Childish Behavior Outgrowth of Habit

Some people seem quite mature in most respects and then surprise everyone, including themselves, by behaving childishly when least expected. Others never seem to act their age.

What makes them do this? Surely they must realize that by acting like children or teenagers they are hampering their chances for success and are losing the respect of others.

The explanation is habit. Such people have become so accustomed to acting immaturely that they do so without realizing it until it is too late. In the process of growing up, they should have put away childish things and learned to act like mature people. But they didn't.

Usually it is the parents who are to blame for this. Either they did not insist that their children act their ages, or they actually encouraged immaturity in the mistaken belief that youngsters should have carefree childhoods and would learn to behave like grown-ups when they were grown up.

Repetition Develops Path
Unfortunately, things do not work out that way. Acts that are repeated time after time develop paths in the nervous system which are strengthened with each use. In time, if they are repeated often enough, these acts develop into habits.

From the child's point of view, nothing could be more unfavorable than such training. As time goes on and he is no longer a child, he will have to cope with the problem of breaking off childish habits and of developing new and more mature ones to replace them. This is not easy, and as a result many people go through life behaving in the old, familiar patterns.

Meeting Emergencies: "Can you explain why some people can meet emergencies in a calm, matter-of-fact way while others

get so upset that they are more of a hindrance than a help?"

(A) The explanation may be difference in temperaments, but in most cases it is a matter of training. People who grow up in large families where there are constant crises, or who grow up in environments where life does not always run smoothly for them, learn when they are very young to meet crises. On the other hand, people who have spent their childhood days where life runs smoothly most of the time never get this training. As a result, they are not ready to cope with crises when they arise.

Community Work: "I am in my junior year in high school and have a part-time job over the week ends. My mother, who is very active in community work, thinks I should do some too. Is this wise?"

(A) It would seem to me that you have about all you can do if you want to do it well. After you finish school there will be time enough for you to something for your community. If you did not have the week-end job, you could do community work now. However, if you try to add to what you are now doing, you will overtax your strength and do nothing well.

Children's Pet: "My children were so anxious to have a pet that I bought a canary. Now they pay no attention to it."

(A) A canary is not a good pet for children because they cannot play with it. Why not get a dog, cat, or hamster? This will be more trouble for you and your wife, but more fun for the children.

Mrs. Anna M. Stread of Medford will also be there to show a familiar line of ladies clothes.

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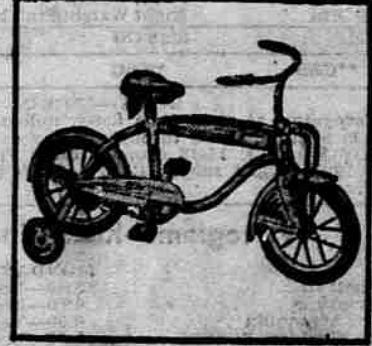
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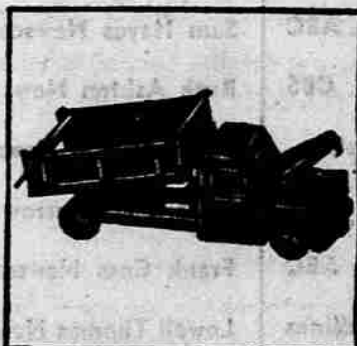
