Legal Deer Season Considered in Illinois

Champaign, Ill. — (U.P.)—State conservation officials are hinting about a legal deer season in Illinois.

A recent state publication said studies show that in at least two areas, near Rockford and on the Horseshoe Lake Refuge in southern Illinois, there are too many deer.

Deer now are reported present in at least 74 of the 102 Illinois counties, compared with only 45 in 1947.

The conservation department says a legal hunting season in "over-populated" areas may be an answer to proper herd management.

Mossadegh's Aide Executed in Iran

Tehran, Iran — (U.P.)—Hossein, Fatemi, 36, former foreign minister of Iran and right hand man of ousted Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, died before a firing squad today for treason.

An ambulance brought the youthful Fatemi, who was stabbed last March by a revenge seeking supporter of the Shah of Iran, to the shooting range. He walked unaided to the shooting post, where he was tied before the firing squad poured its bullets into him.

Thus died one of the Shah's two most powerful arch enemies. The other, Mossadegh, was convicted on the same charges but got off lightly with a three-year sentence, because of his advanced age.

Schine and 22 other military policemen arrived here aboard a Military Air Transport plane shortly after 10 o'clock Monday night. They boarded a bus at the air terminal, had a late snack at the mess hall and then checked into their barracks for the night.

The 23 have been assigned to the 71st division's MP company and will receive individual assignments in varying military police duties according to their abilities, Army officers said.

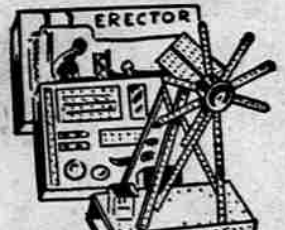
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
