

Danny Kaye Named In Battery Charge After Argument

Hollywood —(U.P.)— Comedian Danny Kaye and his business agent, Edward Dukoff, were named in a battery complaint today by a doctor who charged they roughed him up last night at International Airport.

Dr. Roland Marks, 51, a ear and throat specialist, said he was cuffed about the head and socked in the ribs following an altercation over a parking space at the airport. He filed a battery complaint against the actor and Dukoff.

Ordered To Move

An investigation officer, G. P. Hobson, said Marks told him the argument started while he was unloading his baggage from his car in a three-minute parking zone. He said Dukoff approached him and "ordered" him to move on so a car could pick up Kaye who had just arrived from New York.

Gripped In Headlock

Hobson said an argument resulted over the time-limit in the unloading zone. The doctor claimed Kaye gripped him with a headlock while Dukoff hit him.

The officer said Kaye and Dukoff told him the altercation started after the doctor became insulting when they asked him to move his car.

The battery report was to be forwarded to the city attorney's office for further action.

300 Attend Art Week Show Here

More than 300 persons attended the National Art week show sponsored Thursday and Friday at the Medford hotel by American Association of University Women, AAUW officers announced today. This is the fourth consecutive year that the annual shows have been held at the hotel.

Southern Oregon Society of Artists members cooperated in the show and about 36 adult artists entered pictures. Eleven high school students and one elementary student also entered exhibits.

Both the artists and patrons commended the AAUW workers for arranging the lower level banquet room for the show at the hotel because of its spaciousness. Previous shows at the hotel have been held either in the lobby or on the mezzanine floor.

400 Attend Dedication of New Phoenix Grade School

Phoenix — Over 400 parents and friends at the dedication of the new Phoenix primary building last week heard Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, speak regarding the objectives of the public school.

From early pioneer days to the present, according to Dr. Stevenson, the public schools successfully accomplished four things: democratization, Americanization, nationalism and "egalitarianism" or equalization. Immigrants from every land learned the principles of democracy; American customs and manners; were united as a single nation; and were equalized, no matter what their class or wealth, in the public schools.

Criticism Undeserved

Much of the criticism our schools receive today is undeserved, according to Dr. Stevenson. In modern society the school is only one means of education, which competes for attention with television, radio, newspapers, magazines and movies, he said. Also educators must contend with the confusion and disagreement which exists as to the purpose of the school, whether emphasis should be on technical and professional training, or on cultural subjects, the speaker pointed out. "We cannot expect our schools to be better or worse than society as a whole," he said and added that they merely reflect existing conditions in the outside world. Dr. Stevenson stressed that schools are what "we ourselves make them."

Other Speakers

Others taking part in the exercises were the Rev. W. V. McArthur, who gave the invocation and benediction; Superintendent E. R. James, who introduced the guests; A. H. McKintosh, chairman of the school board, who accepted the building; Mrs. Florence Drake, clerk of the school district, who led a service of dedication in which the audience took part; Robert J. Keeney, architect, and Frank Fairweather, contractor, who presented the new building.

In a talk of appreciation for the new facility, John Myers, principal of the Phoenix grade school, mentioned that the first public school in Phoenix was held in the Colver house, now Old Stage House, in 1854, just a hundred years ago. In early

Bohlen Toasts Russia's Molotov; Told of Soviet Desire for Peace

Moscow —(U.P.)—U. S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen offered a toast to Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov last night and described him as "the most experienced diplomat in this room."

"This room" was a reception hall in the great palace of the Kremlin where Soviet leaders and foreign diplomats, including Communist China's ambassador, had assembled on the occasion of the 37th anniversary of the Russian Revolution.

Bohlen also held a 40-minute conversation with Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov in their first meeting since the American diplomat came to Moscow. Bohlen recalled later he had met Malenkov during World War II. Bohlen paid tribute to Molotov after the Russian foreign secretary

had suggested that Soviet and American diplomats should strive for better relations between the two countries.

Bohlen's Toast

"Mr. Molotov has spoken of functions of both Soviet and American diplomats in improving relations and friendship," Bohlen said. "I share that view fully. I drink to Mr. Molotov, who is the most experienced diplomat in this room and I drink to his next visit to Washington with this in view."

Bohlen said later the toast was not to be construed as an invitation to Molotov to go to Washington.

The toast was one of many exchanged during the brilliant reception, one of the most lavish in years, and from which transpired these developments:

1. Malenkov told Rep. Victor Wickersham (D-Okla.) that the Soviet Union and the United States had been friends and "we want to go on being friends."

2. Malenkov and Communist Party Secretary Nikita S. Khrushchev held a long conversation with Yugoslav Ambassador Dobrovic. Vidic, who had been brought to the head of the reception table. Diplomats present considered this event the most important occurrence of the evening.

Malenkov, who was the hit of the party, strolled with Molotov through huge rooms talking to foreign guests and Soviet artists, scientists and members of the military and government services.

Chats With Red Dean

He chatted with the gaithered Dr. Hewlett Johnson, Dean of Canterbury, who had visited the Soviet Union on other occasions.

Molotov introduced Malenkov to Wickersham and the Soviet premier was most cordial in his conversation with the Oklahoman.

"You are an American Congressman," Malenkov said. "Take my message back to America—that we want to live in peace, to continue to live and work and be friends together."

Wickersham said he told Malenkov "the feeling was mutual." "You are not afraid here, are you?" Malenkov asked Wickersham.

"I told him I was not and I told him America wanted to be friends, too, and wanted peace," Wickersham said later.

Vidic, The Yugoslav envoy and Khrushchev talked freely as Malenkov leaned over the back of a chair with his chin on his hands. Chinese Ambassador Chang Wen-Tien also listened.

The Yugoslav diplomat said they talked about "relations between our two countries and about normalization of those relations."
