Official County Vote Canvass Under Way; Due in 10 or 12 Days

The official canvass of all votes cast in Jackson county at the Nov. 2 election got under way in the county clerk's office this morning. It will be complete in about 10 to 12 days, depending on the number of write-in candidates, according to deputy county clerks.

No effort will be made to first canvass ballots cast in the close United States senatorial race between Richard Neuberger and Guy Cordon, they said.

Wire From Morgan
A telegram from Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman, this morning requested that the clerk, Mrs. Bereth Hopkins, name the county Democratic chairman, or a Democrat named by him, to the official canvassing board.

Text of the telegram, which apparently was sent to every county clerk in the state, said: "Would appreciate it if you will appoint the Democratic county chairman as a Democratic canvasser for the official tally in your county pursuant to Section 250.810 ORS. If the county chairman is unable to serve will you please appoint a Democrat designated by county chairman."

Members Named
Mrs. Hopkins pointed out that the members of the board already have been named. They are Mrs. Mary Jane Sorber, Republican, and Mrs. Marilyn Dunne, Democrat. The law states that the county clerk shall appoint a member of each political party to the canvassing board.

In regard to Morgan's telegram, the county clerk said "It is the responsibility of the county clerk to make these appointments and the chairman of neither political party has any authority under the law to suggest or demand appointment of any particular member of his party. The law is specific and I will carry out my responsibility to the letter of the law."

Sewer Bond Approved By Bear Creek Voters
Residents of the South Bear Creek Sanitary district voted 71 to 2 Tuesday to authorize issuance of \$58,000 in bonds, according to Mrs. Jeannette Thatcher Marshall, the district's attorney.

The district proposes to connect with the city of Medford after its sewer installation is made. The area involved is south of Medford adjacent to Highway 99 and goes as far south as the Red Arrow and Evershady Auto courts. The El Rey subdivision divided, Charlotte Ann rd., is also included.

The polling place for the election was at Hart's Hatchery, separate from the state election. Harvey and Watkins are engineers for the project.

Casualty Figures in Korea War 142,091
Washington — (U.P.) — The Defense department, in a "tentative final" casualty report on the Korean war, said today that American troops suffered 142,091 casualties in the three-year conflict.

The department also officially closed the books on thousand of missing personnel, declaring that 4,735 missing persons now are presumed dead.

The casualty total includes 33,629 deaths, 103,284 wounded, 5,133 captured or missing but subsequently returned to military control; 24 missing, and 21 refused repatriation.

Of the 24 still listed as missing, nine are navy personnel and 15 are Air Force.

Paralyzed Girl Said 'Good Little Soldier'
Linda Bowen, 11, a "good little soldier," has been a patient at Community hospital since Oct. 20.

Linda was paralyzed from the waist down when she fell from a tree on Oct. 19. Her kitten had run up the tree when it was chased by a dog, and had not come down for two days and nights. Linda was afraid it would starve.

It was during an unsupervised rescue attempt that Linda fell from the tree.

No one witnessed the accident, and it is not certain how far she fell, but it must have been quite a distance to cause the injuries for which she is being treated.

Adenauer Bows Pressure On Issue of S Agreement

Eisenhower Sets November 17 for Bi-Partisan Parley

To Scan Developments In Foreign Affairs

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower today invited Democratic and Republican congressional leaders to meet with him Nov. 17 to review developments in foreign affairs since Congress adjourned in August.

The White House said Mr. Eisenhower's invitation to the bi-partisan conference is in line with his "established policy" of keeping leaders of both parties advised on foreign relations.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will participate in the meeting.

Asked whether the President would meet later with the Democratic leaders on questions involving other than foreign policy Press Secretary James C. Hagerly said "that is all I have to announce at this time."

Meets With Knowland
Earlier, the President met with senate GOP Leader William F. Knowland. The Californian said the President hopes to arrive at a "working arrangement" of cooperation with the new Democratic congressional majority to avoid a "stalemate" in government.

