Horticulturalists Slate Convention in Corvallis Dec. 2-3

Corvallis—Production and market problems of Oregon fruit growers will be discussed Dec. 2 and 3 at the 69th annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural society of Oregon State college.

President David Lowry, Medford, said general morning assemblies and afternoon sectional meetings are geared to practical problems suggested by growers and fieldmen during the past year.

Speakers will include M. J. Dorsey, Urbana, Ill., president of the National Peach council; Thomas L. Martin, Brigham Young university soils scientist, Provo, Utah; C. P. Harley, USDA physiologist, Beltsville, Md., and L. P. Batjer, USDA physiologist, Wenatchee, Wash.

Four afternoon sectional meetings each day are slated for growers of apples and pears, small fruits, stone fruits and vegetables. Discussion topics include dwarf fruit trees from the commercial grower's standpoint, new control for fireblight in pears, chemical weed control in vegetable fields and orchards, mechanical harvesting of pole beans, frost damage of stone fruits, and hormone sprays to increase berry yields.

C. O. Rawlings, OSHS secretary and extension horticulturist at OSC, said attendance is expected to top 1000. The college has scheduled sessions in its new food technology building, Withcombe hall, and home economics auditorium, to avoid last year's congestion when the 69-year-old society set a record attendance of 1,200.

Fires in State Forests Burn Over 2,253 Acres

Salem—(U.P.)—A total of 582 fires burned over 2,253 acres on the 15,000,000 acres coming under supervision of the State Forestry Department, it said in a report covering the period April 1 through Oct. 31.

Jim Walker, head of the forest protection division, said it was the second lowest fire loss on record. Lowest was recorded in 1913. He credited efficient forest personnel and weather for the good record.

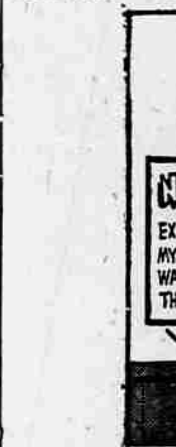

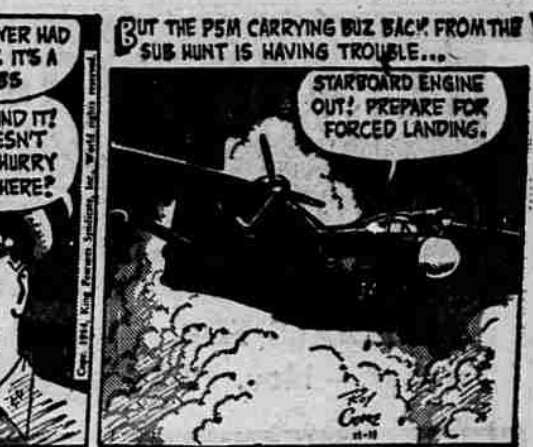

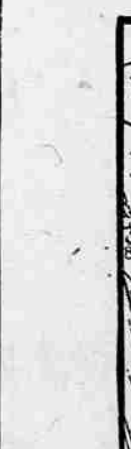
