

Black Tornado Scraps Crater High Comets This Evening In Return To Home Gridiron

Medford high varsity gridmen tonight play before a home crowd for the first time in three weeks and there are hesitant expectations that the return to home soil will bring a change in fortunes. They'll meet a decidedly underdog but highly determined foe.

The Black Tornado, victor in six straight tussles, including five on the home field, before two road losses, will be host to the Crater high Comets from Central Point. Kick-off time is set for 8 p.m.

If both clubs click offensively, there could be a wide open fracas tonight. Matched will be Crater's split T and Medford's combined single wing and T offenses.

The Comets will have the running shared by Vern Parent, Jack Lilly, Dick Walker and quick 127-pound Don Goyette. Quarterback Harvey Tom is the main passer and does some of the running. Alton Stone, Mike Hawkins, Lorin Jacobs and Ed McCullough probably will have the ball-carrying load for Medford with Stone and McCullough sharing most of the passing.

Medford's better record against tougher opposition establishes it as the favorite and desire for revenge for a 20 to 14 licking by Crater last year should provide plenty of incentive. But there's a lot of guessing in the minds of fans as to whether the Tornado can lift its sagging morale and come flying back after its defeats at the hands of Eureka, Cal., and Marshfield.

Crater, from all advance reports will be fired high for its opportunity to dump a larger school and higher rated team. And fans who anticipate a Medford walk-away may find themselves like last year—sadly mistaken.

The report from Central Point this morning was that the Comets will be "out to win" in daring disregard of their underdog role. Coach Leonard Warren said that Crater spirit was "good in the locker room" as well as on the practice field last night. He added that the Comets "may have a couple of surprises" for the Black Tornado. Crater morale reportedly is the best its been all season and the club is its physical tops in quite a while. Those factors may spell trouble for the Black Tornado.

Coach Fred Spiegelberg of the Tornado was less talkative than Warren concerning the spirit of his charges but he said, "I think they'll be ready." Medford will be hampered by injuries to a couple of regulars and will do what it can to keep its players fit for its state A-1 quarter-final here next week end with the District 5 winner. That may keep the Tornado from wielding full power.

Neither Center Mike DeVore, with a bum knee, or End Bud Kastner, with a hip bruise, are expected to start for Medford tonight. DeVore is in the better shape of the two and should see quite a bit of duty, particularly on offense. Kastner will be available if needed. Still sidelined on the Tornado club is Jim Link, tackle reserve, who hurt his knee in practice last week. He's out of the hospital and on

Leo Lewis Sets Scoring Record

New York—(U.P.)—Leo Lewis, 185-pound halfback from Lincoln University of Missouri, has set a modern scoring record for college football and is closing in on the all-time rushing record.

Latest small-college football statistics released by the NCAA disclosed today that Lewis, by scoring 12 points last Saturday against Alcorn A and M, boosted his career scoring total to 360 points.

That eclipsed the modern scoring record, for both major and small colleges, of 355 points set by Carl Taseff of John Carroll from 1947 through 1950. The generally accepted pre-modern record is 465 points set by Willie Heston of Michigan from 1901 through 1904.

Pheasant Hunting On Farm Lands Reported Best

Portland —(U.P.)—The weekly report on hunting conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

SOUTHWEST: Private farm land best for pheasants in Jackson and Josephine counties; waterfowl hunting poor in Rogue valley; Elk hunting good in Coos county and prospects fair to good in Douglas and Coos counties for coming week end.

Elk have been driven back into brush; Coos river and Millcoma areas of Coos county fair; Dean mountain area in Douglas county should improve.

NORTHWEST: Duck hunting poor north Willamette valley; few birds along the Columbia; Willamette valley waterfowl hunting slow; hunting season pheasant liberations completed.

CENTRAL: Quail hunting good in Crook and Deschutes counties; pheasant hunting poor to fair; waterfowl hunting poor.

NORTHEAST: Elk hunting fair to good in Elgin-Tillgate area and poor to fair on upper Grande Ronde; Elk are high in heavy timbered areas; hunting should improve in all areas if rain or snow falls; pheasant hunting fair to good, especially with dogs; quail hunting good in most counties; waterfowl hunting poor; Union and Baker counties because of clear weather and lack of migrants from north; Unadilla county reports lots of ducks and geese, but fair weather makes shooting poor.

SOUTHEAST: Summer lake has good goose shooting; Malheur public shooting ground poor; hunting poor in Warner valley because of "blue bird" weather; decoys not worthwhile; birds are coming in high and dropping down, staying pretty much together.

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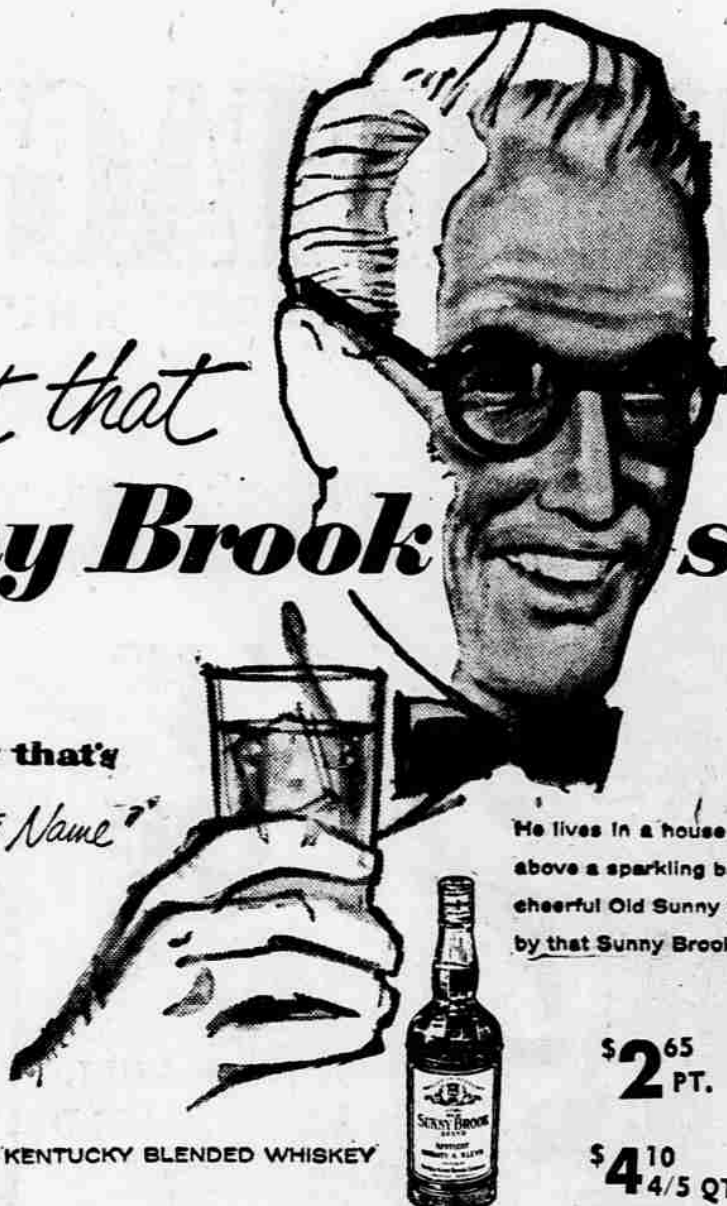
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
