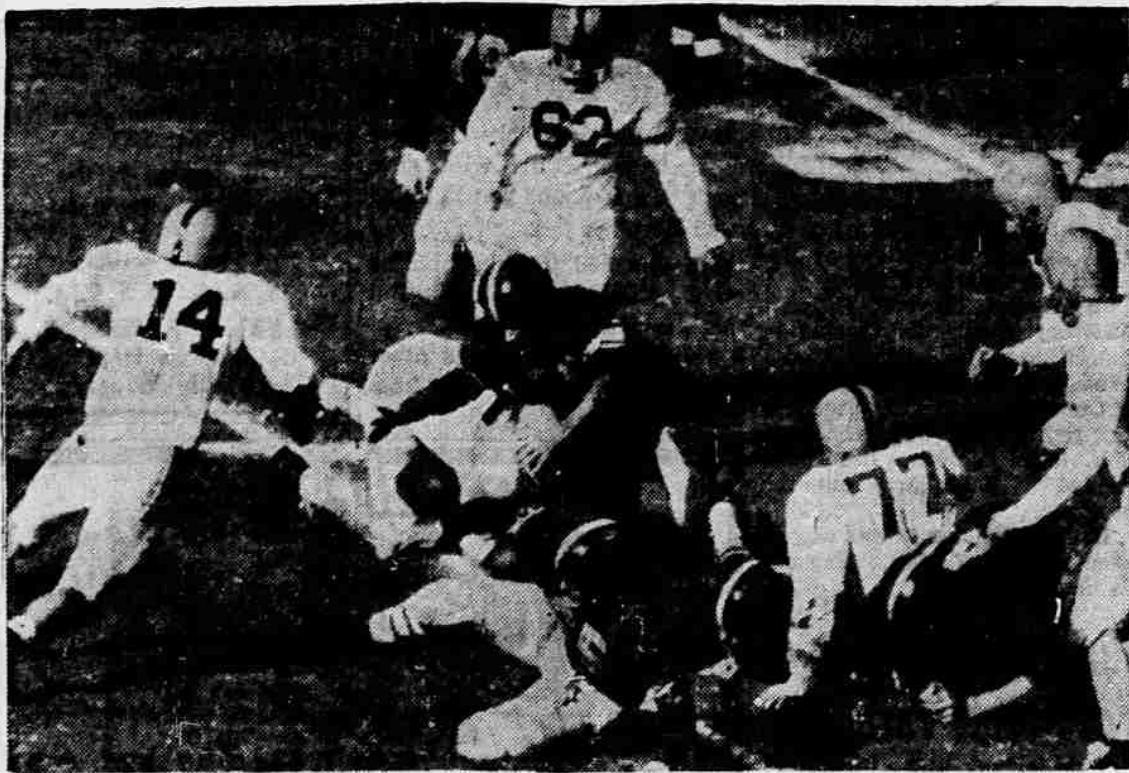

BRUINS BOLSTER
Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The star passers of UCLA's ineligible squad, Ronnie Knox and Edison Griffin, today emulated Oregon's George Shaw as the Bruin varsity bolstered its pass defense.

The Bruins also drilled on offensive passing during yesterday's practice. In punting, end Bob Heydenfeldt got off one 60-yard boot and averaged better than 48 yards on his kicks.

DEBATE RESUMED
New York — (U.P.) — The United Nations Security Council resumed consideration today of Israel's charge that Egypt's recent seizure of the Israeli freighter Bat Galim violated international agreements. The council adjourned debate on the issue several weeks ago, while the Israeli-Egyptian armistice commission tried vainly to work out a settlement.

McElhenny Top Gainer Among Pros
Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Hurricane Hugh McElhenny of the San Francisco Forty-Niners was the top ground gainer in the National Football League today but an injured shoulder probably has the brilliant halfback sidelined for the rest of the season.

McElhenny, who underwent an operation Monday for a shoulder separation, held down first place at the midway point in the season with a total of 515 yards in 64 carries, an average of eight yards for each rush.

Hurricane Hugh paced teammate Joe Perry, who gained 446 yards in 73 carries, and Paul Tank Younger of the Los Angeles Rams, who held third place with 419 yards. John Johnson of the Forty-Niners was fourth with 333 yards and Floyd Reid of Green Bay was fifth with 327. Younger jumped from fifth to third place during the week.

