Boy Scouts and Explorers who have received the Eagle Scout rank or the Explorer silver award during the past year will be guests of the Crater Lake Area council at its annual recognition banquet this evening at the Elks club in Ashland, according to Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, council president.

19 To Get Awards
In addition, 19 men will be presented the scout's award and three men will receive the coveted scout's key.

In order to be eligible to receive the scout's award, a person must have completed the basic training course of the Boy Scouts of America, completed an advanced training course, visited and analyzed the meeting of another scout unit, accepted and performed leadership responsibility, completed a series of training projects, have been registered and active in the scout program for a minimum of three years, and performed a good turn by serving as an instructor in training another scout.

For Service
The scout's key is awarded to scouters who have completed all of the foregoing requirements and in addition have served for at least three years as a cubmaster, scoutmaster, explorer advisor or commissioner. The scout's key recognizes unit leaders and commissioners who have availed themselves of training opportunities and have then put their increased skill and knowledge into meaningful activities for boys.

Repairs Included
Work in the old building includes extensive repairs for the home economics department, science room, commercial room and shop.

Those at the dedication will include Floyd Wyatt, school board chairman; Ben H. Todd, architect; and William Wiley, general contractor. The high school band and chorus will perform, with the ceremonies conducted in the new multi-purpose room, or small gymnasium, of the new school.

The most common causes of grain field fires at harvest time are ehaust sparks, fuel that leaked or spilled and overheated engines or bearings, according to the University of Illinois.

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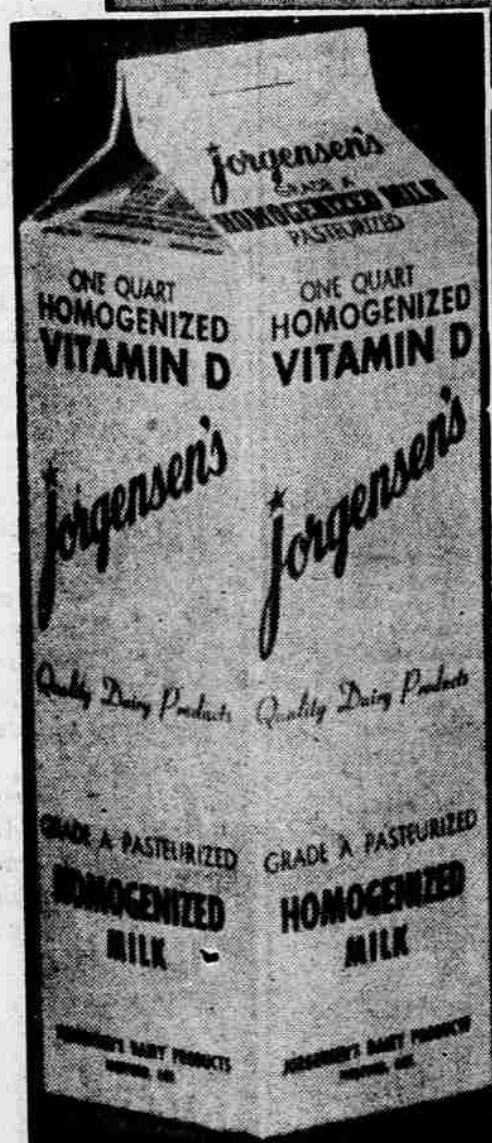
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