Knowland discussed mechanics of achieving such an arrangement with Mr. Eisenhower this morning.

The President also scheduled Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.), chairman of GOP Senate Policy Committee who was defeated for reelection.

Engineer Acclaims City's Flood Work
A survey of Bear creek flood control work was made yesterday by Col. Vern Jones, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, with City Supt. Robert Duff, according to Mayor D. L. Flynn.

The engineer told Duff that the city has done "an excellent job" on several bad spots, Flynn said. A small fund of about \$3,500 had been budgeted for emergency flood control work. It allowed certain work but no permanent riprap installations, the mayor added.

Jones told the officials that flood control funds are limited on the federal level, and that other areas need more work. He said that the city has directed its work, Flynn added.

Morse, Neuberger 'Consideration' Due
Portland — (U.P.) — The Oregonian today quoted Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, present Democratic minority leader in the Senate, as saying Senators Richard L. Neuberger and Wayne L. Morse will be given "great consideration" for committee assignments if the Democrats "are fortunate enough" to organize the upper chamber in January.

In a telephone conversation with the Oregonian from Houston, Johnson said it was too early "to presume" his party will have enough votes to take control when the 84th Congress convenes.

Only Giant-Sized Headache Reminds Sailor of Being Washed From Deck of Destroyer in Choppy Atlantic

Norfolk, Va. — (U.P.) — Seaman Richard Murphy, who flirted with death in the Atlantic, was scheduled to rejoin his ship at Charleston, S.C., today with only a giant size headache to remind him of his terrifying experience.

Murphy, 20, of South Boston, Mass., was washed overboard from the destroyer Lowry Tuesday 400 miles at sea off Cape May, N.J. A wave slammed him against the destroyer's depth charges racks as he went over, cutting a seven-inch gash in his head.

Picked Up by Battleship Iowa
"I thought I was never coming to the surface," he told Navy journalist George H. Jensen after the battleship Iowa spotted and picked him up.

"The first thing I thought of was which way was land and how far away was it."

Jensen, of Seattle, and Norfolk, told what happened. "Fortunately he fell almost in the path of the Iowa. We were the last ship in line and the only one that had a chance to see him. We were about two miles behind the Lowry. We were making 15 knots and covered the two miles in eight minutes. We would cover the length of the ship in 40 seconds, and with seas 20 to 30 feet high his chances of being spotted were just about 40 seconds."

Waves Frantically at Passing Ship
Murphy struggled out of his T-shirt and waved frantically. Lookouts Kenneth L. Brown and J. G. Phillips saw him and a sailor threw over a life ring and marker as the ship sped past.

A small boat from the Iowa was unable to reach Murphy in the heavy seas, but he managed to swim to the side of the battleship and climb aboard on a rope ladder.

Sen. Morse Hails Election Results As People's Victory
U.S. Sen. Wayne Morse (I-Ore.) today hailed the results of the general election as "a great victory for the people of the state."

In a statement telegraphed from Washington, D.C., to The Mail Tribune, Senator Morse said:

"The election results in Oregon are a great victory for the people of the state. Richard Neuberger's spectacular election represents the considered judgment of the people of Oregon in favor of full development of the natural resources of the Pacific Northwest, and is a rebuke to the McKay-Cordon attempts to give away the invaluable resources of the people to a favored few."

'Moral Victory'
"Neuberger scored a moral victory by the candor and quality of his campaign on the issues."

"The results in Oregon, as in many other parts of the United States, should serve notice that the political smear technique no longer registers with our people. By the election of Mrs. Edith Green to the house of representatives the people of Oregon have added a strong and intelligent voice to represent their interests in congress. Her margin of victory demonstrates that the voters of Multnomah county are against the giveaway policies of the Republican administration in the fields of natural resources."

