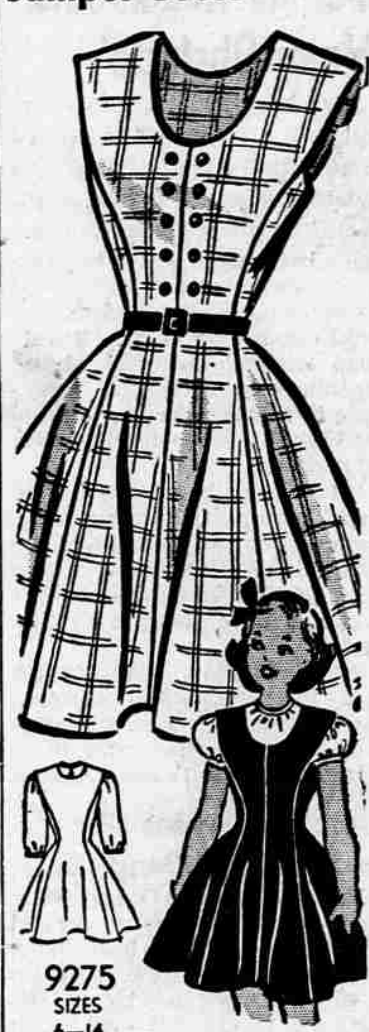

New Congress Will Be 'Taken at Word'

Bismarck, N. D. — (U.P.) — Members of Congress who campaigned for high price supports will be "taken at their word" by the National Farmers Union, James G. Patton, president of the organization, says.

Patton told a North Dakota state Farmers Union meeting yesterday that the national organization will work for price supports at 100 per cent of parity for family farmers.

"We asked for a new Congress and we got it," Patton said. "Now it's our job to convince Congress that the present farm programs are entirely inadequate if the nation's farmers are to prosper."

Burial at Sea for 'Oregon' Hull Urged

Portland — (U.P.) — The hull of the Battleship Oregon should be given an "honorable" burial at sea and not sold for scrap. The Battleship Oregon Commission said today.

Harry E. Williams, commission chairman, said that the Navy has offered to return custody of the ship if Oregon will pay the towing costs from Guam, where the hull is now. But cost of restoring the ship to its former splendor is considered too high.

Williams said he has written Gov. Paul Patterson urging him to do all he can to prevent sale of the ship for scrap. The hull should be given "a proper military burial in the Pacific, with all possible honors and publicity," Williams said.

Most of the Oregon is in Portland. The hull was towed to Guam to use as breakwater in World War II. The old battleship is famed for her dash around Cape Horn in the Spanish-American war.
