

Guild Faces 13 Affidavits

New York — (U.P.) — Thirteen signed affidavits charging blacklisting and monopoly will confront officials of the International Boxing Guild and representatives of the various TV-fight promotions at a full-dress hearing next Friday before the New York State Athletic Commission. Commission Chairman Robert K. Christenberry said Saturday, "if there is substance to these charges, disciplinary action will be taken by the commission at the conclusion of the investigation."

The commission has the power to fine and revoke the licenses of managers, matchmakers, and promoters. It also can turn its affidavits over to the district attorney's office, which already is investigating the Guild and the various TV-fight promotions.

Eleven men have been ordered to appear Friday before the commission to answer the charges, which will be read to them. Concerning the potency of the affidavit charges, Christenberry said, "they are the first specific evidence of the evils in this sport that have been presented to our commission since I became chairman."

Oregon Overwhelmed 41-0 by Tough Bruins

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA maintained its pace as the nation's top ranking and top scoring football team Saturday by overwhelming Oregon, 41 to 0, before 46,435 fans in Memorial Coliseum.

The crowd's biggest thrill came in the second period when Wingback Jim Decker raced 91 yards from scrimmage on a reverse to give UCLA a three-touchdown halftime lead and change the game from a possible close contest to a near rout.

Oregon's great quarterback, George Shaw, was bottled up so thoroughly by UCLA that he made but 18 yards running and passing in the first half although he entered the game as the nation's total offense leader. The powerful UCLA defense held him to 29 yards for the entire game.

UCLA's smooth running backs, led by Tailback Primo Villanueva, made gains whenever they were needed as the powerful line shredded the Oregon forwards. The score set a new UCLA record as the team crossed the 300 mark in scoring. The 41

points gave them 333 for the year in eight games. In 1946, UCLA scored 327 points in 11 games, including the Rose Bowl.

Barraged from the Rose Bowl under conference rules because it went to the annual classic last New Year's day, UCLA by its win Saturday made it definite that Southern California, which beat Stanford, will represent the Pacific Coast in the upcoming Rose Bowl contest. UCLA, the first time it got the ball, marched 70 yards in eight plays to score on a 16-yard pass from Villanueva to End Rommie Loudd. Villanueva's runs of 16 and 19 yards highlighted the drive.

Bears Down UW by 27-6

Seattle — (U.P.) — California defeated Washington, 27-6 Saturday with Quarterback Paul Larson passing, End Jim Hannifan catching and 240-pound Right Tackle Harry Ghilarducci busting up nearly everything the Huskies tried to do.

The 36,500 homecoming fans, who came to watch a Pacific Coast Conference passing duel, went home disappointed, thanks to sophomore Ghilarducci. He gave Washington ball carriers no rest. His special target appeared to be Quarterback Bob Cox, Washington's pass expert, whom the giant tackle almost single-handedly held to only four completions for a net gain of 20 yards.

But those who came to see Larson unloosen, got their money's worth, although the all-American candidate spent much of the game on the bench. Larson, who went into Saturday's game leading the nation in total pass offense, passed to Hannifan for one touchdown and set up another with a long toss to the same fellow.

Larson completed 11 of 17 passes for 134 of California's 361 yards. This gives him a total of 104 completions out of 159 attempts and boosted his total offense, both on the ground and in the air, to 1,246 yards.

Bevos Keep Clay Hopper

Portland — (U.P.) — Clay Hooper will be back next season as manager of the Pacific Coast League Portland Beavers.

Joe Ziegler, new general manager of the Portland club, said Hooper had agreed to a one-year contract. Hooper has been the Portland skipper for three seasons.

"Hooper knows the league. He knows our players and he's the man to tell me what he needs," Ziegler said. "My job and responsibility is to get him some better horses. I know he's a sound baseball manager because I've seen him operate in the east."

Portland has finished fourth twice and last one under Hooper. The eighth place finish was last season.

"You can bet your bottom dollar we won't be eighth next year," Ziegler said.

Junior High Swamps GP Eleven 33-0

Medford junior high school's gridiron Bulldogs came back with a vengeance Friday afternoon.

Turning in their best game of the year, the Bulldogs growled to a 33 to 0 decision over Grants Pass to wind up a six-game slate with only one loss. The Cave-kids nicked Medford 7 to 2 at the start of the season.

It was Medford's fracas all the way. Grants Pass made only one real bid. That was late in the third quarter when an 18-yard gain and 15-yard personal foul infringement by Medford helped Grants Pass to the Bulldogs 23 where the ball was lost on downs.

The Bulldogs, charging, blocking and tackling well all afternoon, had bulges of 13 to 0 at the half and 20 to 0 after three quarters.

Johnson Goes 45

Medford's first TD came early in the second quarter when LeRoy Johnson went 45-yards down the left side of the field behind great downfield blocking. Mike Russell drove over the conversion. The next counter came after Tony Brauner ran a punt back to the Grants Pass 16. Medford was clipping on the play and got the ball on the 32. Five plays later Russell went five yards to tally. Jay Howard was nailed before he could convert.

