

Veterans Day Noted With Camp White Program Yesterday

Camp White—This is a day to look to the future as well as the past, Frank Van Dyke told a Veterans Day audience at the VA domiciliary center Thursday.

"The perils that lie ahead are not too great when the achievements of the past in the history of this country are considered. This country is what it is today because of its veterans. Have faith and confidence and don't ever give up," he told the handicapped and disabled members.

Gives Reassurance

Van Dyke gave reassurance of a continuance of the program of rehabilitation and aid in regaining strength and purpose in life, and promised additional help in furthering efforts now under way in doing creative work.

Manager Eugene K. Ricker presided. In his opening remarks he commented on the number of years of military service represented in the audience.

Representatives of organizations were introduced, including auxiliary representatives Lelia Birch and Frieda Lawrence, of the VFW; Marian Cech, of the Gold Star Mothers; Mable Nichols, of the USWV; Mrs. Mary Day, of the American Red Cross, and Harry Birch, commander of District 7, VFW.

Program Given

Mrs. Stanley Lacey, Medford, sang "Roses of Picardy" and "When Johnny Comes Marching Home," accompanied by Mrs. H. Chandler Drew. The Camp White orchestra provided incidental music at the exercises, which were concluded with a minute of silence and taps played by Guy Vinson, of the orchestra.

Chaplains Eskay and Anderson offered the invocation and benediction and the member color guard, composed of Homer Vaught, Joseph Aldrich, F. W. Ferris, Thomas J. Griffin, and John W. Hall, officiated at posting and retiring of the colors.

A special Elks entertainment was brought to Camp White in the afternoon by George Harrington and Cliff Howard, with the presentation of Arthur B. Simpkins, whose singing talent was discovered when he was a Pullman porter. Simpkins sang a number of familiar songs accompanied by Felix De Cola.

The Oregon State Federation of Labor, James T. Marr executive secretary, spent funds in behalf of several candidates, including these reported today, all Democrats:

