Western Atomic Powers Said Near Agreement

United Nations, N. Y. —(U.P.)—The western atomic powers were in "virtual agreement" Saturday on a United Nations resolution to set President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan in motion.

Delegates from the United States, Britain, Canada, France, Australia, Belgium and South Africa worked out agreement on the wording of the resolutions at American headquarters late Friday.

Although the resolution must be submitted to the various home governments for approval, it was expected to be put before the General Assembly's main Political Committee under the sponsorship of all seven countries.

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Aiken Says Demos Will Make Little Change in Supports

Washington —(U.P.)—Chairman George D. Aiken of the Senate Agriculture Committee said Saturday he thinks the Democrats have "too much intelligence" to make a serious fight to restore rigid high farm price supports in the new Congress.

The Vermont Republican, who will turn over his chairmanship in January to Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.), told newsmen he felt the Republicans were helped more than hurt in the election by their stand for flexible price supports.

"On the whole," Aiken said, "the farm issue turned out to our advantage but it could have been used more to our advantage."

Aiken said the Republicans were somewhat guilty of "failure to sell our wares."

He said the Democrats are "professional organizers and propagandists" while most Republicans are "somewhat more amateurish at that."

Aiken said that "of course" he expects considerable talk from the Democrats about attempts to return to the former fixed 90 per cent of parity supports for basic farm commodities.

No Serious Changes
But he predicted that the new Congress, despite its Democratic leadership, would make "no serious changes" in the flexible price support program enacted last summer.

Aiken was questioned after Rep. Harold D. Cooley (D-N.C.), who will become chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, announced that he will try to get the law changed to restore the former high props.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) also has announced his support of such a move as part of the Democrat's program in the new Congress.

Aiken said he saw no signs of any farm area "trend" in the returns from Tuesday's balloting.

Haymes Plans Fight On Ruling by Board

Lake Tahoe, Nev. —(U.P.)—Crooner Dick Haymes planned Saturday to fight a ruling by the Board of Immigration Appeals in Washington upholding an order that he be deported from the United States.

When informed Friday night that the board had ruled against him, Haymes and his wife, Rita Hayworth, told the United Press "We intend to fight the deportation."

In Los Angeles, Haymes' attorney, David Marcus, said, "We anticipated this action by the Immigration Board and I already had my brief in the hands of Attorney Welborn Mayock in Washington."

Marcus said Mayock presented Haymes' case to the District Court and Judge Alexander Holtzof "ruled that Attorney General Herbert Brownell could not take Haymes into custody and that he would not be deported until the case was reviewed by the court."

"We will seek to prove," said Marcus, "that the Immigration Board's ruling may not be in accordance with the Constitution of the United States."

Armed Forces Place Orders for Planes

Burbank, Calif. —(U.P.)—The armed forces have placed with Lockheed Aircraft their largest order yet for a plane described as "the next best thing to a phone call from the enemy" in the event of an atomic attack.

The plane, Lockheed's Constellation-type early warning radar aircraft, gives air defense units three to five hours warning of a threatened attack, according to its builders, who disclosed the order Friday.

The company indicated it has orders for 60 to 70 of the planes which the Navy calls the WV-2 and the Air Force the RC-121.

It can detect incoming aircraft at any altitude, direct intercept flights and warships and detect enemy submarines. Also, it can act as a weather reconnaissance plane.

'Ham's' Radio in Car Brings Prompt Rescue

Damariscotta, Me. —(U.P.)—Carl Watson is one amateur radio operator who vows never to take his radio rig out of his automobile.

Watson was sitting in his car chatting with another "ham" when high winds felled a tree and several 2,300-watt power lines on the automobile.

The other radio enthusiast happened to be Deputy Sheriff Robert Pendleton, who immediately sent help to the scene when Watson told him what had happened.

Power was shut off in the area and Watson was extricated from his car without serious injury.

'Crime Doesn't Pay' Motto Worn on Chests

LaGrange, Ky. —(U.P.)—Warden Porter B. Lady of LaGrange State Reformatory thinks it's fine if criminals realize that "crime doesn't pay," but he wishes they wouldn't wear the motto on their chests.