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Norm Van Brocklin of the Rams hitting for an average of 10.35 yards gained on every pass thrown holds down the ranking passing position, followed by Otto Graham of the Cleveland Browns, Bobby Thomson of the Philadelphia Eagles, Tom Dublinski of the Detroit Lions and Jim Finks of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Van Gains 1,501
Van Brocklin gained 1,501 yards with 73 completions and six touchdowns in 145 attempts. George Blanda of the Chicago Bears leads in total yardage with 1,538, having 102 completions in 217 throws. Odrian Burk of the Eagles leads in touchdown passes with 14, followed by Blanda's 13 and 10 each by Finks and Charley Cornerly of the New York Giants.

Billy Wilson of the Forty-Niners hiked to first place from third with 32 completions while second place was a four-way tie among Bob Boyd of the Rams, Bill Howton of Green Bay, Ray Mathews of the Steelers and Pete Pihos of the Eagles. Boyd's 718 yards gained is the top performance. Harlan Hill of the Bears leads in touchdowns with eight, while Pihos follows with six.

Bobby Walston of the Eagles, whose broken jaw confined his efforts to place-kicking last week end leads the scorers with 73 points on eight touchdowns, 20 conversions and one field goal. Doak Walker of the Lions is second with 51 points.

COUGAR'S MILLER HURT
Pullman, Wash. — (U.P.) — Bob Miller, a sophomore halfback who worked hard to become a cog in the Washington State lineup, suffered an injury yesterday and may be out for two or three weeks.

Coach Al Kircher had the Cougars concentrate on offense yesterday as they prepared for Saturday's battle with the tough Spartans of Michigan State.

3 BEAVERS CRIPPLED
Corvallis, Ore. — (U.P.) — Coach Kip Taylor may have to send his Oregon State Beavers against Minnesota Saturday without the services of three of his backfield men.

Quarterback Ray Westfall re-injured a bad leg and may be sidelined until Nov. 20. Sophomore backs Willie Kealoha and Bob Sutton have also aggravated old hurts and will probably not make the trip to the Midwest.

SHAW GETS CARE
Eugene, Ore. — (U.P.) — The University of Oregon Ducks will probably be in their best physical and mental shape of the season when they go against rugged UCLA Saturday, according to Coach Len Casanova.

Quarterback George Shaw, leading the nation in total offense, is being treated with special care in practice sessions, and Casanova says his squad is not at all awed by the prospect of meeting the No. 1 team in the country.

Gertie is listed in the Army manual as an M-41 "light" tank. Unofficially, her class is called the "Walker Bulldog"—after the late commander of the Eighth Army in Korea, Maj. Gen. Walton Walker.

Actually, she's not very light at 25-plus tons. Not small, either, with a width of about 10 feet and a length of about 25.

Pride and Joy
This particular Walker Bulldog is the pride and joy of the 96th Reconnaissance Company of the 96th Division, an Army organized reserve outfit that draws its membership from Utah, Idaho, Montana and Arizona.

Gertie is the only light tank now assigned to the 96th Recon Company. But when the members of the outfit, along with other divisional units, went on summer maneuvers at California's Hunter-Liggett military reservation, they had 12 Walkers to train with.

A ride in the M-41 is really something. You wouldn't believe what this armor-plated Cadillac—it's made by the Cadillac division of General Motors—can and will do.

Gertie's maintenance and operation comes under the immediate wing, along with 213 other vehicles, of Henry G. Price, motor transportation officer for the Army's Utah Military District.

Price, a former captain in the famed 2nd Armored Division, said they never had anything like Gertie in Europe in World War II—but he wishes they had.

Oregon at Controls
For a test spin around the sagebrush-covered rifle range at Ft. Douglas, on the foothills just east of Salt Lake City, Sgt. Bennett Twitchell of Albany, Ore., was at the controls.

Twitchell, a veteran of 12 years of Army service in two wars and a tank driver and maintenance expert for the past seven years, took it easy along the paved road from the Ft. Douglas motor pool parking lot to the practice range—a mere 30 to 35 miles an hour, which in the tank seemed faster than 500 MPH in a jet airplane.

Out of the range, he revved up the 500-horsepower air-cooled engine, put the automatic transmission control into high range and away the tank dusted.

Big sagebrush? Nothing to them, just smash them down. Ditches? Bounce over them. Trenches? Cross them, they're nothing.

