

Marshfield, North Bend Foes Tonight

Oregon high school football action is featured tonight by two games between bitter opponents—one a traditional contest and the other marking the start of what will be an intense rivalry.

At North Bend, the powerful Pirates of Marshfield tackle the North Bend Bulldogs in their annual game. Marshfield can take the district 5-A-1 title by winning.

At Salem, South Salem, a new school this year, meets North Salem. A district title is at stake in this one too, with the unbeaten but once-tied South team after the district 5-A-1 crown.

A-2 Action Hot

Jefferson and Lincoln of Portland, Milwaukie, Beaverton, Pendleton and Medford have nailed down the other six A-1 playoff berths.

There's some red-hot action in class A-2 also. Vale and Ontario tangle with the district 7-A-2 title at stake. Junction City plays Pleasant Hill in a game the former must win to clinch the 5-A-2 bunting. St. Helens and Oswego meet with the district 1-A-2 title at stake. Coquille invades Ashland for a showdown in district 6-A-2. And Central high meets Serra of Salem in a crucial 3-A-2 game. Reedsport, Prineville and Dallas have clinched A-2 playoff spots.

Albany Must Win

Albany must win from Corvallis and then hope North Salem beats South Salem to stay in the running for the district 8-A-1 crown. Eugene must do the same from Springfield and hope that North Bend downs Marshfield.

In other games tonight, Medford will try to avenge last year's 20-14 upset at the hands of Crater high; Beaverton gets a tough test against Gresham; Prineville meets Bend; Roseburg clashes with Grants Pass, and Pendleton faces Mac-Hi as it tries to remain unbeaten and untied.

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil—(U.P.)—The United States and Brazil, both undefeated in eight games, clash tonight for the world's amateur basketball championship.

The long-awaited meeting of the two teams tied for first place in the round-robin final round of the championships is one of three games scheduled tonight as the tourney comes to a close. In the others, China plays Israel and the Philippines meets Uruguay.

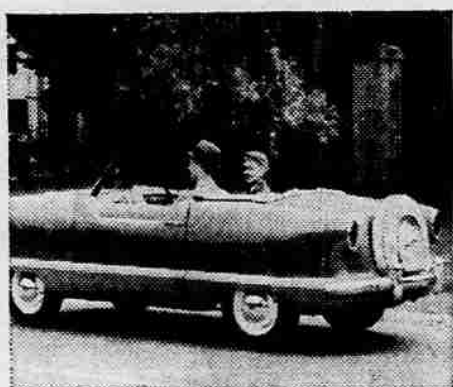