Several former prisoners at LaGrange told Louisville authorities recently that they had the motto tattooed on their chests while serving time in the reformatory. Lady said tattooing is strictly against the rules.

Yoshida Okays Purge Of Coalition Leaders

Tokyo —(U.P.)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida in a telephone call from New York Friday night approved the purge from his liberal party of two leaders of a strong anti-Yoshida coalition movement.

Those to be ousted were Nobusuke Kishi, wartime minister of Commerce and Industry, and Tanzan Ishibashi, former finance minister.

The move smacked the rebel movement into the open. But it also threatened to spark the withdrawal of anti-Yoshida elements, a move which could seriously weaken the prime minister's political influence. This could confront Yoshida with a first class crisis when he returns home from the United States Nov. 17.

Oregon People Buy Champion GNLE Sheep

San Francisco —(U.P.)—Dee Bruke, of Comanche, Okla., Saturday set a new Cow Palace record for wild calf roping with a time of 11.7 in the Grand National Livestock Exposition, horse show and rodeo.

In the livestock portion of the day's activities the Columbia Sheep Breeders Association of America held a national sale highlighted by the sale of a champion ram for \$875 and a champion ewe for \$225.

The champion ram was consigned to sale by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Pfister, Node, Wyo., and was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Clarence W. Bernards, McMinnville, Ore.

The champion ewe was consigned by Terry Maddux and Doris Gill, Bakersfield, and was bought by Marcus Vetter, Monitor, Ore., for \$225.

Labor Party Approves Motion for SEATO Pact

London —(U.P.)—The Labor Party has decided to go along with a motion by Prime Minister Winston Churchill's government to give British approval to the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization, it was disclosed Saturday.

Labor Party moderates, led by former Prime Minister Clement Attlee, made the decision at a caucus Thursday night. In doing so, they overrode a move by left wing leader Aneurin Bevin to have the labor party block the treaty.

Former Paratrooper Female After Operation in Holland

New York —(U.P.)—The New York Daily News said Saturday night a World War II paratrooper and father of two children has returned to the United States a female after a series of sex-transition operations in Holland.

The woman, Tamara Edel Rees, 30, formerly was Tech. Sergeant Robert Egan Rees, the News said in a copyrighted dispatch.

She said she was transformed from man to woman last January in Amsterdam. She was asked to leave by the Netherlands government after a tragic romance with a man there led her to try suicide.

Lives in West
Tamara said her hometown was somewhere in the west.

Before undergoing the sex change operations, she said she had been married and fathered two children.

Tamara told the News she enlisted in the 82nd Airborne division in World War II, made four parachute jumps behind enemy lines and fought at Anzio. She said she had decorations from four governments and was wounded by shrapnel over Belgium, the News said.

"I'm afraid to come home because I'm afraid of Americans," the News quoted the auburn haired Tamara.

"Europeans understand these things. They understand the pressures that can make you

feel you are living apart from society. All I want now is peace and quiet. All I want is to be left alone. Will Americans let me alone?"

Tamara said she was "no Christine Jorgensen" and wanted no publicity. Christine underwent sex change operations in Denmark and has been touring theaters and nightclubs ever since.

Tamara told the News she was engaged to be married in Holland to a man who did not know of her operation.

"I told him about the operation. He said it didn't matter. But I couldn't go through with it, even though I wanted children by him. I was afraid. I respected his courage, but I was afraid for him, afraid of what he would have to go through." Tamara said she never was a homosexual but had certain feminine mannerisms and characteristics.

She showed the News a document signed by Dr. E. A. D. E. Carp of the Amsterdam clinic. "Robert Egan Rees is not of the masculine sex," it said. "I recommend that she be considered a female."

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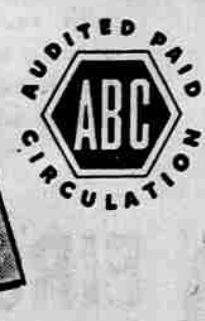
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