Bunkers? Gertie can climb a 60-degree slope, so it's easy to crunch up one side, lurch and down the other.

Tank Twists Around
Turn around? Twitchell twisted the handlebar-type control. One rubber-treaded track went one direction, the other the reverse. And the tank twisted around in its own length as though it was on a pivot.

The long-barreled 76-millimeter cannon, with a range of several miles, is mounted on a mechanism that represents a large part of the \$250,000 cost of this most modern of U. S. tanks.

A gyroscopic control miraculously can keep the barrel pointed at a given target, regardless of the manipulations and bouncing of the tank body.

Either the gunner or the tank commander can aim the powerful gun, compute the range and other firing factors, and shoot the gun. Power controls quickly swivel the turret in either direction and elevate or depress the muzzle.

Side Arms Supplied
A .50-caliber machine gun can be fired from the same control mechanism as the big gun. In addition, the four-man crew is liberally supplied with side arms and smaller weapons, such as carbines and sub-machine guns.

Riding in Gertie is noisy, but it's not as bumpy as one might expect. And, contrary to earlier model tanks, it's comparatively dust-free, particularly when the hatches are closed and operation is controlled through periscopes.

A ride in the tank convinced this correspondent that Gertie would be ideal for use in Salt Lake City's rush-hour traffic—when he wants to get home in a hurry.

NEW FACES
Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — Coach Chuck Taylor says there will be new plays and "a lot of new faces" when his Stanford Indians line up to meet the Trojans of Southern California Saturday.

The Indians, who lost the services of third-string halfback Bill Burget with injuries yesterday, will definitely have four men on the injury list for the game, and two others may not see action.

BEARS RUN
Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — The University of California Bears concentrated on running plays and defense yesterday as they prepared for Saturday's contest with the Washington Huskies.

Coach Lynn Pappy Waldorf said the squad suffered two minor injuries, but they did not affect the 37-man squad that will make the trip to Seattle.

Dave Baum Trails In Oregon House Reelection Bid

Portland — (U.P.) — The man who reported by many legislators through the state to have the speakership of the 1955 House of Representatives pledged to him may miss the honor through failure to be reelected.

David C. Baum, of La Grande trailed his Democratic opponent by nearly 400 votes as reports of Tuesday's election came in from 26 precincts of 44 in the district, Union and Wallawa counties. The count was 4135 for Wells and 3728 for Baum.

Geary, Semon Leading
Edward A. Geary, Klamath Falls Republican, and the only other announced for the 1955 speakership, and Harry Semon, Klamath Falls Democrat, were well in front in the race for the two seats from Klamath county. The vote was: Geary, 3452; Semon, 3572; Dorothy Lowell, 2221.

Sen. Elmo E. Smith, John Day, Republican and publisher of the Blue Mountain Eagle in that city, is alone in the bid to be president of the 1955 Senate. Sen. Phil Hitchcock, the only other announced candidate, automatically was eliminated when he resigned upon leaving Klamath Falls to join the staff of Lewis and Clark college at Portland.

Balance of Parties Due in Oregon House
Portland — (U.P.) — There'll be more of a balance between the two political parties in the 1955 Oregon House of representatives. For the first time in some sessions Multnomah county apparently is sending more Democrats than Republicans to the House. A check of latest returns from Tuesday's election would indicate the Democrats elected 11 and the Republicans 5 to seats.

Should the trend of incomplete returns continue, the Democrats would have a statewide total in the House of 25, still not a majority but much closer to half of the 80 seats than the dozen or so they held in the 1953 House.

Volunteer Work For VA Described
The important contributions of voluntary workers in the veteran hospitals' rehabilitation program was described in a brief address by Frank J. Glonning at Tuesday's luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club. Glonning, chief of special services at the VA domiciliary at Camp White, illustrated his address with a showing of a voluntary service film, "Without the Town".

Entertainment of veterans at VA hospitals stresses self participation, the speaker told Rotarians, as part of the program to make men at the domiciliary center become a part of the VA community. Already holiday programs are being planned, with more than 250 Rogue river valley volunteers who take part in the voluntary services each week. Games, various phases of occupational therapy and other features of the program were outlined.

Rufus Denning, assistant manager of the Camp White domiciliary, spoke briefly and introduced Glonning.
