

Tornado Outruns Comets 41-19; Pirates Foe Friday

Medford's Black Tornado had its rejuvenated offense to thank and its faltering defense to strengthen today as it reviewed a 41 to 19 revenge triumph over the scrapping, plucky Crater high Comets of Central Point and looked ahead to state quarter final action and a "second chance" against the potent Golden Pirates of Marshfield.

The regular season was behind for the Black Tornado after its Friday skirmish with the Comets. Medfordites looked back on a record of seven victories and two defeats. Ahead are the state A-1 titular play-offs and the Tornado, previous loser 28 to 6 to the Pirates, encounters Marshfield again here next Friday night. It will be the first round in eliminations for a crown Medford has not worn since 1944.

Offense took the limelight and the leaking, sagging defenses of both clubs definitely a back seat.

Reserve seat tickets for the Medford-Marshfield high football game here Friday go on sale at 7 a.m. Monday at the Medford high office.

In the free scoring Tornado-Comet ruckus and the Medford victory, despite the score didn't come entirely easy. Medford had to come from behind to take command. The determined Comets got the first touchdown.

After the Tornado finally put its offensive show on the road there wasn't much doubt about who'd win. But the Crater attack was a threat enough that Tornado regulars were used most of the way. The Comets scored all three touchdowns against the reg.

First quarter of the conflict ended with the count at 7-all. Medford struck twice in the second panel for a 21 to 7 half-time spread. The gap was extended to 34 to 7 in the third stanza. Crater, which had promised some surprises for the Tornado, came up with an attack utilizing spread formations to get two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to cut the margin to 34 to 19.

Medford fumbles on kick-offs led directly to two Crater TD's. The Tornado capitalized on a Comet muff and an intercepted pass for scores.

Rocky Stone ran 74 and five yards for Medford goals, threw a pass to Ed McCullough and caught one from him for others. Lorin Jacobs and Mike Hawkins each crossed the goal once. Vern Parent, Harvey Tonn and Jack Lilly tallied for Crater.

The Tornado rolled up a net of 394 yards, 118 on passes and had 13 first downs. Crater netted 240 from scrimmage with 73 from aeriels. It got 15 first downs. Medford completed nine of 16 passes and intercepted three Comet heaves. The Comets made good on five of 14 attempts through the air.

Crater made it look like the beginning of a rough evening for Medford by recovering a fumble on the opening kick-off and grinding out a touchdown. Lyle Yocum kicked off for Crater to Medford's Stone, who was stopped by Carl Koellner and Bob Gray. The ball popped from Stone's arm and Nathan Douthit fell on it for Crater. Twelve plays later Parent went the last four yards and then he packed over the conversion for a 7 to 0 Crater bulge.

Medford, however, wasted no time in pulling even, going 66 yards in nine plays after the second Comet kick-off to tally. Hawkins went over the right side of the line for the final two yards. Jacobs kicked his first of five conversions and the count was 7 apiece. Biggest gains on the drive were 13 yards on a keeper by McCullough, 21 on a blast over guard by Jacobs and 10 on a run over the left side by Stone.

Peterson Recovers The Tornado got its chance to go ahead three plays after the next kick-off. Dave Peterson of Medford grabbed Don Goyette's fumble on the Crater 36 yard

line. Jacobs gained two. McCullough passed to Gordon DeArmond for 12 yards to the Crater 22 and Stone slashed 10 yards off tackle to the 12. On the first play of the second quarter, McCullough threw to Stone, wide open in the left flat and Stone had an easy job to the end zone. Jacobs booted the bonus for a 14 to 7 advantage.

The Comets came back with a big scoring threat after a six-yard punt by Jacobs, who had angled for the sideline, gave the Central Point school the ball on its own 31. In 12 plays Crater got to the Medford 10 and lost the ball on downs.

Taking over at that spot, the Tornado moved 90 yards in eight plays to gain a 21 to 7 margin just before the half. Actually the Medfordites had to go 95 yards for a motion penalty cost them five. Big gains along the way were a 21-yard run by Jacobs, a pass, Stone to McCullough for 16, and a heave, McCullough to Stone for 24.