Cites 'Economic Distress'
"They voted for affirmative action to remedy the economic distress that has reached alarming proportions in Portland, and indeed throughout the state. The people of Oregon voted for full development of the natural resources of our region, starting with a high federal dam at Hell's canyon, and for fair tax policies and aggressive action to counteract recession, and greater attention to the needs of small businessmen, family farmers and working people."

"Oregon can be proud of its new senator and congresswoman. I congratulate them and the country on their selection."

Wayne Morse, USS
Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne L. Morse, the Oregon Independent whose vote will control organization of the Senate in January, accused President Eisenhower today of supporting "isolationists" and "reactionaries" in the congressional campaigns.

Morse also accused the president of not being "factual" in a campaign speech on power policy at McNary dam in Oregon. He asserted that the Oregon victory of Democrat Richard L. Neuberger over Republican Sen. Guy Cordon was a triumph over Mr. Eisenhower's "reactionary record on natural resources."

Morse said that "whoever wrote Mr. Eisenhower's McNary dam speech ought to be told that next time he ought to write a factual speech" about the question of private vs. public power.

He said Republicans also were hurt by Mr. Eisenhower's remark at Denver that a "cold war" between Congress and the White House would follow a Democratic victory. Morse said "thousands of voters resented" the remark as an attempt to tell them how they must vote. Mr. Eisenhower said yesterday he regretted making the remark.

Three Small Forest Fires Reported Here
An 8 to 10-acre fire in the Old Baldy area near Grants Pass and smaller fires in the Wimer district and Sterling Creek section yesterday were reported by the state forest patrol.

The blaze near Grants Pass was a permitted slashing fire which "got away." It got into some timber but little damage was apparent.

A fire in the Wimer vicinity was on the R. Sinclair logging operation. It originated from a power saw and covered about one-eighth acre. The blaze in the Sterling area spread over an acre in brush and grass and was apparently smoker-caused, patrolmen stated.

Permits are still required for burning, according to the forest patrol.

Canvass of Oregon Vote Starts; May Take Three Weeks

Salem — (U.P.) — The enormous task of canvassing Oregon's general election vote begins today. The majority control of the United States Senate could possibly be altered by the results, which are not expected to be announced for about three weeks.

David O'Hara, head of the State Elections bureau, made the time estimate. He said a statewide recount, which has been widely discussed because of the close Senate race in which Richard L. Neuberger held a lead of some 2000 votes over incumbent Guy Cordon, had not been requested.

Suits Necessary
O'Hara said the recount could be obtained only by bringing suits in each county Circuit court, charging either fraud or error. The state's ballot boxes and tally sheets were being carefully guarded by sheriff's and county clerks upon the advice of Gov. Paul Patterson.

Cordon had not conceded defeat. "We're waiting for the official canvass," he said. His headquarters indicated there would be no comment on the possibility of a recount until the canvass was in.

Goes Goose Hunting
Cordon planned to spend the week and on a goose-hunting trip in the Warner lake area of eastern Oregon. He said he planned to attend the special session of the Senate next week which was called to vote on the question of censuring Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.) but that he might be a little late for the Nov. 8 opening date.

Neuberger said he did not intend to continue his contemporary Northwest writing but added that he might write on political questions of interest to the Northwest "if I feel that by writing I can advance an issue in which I believe — such as forest protection — I have no thought of a literary career while in the Senate."

Mrs. Neuberger Plans To Quit Legislature
Portland, Ore. — (U.P.) — Maurine Neuberger, the wife of newly-elected U.S. Senator Richard L. Neuberger and herself newly reelected to the Oregon House of Representatives, plans to give up her political career to work with her husband.

Maurine, a Democrat, led the field of Portland area candidates to secure her third term in the Oregon House. But she said she would happily retire from politics at the end of her two-year term to be with Dick in Washington, D. C.

Nude Body of Girl Discovered in Garage
Norwood, Mass. — (U.P.) — The nude body of a pretty 15-year-old school girl was found in a neighbor's garage today and police said she apparently was a victim of a "sex attack."

