Two prep football district champions in a single year, Medford high in A-1 and St. Mary's in B, is something new for this community and are achievements local fans can point to with considerable pride as the grid fortunes of both schools have taken an upturn. And Medfordites can still take pride no matter what the fortunes of the two teams are in state play-offs.

GIRD FOR PLAY-OFF

It's a matter of molding tighter defense for the Medford high Black Tornado this week as it preps for the Marshfield high Pirates and a matter of recovering from the worst physical beating of the season for St. Mary's as the Crusaders get ready for Moro in state quarter-finals.

Coach Ed Hummel of the Crusaders reported that St. Mary's, with its usual iron man performance, only more so, took a considerable bruising in the Saturday 27 to 19 verdict over Chiloquin at Merrill on Saturday. The Panthers hit hard but played clean.

Back Laval Meunier with a banged up knee was the worst casualty. Only 12 players saw a great deal of action for the Crusaders and just 13 altogether. Chiloquin on the other hand kept running players in and out from a squad of 40. Victory is a tribute to St. Mary's conditioning. Short-handed and playing at high altitude the Crusaders still had enough left in the final quarter to get a clincher touchdown.

PENALTIES HURT

St. Mary's trailed statistically at the end of the first half and came back to gain yardage edge in the second. Two St. Mary's touchdowns jaunts and one other long run were called back because of penalties. A total of 98 yards were stepped off against St. Mary's and only 10 against

Marshfield's close squeak against North Bend is evidence that Medford's Black Tornado has a good chance in the state quarter-finals here next Friday despite its previous 6 to 28 setback at the hands of the Golden Pirates. North Bend outgained Marshfield 320 yards to 153 and had 15 first downs to the Pirates four.

Medford defense, not up to par in the last three games, is certain to get plenty of attention this week in the preparations for the play-off. And there's confidence that the Tornado defenders with state honors at stake will pull together and rise to the occasion as they did so often earlier in the season.

BASKETBALL CLOSE

Basketball season is "closer than you think" and as yet we have not heard of any action on the part of the Medford Independent League to organize for the coming season. Judging from past seasons, action will have to be taken soon to get the program rolling if a full slate is to be played. Several weeks and several meetings generally have been needed to get the loop in operation each year.

Light Plane Pilot Completes Crossing Of Atlantic Ocean

Paris—(U.P.)—Max Conrad, 52, Atlantic flier, song composer and father of 10 children, said today he worked out several new tunes he hopes to sell during his 22-hour solo flight in a light plane from New York to Paris.

His first stop today was at a music store where he bought sheet music paper on which to set down the tunes he made up on his harmonica while winging across the Atlantic along the route blazed by Charles A. Lindbergh.

Conrad said he has sold some of the tunes he composed in earlier solo flights.

The flier celebrated his arrival in Paris by sipping his first glass of champagne. He said he once vowed he would never drink champagne until he duplicated Lindbergh's Lone Eagle flight.

Conrad, a tall, lanky veteran pilot, climbed nonchalantly from his 300-horsepower Piper Apache at Toussus-le-Noble airfield here yesterday afternoon just 22 hours and 21 minutes after leaving New York's Idlewild airport. Telephones Wife

After downing his glass of champagne, Conrad rushed to the airport administration building and telephone his wife, Sally, in San Francisco.

Conrad said he intends to spend a few days in Paris to see the city and to attend to business matters with the Joans Aircraft Co., to whom he delivered the Piper plane.

The Pistons racked up their third win of the season, 90-83, over New York on Saturday and came back Sunday night to score a lopsided, 109-84 victory over the Rochester Royals. In each case, it was the losing team's first loss and Rochester dropped into second place in the Western division.

In other Sunday games, Boston nipped Baltimore, 101-99; Syracuse downed Milwaukee, 98-80; and New York beat Minneapolis in overtime, 103-93.

Portland—(U.P.)—A 16-year-old Portland high school student was resting at his home today after a harrowing experience on Mt. Hood.

The boy, Fred Spencer, became lost while attempting to climb the mountain Saturday. He was found by searchers asleep on the brink of treacherous Zigzag canyon Saturday night.

He was unharmed when found by two of the 18 searchers. He was so exhausted by his five-hour ordeal on the sleet-swept peak that he fell asleep while drinking a bowl of soup at the lodge here after his rescue.

Spencer had no mountain-climbing experience and was clad only in light clothing when he set out to climb the 11,000-foot peak. He was at the 9500-foot level when he was found.