Pay Off Pass The pay-off was another pass, Stone to McCullough who was all by himself in the left flat. The play was good for 21 yards and McCullough craftily outmaneuvered one Crater tackler before stepping into the end zone. Jacobs added another extra.

Crater after receiving, moved from its own 34 to the Medford 28 where it lost the ball on downs. The big push only set the stage for another Medford TD. For on the first Tornado scrimmage play of the second half, Stone got a fine hole in the line, broke through the secondary cleverly and rambled 74 yards to the goal. Jacobs took

his fourth straight conversion for a 28 to 7 spread.

Just a few plays later the Tornado was handed another opportunity. Jack Gregory of Medford snared a pass by Crater's Harvey Tonn and the host school took over on the Comet 22. Jacobs cracked to the 18, Hawkins 15 yards to the three and Jacobs went over from there. The conversion boot by Jacobs was wide to the right. Medford was on top 34 to 7.

Tonn Sneaks Over The Comets took the ball on the kick-off on their own 26 in the closing portion of the third quarter and 11 plays later in the fourth quarter had its second TD of the evening. Dick Walker to Fred Hogue pass got 25 and Tonn got 13 on a keeper. Tonn sneaked the last two yards and the buck to convert was short.

A fumble on the Crater kick-off to Medford gave the Comets the ball for their last TD point. Mel Harsh fell on the ball on the Medford 24. Walker got four yards on a spread play and the Comets reached the four on a pass-lateral play, Tonn to Lilly to Walker. Then Walker made three to the 1-yard line. He was held for no gain but Tonn sneaked a bit closer and on the next play Lilly punched over.

The Tornado took over on its 40 after the kick-off and in eight plays had the last touchdown of the evening. Stone fought 21 yards to the Crater 39 but clipping set Medford back to its own 47. John Bellack's pass to Dick McLaughlin produced 13 yards to the 34 and Jacobs rammed to the 22. Four more line slashes got to the five and Stone smashed over left tackle to the goal from there. Jacobs booted his fifth extra point.

Army Crushes Yale by 48-7

Editor's note: Faye Loyd of the United Press, first woman sports writer ever to report major college football games from the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas, and the Memorial Stadium in Baltimore, Md., covered Saturday's Army-Yale game although she was barred from the press box in Yale Bowl. However she was seated just outside the press box.

New Haven, Conn. —(U.P.)—Army's crashing Cadets scored two quick touchdowns on 64-yard plays Saturday and went on to crush hitherto undefeated Yale, 48-7, before a capacity crowd of 73,600 in the Yale Bowl.

Tommy Bell, a six foot back from New York's Bronx, showed the first sellout crowd in the bowl in nearly a quarter century what was in store for them this crisp, sunny November afternoon when he raced 64 yards after taking a handoff on an end-around from quarterback Pete Vann for the first of Army's seven touchdowns.

It was the first of three touchdowns scored by the speedy 190-pounder as Army, the East's No. 1 ranking team, crashed to scores in every period with Bob Kyasky signaled his return to the Cadets' lineup by scoring two other touchdowns. Kyasky had been sidelined with a broken collar bone since Army lost its season's opener to South Carolina.

That is the only blot on the Army record for the Cadets have now won six in a row since that loss. Yale had won five games and tied one before being beaten today—the worst drubbing Yale ever has received from the Cadets.

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Gophers Humble OSC 44-6 at Minneapolis

Minneapolis —(U.P.)—Minnesota's Gophers bid for a higher national ranking and polished their offense for next week's important game with Iowa with a 44-6 triumph over Oregon State Saturday.

Bruising Bob McNamara, who gained an average of 11.5 yards in 14 carries, and quarterback Geno Cappelletti led the Gophers to their sixth win in seven games.

Cappelletti passed for three touchdowns and kicked the extra points after all six scores. Coach Murray Warmath gave his reserves a thorough testing in the second and fourth periods when Minnesota was scoreless except for a safety in the final quarter.

The regulars steamed through the Beaver defense in the first and third periods, scoring three touchdowns in each quarter.

The Gophers took command four plays after the opening

kickoff when Bob McNamara went off tackle 48 yards for the first touchdown. Three minutes later the Gophers scored again when Halfback Darrell Cochran burst through the Beaver line for 29 yards.

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