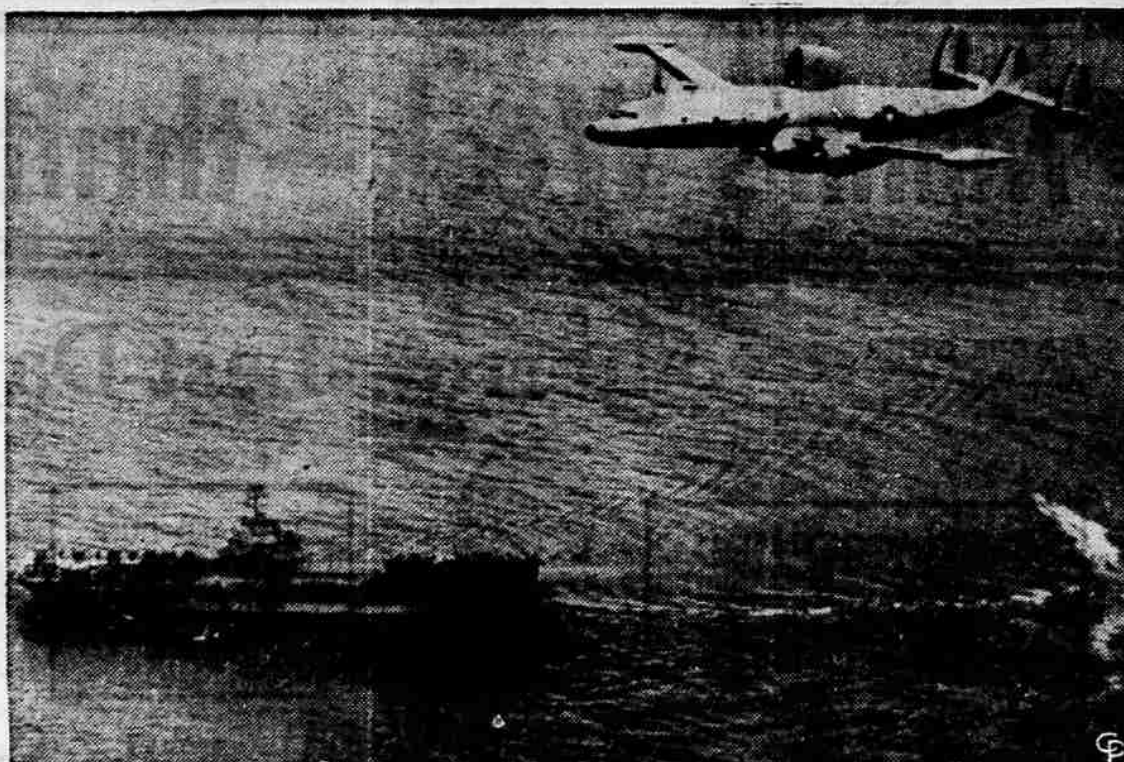
Sweetland Aided

Dressmaker Leaves Estate To Man She Knew Only 4 Hours

Oshkosh, Wis. —(U.P.)—An Oshkosh dressmaker who felt her relatives neglected her has left an estate of nearly \$100,000 to a man she knew for only four hours.

A settlement reached yesterday gave Joseph Kogut, Cuyler, N.Y., the bulk of Margaret Jorgenson's estate — \$97,864.

Kogut and Miss Jorgenson met in a Chicago hotel elevator four years ago. They started talking, had lunch together, and parted. Miss Jorgenson, once a prominent dressmaker here, died July 11, 1951, at the age of 66 without ever seeing Kogut again. But they had corresponded and her will made Kogut the sole beneficiary.

Relatives Contest Will
The dressmaker's relatives contested the will, charging Kogut exercised undue influence. The settlement reached here allocated \$61,000 of the estate to awards and claims, but still gave Kogut the lion's share.

Attorney Walter J. Patri, the estate's executor, estimated Kogut would net \$40,000 after taxes.

Patri told this story of Kogut's meeting with Miss Jorgenson: Kogut, an inspector for the New York Central Railroad, was in Chicago on business when he stepped into an elevator at the Morrison hotel in November, 1950.

Comment on Election
It was the day after election and a woman in the elevator was carrying a newspaper headlining the victory of Sen. Everett Dirksen (R-Ill.).

Kogut commented "The Democrats aren't so happy about this." The woman, Miss Jorgenson, replied and they fell into conversation. After sharing lunch, Kogut left for New York.

A short time later, Miss Jorgenson had Patri draw up a new will making Kogut, a bachelor in his middle 40s, sole beneficiary. She felt her relatives had neglected her, Patri said.

Youngster Dies After Whipping Given by Mother

Phoenix —(U.P.)—A three-year-old boy died early today several hours after his mother said she gave him a whipping because he awakened her two other children from their naps by throwing things, the sheriff's office reported.

The child was identified as Gregory Treguboff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louie Treguboff, of Tolleson, Ariz., about eight miles west of here.

Mother in Severe Shock

The mother, 27, who is expecting another child, was reported in a state of severe shock at her home this morning. Medical examiner Dr. Daniel J. Condon was to conduct an autopsy today to determine exact cause of the child's death.

Sheriff's investigators said they were told Gregory and his two sisters, one and four years of age, were taking naps yesterday afternoon when the boy awoke before the other two. The mother told them he began to throw things and make noise, awakening the girls.

Struck With Belt

Mrs. Treguboff said she then struck him with a buckle-less belt, officers said they were told. The father said that he returned home at 6:30 p.m. and that he noticed during supper the boy did not appear to be eating. Officers said they were told that

Tires Checked For Girl's Killer

Baltimore, Md. —(U.P.)—Police ran tests today on a tire imprint found near the murdered body of 14-year-old Carolyn Wasilewski to determine if her slaying was connected with the apparent suicide of a 45-year-old truck driver.

Carolyn, described as a boy crazy jazz loving girl, was found lying partly clothed on a railroad track Tuesday. The name "Paul" had been scrawled in red letters on her thigh.

Thursday the body of Ralph Garrett, a truck driver, was found hanging from a belt on the

side of a railroad freight car. He had been missing from his home since Monday, the day Carolyn last was seen alive.

Police said Garrett lived a short distance from the slain girl. His body was hanging on a freight car in the Baltimore and Ohio railroad's west end yards, near where Carolyn's body was found.