Geraldine Annesse, the youngest of five children, apparently had been strangled with a string of beads pulled tightly around her neck.

Authorities questioned a boy friend who had a date with Geraldine last night.

Bulletins
Washington — (U.P.) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles today fired John Paton Davies Jr., controversial career diplomat, for "lack of judgment, discretion, and reliability."

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Emergency Board today appropriated \$10,000 to cover the cost of an audit and liquidation of funds held by the Milk Marketing Administration, which was abolished by the voters in Tuesday's election.

Chancellor Will Request France To Renew Discussion

Revolt Threatens To Upset Agreement

Bonn, Germany — (U.P.) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer today bowed to a revolt in his own government against the Franco-German Saar agreement and told his Cabinet he will ask France to reopen negotiations on the bitterly disputed issue.

Adenauer yielded to pressure from the moderate rightist Free Democrats (FDP) who share in his coalition government.

He promised to ask French Premier Mendes-France to send his Cabinet chief, Jean-Marie Soultou, to Bonn to reopen Saar talks with German officials.

Upset Threatened
The revolt against the proposed Saar settlement threatened to snarl and possibly to upset the London-Paris agreements, laboriously worked out, for restoration of German sovereignty and "arming of Germany as a partner of the West in defense against Soviet aggression."

Mendes-France, during the Paris nine-power conference, warned that France would not ratify the German rearmament treaty unless it was accompanied by a settlement of the future of the Saar which lies between Germany and France.

Object To Terms
The FDP announced to Adenauer that it would refuse to vote for ratification unless the Saar agreement is negotiated to make it more acceptable to Germany.

Germans have particularly objected to the internationalization of the Saarland, where the people are basically German and which at various times in history has been physically a part of Germany.

Adenauer met with his Cabinet in an emergency session in an attempt to put down the strong political opposition that developed while he was conferring in Washington with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Cordon Picks Up 72 Votes in Linn County
Albany, Ore. — (U.P.) — The official count of ballots for U. S. senator in Linn county released by County Clerk R. M. Russell today gave Sen. Guy Cordon 72 more votes and reduced the figure of Richard L. Neuberger by the same number.

The count for Cordon for Linn county now is 8745. The count for Neuberger is 8645.

Russell said the error did not occur on the ballots but arose from the fact that names were reversed on the sheet from which the early returns from Halsey, Ore., were sent in, and the Cordon vote was given to Neuberger.

The change still left Neuberger nearly 2000 votes ahead on the statewide returns.

Many Portland Stores Reduce Milk Prices
Portland — (U.P.) — Milk prices at many stores were down from one to two cents a quart in the Portland area today following Tuesday's election which saw voters repeal the law under which the state controlled prices.

Many markets advertised the lower prices shortly after returns indicated milk control was out. One large chain, Safeway, advertised milk at 20 cents. It formerly was 22 cents a quart.

The reduction did not spread immediately to home delivered milk but there was speculation that distributors might reduce prices.

US Pledges To Put Atomic Know-How To World Use

United Nations, N. Y. — (U.P.) — The United States pledged itself today to give atomic materials and American know-how to put President Eisenhower's "atoms-for-peace" plan into worldwide operation.

Willing To Talk To Russia
U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., using the words of President Eisenhower, told the U. N. Political Committee that the United States also would be "more than willing" to take up with the Soviet Union development of plans for peaceful use of atomic energy.

"We are prepared to start discussion with other countries for the conclusion of bilateral agreements which will make it possible for us, under our laws, to furnish technical information, technical assistance, and necessary amounts of fissionable materials for the construction of research reactors to be located abroad," Lodge said.

Plans Outlined
Lodge outlined plans for creation by treaty of an international agency to control the Eisenhower program for peaceful uses of atomic energy but postponing introduction of a formal resolution for the agency.

The agency would be similar to the specialized agencies of the United Nations already in existence, Lodge said.
