Many Flags Fly Over US Capitol

Washington — (U.P.) — If you hear that the flag on your local schoolhouse once flew over the U. S. Capitol, it probably did—for a few minutes anyway.

More flags fly from the flagpole over the west entrance of the Capitol than almost anywhere else in the country. After a short time aloft, each of these flags is hauled down, packed and shipped across the country to a school, veterans post or civic organization. During a busy season, Capitol police get a real workout running flags up and down the flagpole every few minutes.

The practice of distributing worn-out Capitol flags was initiated some years ago. But officials found that the supply of legitimate worn-out flags was never equal to the demand.

Now, a congressman, who usually fills such requests for the folks back home, purchases a flag from the House stationery shop and sends it over to the Capitol architect, David Lynn, to have it flown over the buildings. Lynn sees that this is done and returns the flag with a letter stating that it flew over the Capitol. The congressman mails it back home.

Several hundred requests for flags are filled each year. Lynn said he uses the flagpole over the west entrance because it's a newer type and easier to operate. The flags over the west and east entrances of the Capitol are two of a handful of American flags permitted to fly day and night.

Personality Aids Safe Auto Driving

Washington—(U.P.)—Your personality has a lot to do with your ability to drive a car safely, the U. S. Army has decided.

If you're the happy-go-lucky type, good at bluffing or a devotee of gambling, chances are you couldn't qualify as a driver in the Army.

Ten years ago the Army selected its drivers primarily on the basis of driving skill, measured in road tests. But recent research has changed the picture. A man's potential safety record is now determined by his personality traits.

Before a candidate or a driver's classification is put behind the wheel, the Army hands him a questionnaire to fill out. More than 85 per cent of the questions deal with personality. The Army believes this is the best way to eliminate the horn-blonkers, impulsive and quick-tempered drivers and the ones who take too long chances. Records show the new method has cut down on accident risks.

Nine Death Traps

Boston—(U.P.)—Nine "community death traps" that cause hundreds of child fatalities in the United States each year have been listed by the Institute For Safer Living. They are:

1. Water-filled holes, pits and ditches.
2. Old ice boxes.
3. Sand banks.
4. Community junk heaps.
5. Junked automobiles.
6. Unsafe outside stairways.
7. Abandoned sheds and other buildings.
8. Unguarded construction projects.
9. Unprotected chemicals and building materials.

"Controlling or getting rid of these nine leading community trouble-makers should be the objective of every parent with young children," the institute said.

Red China Charges U.S. Plane Invasion

Tokyo — (U.P.)—Peiping Radio charged today that "six waves" of American military aircraft invaded Communist China's coastal area of Chekiang Province Nov. 7 and 8 to carry out "armed provocations."

Monitored in Tokyo by United Press, the official Voice of Red China claimed that aircraft in 50 sorties carried out "encroachments" of Chinese territory.

Peiping said about three groups of U. S. planes were intercepted Nov. 7 by Red air force fighters and "fled towards the sea" from the southwest coast of the Chinese mainland.
