

Kiwanians Note Radio, TV Services

Medford Kiwanis club observed radio and television appreciation day at its Wednesday luncheon meeting, with talks by Jim Dunlevy, Ray Johnson, Everett Faber and John Dellenback.

Dunlevy, manager of radio station KJIC, outlined Federal Communications Commission control over a station in its role as a "good citizen," pointing out that profit motive is secondary under FCC regulations. He said that each segment of a community is entitled to its share of air time.

Johnson, manager of radio station KJED, discussed freedom of speech in relation to the broadcasting media and said that this freedom guarantees the others in the bill of rights. Faber, business manager of KBES-TV, spoke on television's "citizen" role. He said that video is not attempting to take anyone's place in the community but is trying to take "a place."

Attorney Dellenback, in responding with an appreciation of radio and television, pointed to the need to communicate facts and opinions.

SP Railroad's County Property Tax \$96,258

The Southern Pacific railroad Jackson county as its 1954 property tax payment, according to Lester A. Stiles, Portland, of the tax and right of way department of the railroad who was here to make the payment.

SP's tax bill in Josephine county this year was \$43,233.64.

The SP may receive a refund of a portion of its tax payment, as some of the property on which taxes were paid lies in the nine school districts of the county where incorrect levies were made.

Unemployment Trend Continues in State

Salem — (U.P.) — The seasonal rise in unemployment that started early in October was continuing this month but the trend was much slower than a year ago. The State Unemployment Compensation Commission said today.

Claims for compensation were slightly higher than in 1953 but new layoffs dropped 475 in the first week of November to bring the 3627 total to less than two-thirds of the same date last year. If the weather continues mild and the lumber market continues strong, the commission said, weekly figures are expected to increase only slowly during the remainder of 1954.

Milk Sanitarians Short Course Slated

Salem — (U.P.) — The annual Oregon fluid milk sanitarians short course will be held Nov. 29-30 and Dec. 1 with sessions in Salem and Corvallis.

Kenneth E. Carl of the State Department of Agriculture division of foods and dairies said the meetings will be held in the state capitol the first two days. Among matters up for discussion will be the role of the dairy industry in milk legislation, views on milk sanitation by a consumer and dairyman, and several field trips.

The sessions will move to Withycombe hall on the Oregon State College campus in Corvallis Dec. 1, where sanitation and milk quality will be the main topics up for consideration.