In the third quarter, Brauner intercepted a GP pass on the Cavekid 35 and ran to the 25. Three plays later a 22-yard pass combination, Brauner to Johnson, was good for a touchdown. Brauner circled end to convert.

The score went to 20 to 0 in the fourth quarter when Gary Harrington snagged a fumbled ball on the bounce and ran 22 yards to the goal. Brauner's dropkick for a bonus was no good.

Medford went 45 yards for the last TD after Harrington and Jim Funston came up off a fumbled ball on the Grants Pass 44. Two plays got to the 34 and a GP piling-on infringement put the ball on the 19. Johnson gained to the four-yard line. Another play lost to the seven but Howard skirted end from there with fine protection and crossed into the end zone. Funston kicked the extra.

Rams Battle SF Today

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The San Francisco Forty Niners tangle with the Los Angeles Rams in an important National Professional Football League game at Kezar stadium today, but many of the fans will be there looking for blood rather than good football.

That's all because of charges and counter charges a month or so ago by Forty Niner owner Tony Morabito that the Rams had used "dirty tactics" in gaining their 24-24 tie with San Francisco. In that game, quarterback Y. A. Little suffered a broken left hand.

As a result of all the furor caused by the great game and then the dirty play charges, this tilt has been a sellout for about three weeks, with every seat in the 60,000 capacity stadium long ago in the hands of the fans.

Today, however, owner Morabito is more interested in winning the ball game than in getting even with the Rams for their alleged infringement of the rules as regards fair play.

"I've told our players to protect to the officials if there is any dirty play," said Morabito. "It is up to the officials to protect the players. That is the only instructions we have given."

Moving A's Again Topic

New York — (U.P.) — The American League goes into another round of the fight on the Philadelphia Athletics Monday and as in the past few meetings—anything can happen.

President Will Harridge definitely wants the club owners to approve the switch of the franchise to Kansas City, holding that the transfer which was made at Chicago on Oct. 12 was by a proper vote of 7-0 and that subsequent actions have been out of order.

But Clark Griffith, 84-year-old owner of the Washington Senators, declared that the Chicago vote was based only on transfer of ownership of the club to millionaire Arnold Johnson and that it did not involve a movement of the franchise from Philadelphia to Kansas City.

On that basis he insists the action there, when he was represented by his son, Calvin Griffith, was not valid. Moreover, he also declares he needs the necessary three votes to block the transfer when the owners meet here Monday.

Aussies Top U. S. Golfers

Sydney, Australia — (U.P.) — Ossie Pickworth, Australian open golf champion, scored a 1 up triumph over Tommy Bolt of Houston, Tex., Saturday to give his country a 6 to 4 victory over the United States in the Lakes International Cup tournament.

It was the first time Australia has won the cup since the series between professional stars from the two countries began in 1932. The Aussies began Saturday's final four 36-hole singles matches with a 5-3 lead and each country won one match with the other two halved.

Dave Douglas of Grossinger, N. Y., score a 3 and 1 victory over Jim McInnes but Bolt was beaten in a brilliant match and the other two Americans were held to draws. Marty Furgol of Lemont, Ill., and Kel Nagle finished all square while E. J. Dutch Harrison of Ladue, Mo., and Norm Von Nider also halved their match.

Oregon State scored two points in the first period when Austin fumbled on the Washington 15 and the ball rolled into the end zone for an automatic safety.

The Rooks went into the lead in the third quarter when Right End Bob De Grant took a pass from Quarterback Sam Wesley on the Washington 45, shook off two tacklers and went all the way for a touchdown. Fullback Ted Searle added the extra point to give Oregon State its temporary 9 to 7 lead.

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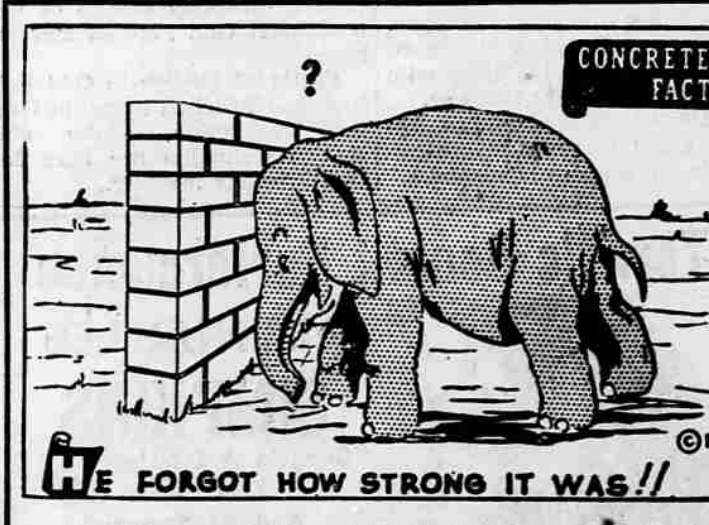
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
