Kaiser May Lose Bid For Dam in Canada

Vancouver, B. C.—(U.P.)—Prospects for the Kaiser Aluminum Co. to build a \$25,000,000 dam on the lower Arrow lake in Interior British Columbia appeared bleak today after a Canadian government spokesman said the plan would be vetoed.

Federal Fisheries Minister James Sinclair said the Canadian government would introduce legislation at the next session of Parliament to prevent the dam from allowing the project to go ahead.

Dam Would Alter Habit of Stream

Wetumpka, Ala. — (U.P.)—Congress is considering a proposal from the Alabama Power Co. to build five hydroelectric dams on the Coosa River, a project that promises to change radically the face and habits of one of the more important streams in the southeast.

But luckily for tourists, the new dams won't do away with the state's Dead River, one of the most curious features of Alabama geography.

Dead River lies somewhat below the site of the proposed dams. It is a two-mile-long stream connecting the Coosa and the Tallapoosa Rivers that most often has no current at all, and then again has been known to flow both north and south at different times.

The river is located near the site of historic Fort Toulouse, a few miles above the point where the Coosa and Tallapoosa merge to form the Alabama River. Fort Toulouse was the site of one of the last great Indian battles for the southeast.
