Billy Strang Jr., 11, Pomona, Calif., the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Fred L. Strang, 540 Pennsylvania avenue, who was stricken with polio early in October this year, was announced as winner of an essay contest sponsored by the YMCA in connection with a Hollywood Y-day program October 16. He wrote the essay during the week after he was hospitalized at Casa Colina Home for Crippled Children at Pomona.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Strang, former Medford residents, and with his family visited here during the summer. His father is an engineer with the Consolidated-Vultee company.

In addition to an encyclopedia set his essay was read at the Hollywood bowl gathering for the Y-day festivities and it also was read over a radio program by Adolphe Menjou and another program by Art Linkletter. More than a thousand essays were entered.

Billy Strang was active in YMCA activities until he went to the hospital. He is a seventh grade student. He was a member in the Long Beach YMCA, was president of the Roosevelt Gray-Y in 1952, and he became a junior leader last year. He earned him way to summer Y camp for two years by selling soap and became a Blue Ragger last year. He was a member of the Y's swim team.

Mrs. Strang, his mother, is president of the newly-organized Y Mothers' club and she is a member of the Boys work committee. Bill's sister, Bonnie Kay, and his father are also Y members.

The Pomona YMCA also will receive a national name-brand appliance as a result of the essay.

Doctors claim that Billy will not be permanently crippled by the disease though he still must remain quiet and is receiving therapy at the children's hospital. He may soon be dismissed and then receive therapy by visiting the hospital.

Britain's Queen Mother Meets Press Corps, Tours Washington

Washington — (U.P.)—It takes a lot to impress the Washington press corps.

But Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth — a study in blue—proved herself up to the task at a reception in her honor Friday afternoon.

Mingling with some 700 newspapermen and women and at times appearing to be almost mobbed by them... the queen mother moved slowly, always smiling... seemingly unperturbed by the crowd which kept pressing closer.

Apparently greatly interested whenever a reporter was presented to her, the queen mother, would try to say more than "how do you do" on extending her hand. She would note each introduction with a smile... and would ask: "And where are you from?"

But if the reception seemed enjoyable to the queen mother, it probably was not to Chief of Protocol John F. Simmons, Charles Campbell, the head of the British Information Services in Washington, and Secret Service agents who tried to run interference by keeping the reporters at a safe distance. The queen mother even lost her ladies-in-waiting at times.

But even at that, nearly everyone got to shake the hand of the queen mother. One elderly woman went up to her and said: "Your majesty, I have a friend who is nearly 90 and she is going blind. Will you send a word to her?"

The queen mother replied: "Give her my best wishes, won't you?"

The queen mother's vitality was surprising in view of a tour she took with Mrs. Eisenhower earlier Friday to the national Gallery of Art and the Smithsonian Institution. She and the First Lady tentatively scheduled a trip to the Eisenhower farm at Gettysburg today, depending on the weather. The queen mother will move tonight from the White House to the British Embassy.

Washington, Nov. 6 — (U.P.)—Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth learned today what they sell in American drug stores, "Amazing," she said.

With Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower at her side the queen mother happily picked over such commonplace drug items as ear-muffs and baseball bats at a drug store in the basement of the Pentagon.

She also had to look at several of the 18 miles of corridors in the vast five-sided military office building where lesser visitors, with less distinguished guides, have become lost by the hundreds.

There were indications that even Mrs. Eisenhower, whose husband used to work there, might not have fared so well on her own. Peering down one of the cavernous corridors she commented: "It looks just the same as all the rest of them."

The Pentagon trip highlighted a sightseeing tour of the capital that in some respects was not unlike the one ordinary tourists here get.

There was this big difference: Few tourists, ordinary or not, get guide service from the President's wife. Mrs. Eisenhower, who originally had hoped to drive with the queen mother to the Eisenhower farmhouse at Gettysburg, Pa., instead steered the distinguished visitor around a fast-paced circuit that included, besides the Pentagon, the Library of Congress, Arlington cemetery, Fort Myer, and the Lincoln Memorial.

The long ride to the mountainous Pennsylvania area was called off when the day turned gray and ugly and after reports were received of snow and slush on the ground at Gettysburg.
