Mendes-France Wins Confidence on Budget

Paris—(U.P.)—Premier Pierre Mendes-France won a parliamentary confidence vote yesterday in support of his new budget.

The favorable vote gave the hard-driving premier a "political safe-conduct" for his trip to the United States this week end.

Victory was assured the premier on the critical budget issue when the Socialists, with 105 votes in the National Assembly, agreed to support his program shortly before the balloting began.

In voting confidence in Mendes-France, the assembly overrode the adverse recommendations of its powerful finance committee which had recommended rejection of the premier's budget for the ministry of postal services, telephones

USE YOUR BELLOWS

It seems logical to assume that, since breathing is automatic, it is best left to nature. But our way of life is hardly natural.

Breathing is not entirely automatic. The function is more or less under control of the will. You can hold your breath or breathe faster or more deeply for a little while.

And most Americans have been taught in childhood or early youth to throw out the chest, protrude like a pouter pigeon, or pose like a tin soldier. This caricature has prevailed physical and military training in the United States.

With few exceptions, Americans just don't know how to breathe. This astute observation started out to be an honest one, I assure you, just as I started out to be an honest doctor; but right away after I made it I realized that—oh, well, if you wish to learn something to your advantage, no matter whether you are invalid or disgustingly healthy, send me 25¢ (clean) and stamped self-addressed envelope for Little Lesson 21 "How to Breathe."

Neuberger Gains in Official Tabulation

Salem—(U.P.)—An official tabulation of ballots in 21 out of 36 Oregon counties has given Richard L. Neuberger a wider margin of victory over Sen. Guy Cordon, according to state elections director Dave O'Hara.

The official tabulation gave Neuberger a total of 157 more votes not credited him in last week's unofficial tally. At that time he was conceded a margin of 2095 over the incumbent Republican.

Biggest change was made in Klamath county where a discovery of errors in early counts gave Neuberger 263 votes and Cordon 50 more than their original totals. In Linn county, Cordon gained 36 and Neuberger lost 35. The revisions netted Neuberger 234 new votes and Cordon 77 for a net gain of 157 for Neuberger.

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diaphragm. The diaphragm is attached to the tip of the breastbone, insides of the ribs, and the lower dorsal vertebrae. It covers liver, stomach, and spleen as a tarpaulin covers a haystack. The diaphragm is shaped like an inverted soup plate.

When the diaphragm contracts it presses or squeezes down on the liver and gallbladder—incidentally, this gently massages the biliary system if breathing is natural. At the same time contraction of the diaphragm lowers pressure in the thorax, chest, lungs, and so air is sucked into the lungs—inspiration, inhalation, inflation. But this is only part of the function of the great breathing muscle, the diaphragm. It serves also as a booster pump, without which the heart alone can scarcely maintain efficient circulation.

"If breathing is natural," I said. Natural breathing is bellows breathing, belly breathing, diaphragmatic or abdominal breathing. Watch the breathing of an animal, a primitive man, or even a civilized man when he is asleep, unconscious or under anesthesia, and you will see that natural breathing is a series of inflations of the bellows (belly).

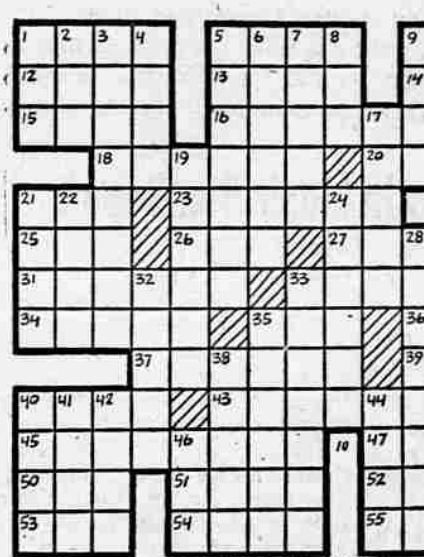
