

Top Gridiron Clubs Battle In Play-Offs

The top high school football teams in Oregon open playoffs this weekend for four state titles.

All class A-1 and class A-2 games are tonight. Class B 11-man play has four games starting this afternoon and ending tomorrow while both six-man games are tomorrow.

The lineup in class A-1 sends Jefferson of Portland to South Salem and Milwaukie to Beaverton with the two winners playing for a final berth next week.

Marshfield is at Medford and Pendleton is at Lincoln of Portland with the two winners meeting next week for the other final spot.

Marshfield and South Salem are the favorites. Central Catholic, the defending champ, is out of the running.

St. Mary's at Moro
In class A-2, St. Helen's is at Reedsport; Central is at Dallas; Junction City plays Coquille at North Bend and Defending Champion Prineville hosts unbeaten Vale. Winners of the first

two games and winners of the last two games play in next week's semis.

Class B 11-man action has Knappa playing Siletz at Toledo tonight; Monroe at Oakland this afternoon; St. Mary's of Medford at Moro this afternoon, and Union hosting Echo tomorrow afternoon. Union clinched a playoff spot yesterday when Walla dropped a 19-7 decision to Enterprise.

Harrisburg travels to Glendale and Eagle Valley meets Culver at Richland tomorrow afternoon in the six-man semi-finals.

Razorbacks Favored in Southwest

Arkansas' surprising Razorbacks are favored to win the Southwest Conference's bid to the Cotton Bowl Saturday while Ohio State, Oklahoma and Yale are expected to clinch ties for the Big Ten, Big Seven and Ivy League titles.

Arkansas, which was supposed to be a "patsy" when the season started, has been installed as a six-point favorite over SMU at Fayetteville, Ark. A victory would enable the Razorbacks to clinch the Southwest Conference title and the automatic Cotton Bowl bid that goes with it.

Ohio State meanwhile, is a seven-point choice to defeat Purdue at Lafayette, Ind., and thereby clinch at least a tie for the Big Ten crown. The Buckeyes then would be able to win the Conference invitation to oppose Southern California in the Rose Bowl by beating Michigan on Nov. 20.

Oklahoma, ranked third in the nation behind UCLA and Ohio State, is favored by 20 points to beat Missouri at Norman, Okla., while Yale is a 13-point choice over Princeton. The edge of possible bowl competition is missing from these games, however, because Oklahoma is ineligible even if it wins the Big Seven title and Yale does not play postseason games.

Irish Choice
Fifth-ranked Notre Dame is a top-sided 26-point pick over North Carolina at South Bend, Ind.; sixth ranked Army is 20 points over winless Pennsylvania although the Cadets won't have ailing Coach Earl Blaik to guide them; eighth-ranked Mississippi is 14 1/2 points over Houston; ninth-ranked Iowa is seven over Minnesota and 10th ranked Navy is an "out choice" over Columbia.

In the NCAA's televised game of the week, Georgia Tech is rated a seven-point favorite over Alabama at Atlanta, Ga., while in intersectional games College of Pacific is seven points over Marquette and Nebraska six over Pittsburgh.

Oregon is 13 over Washington State and Southern California 20 over Washington.

Evidence Slated Today In Monopoly Hearing

New York — (U.P.) — The first bullets of "specific evidence" were scheduled to be fired today at the powerful International Boxing Guild during a monopoly hearing before the New York State Athletic Commission.

Those bullets are 13 affidavits filed with the commission by members of the rival Metropolitan Boxing Alliance.

The affidavits, the first ever obtained against the guild, charge it and its New York chapter with black-listing discrimination and monopolistic practices in preventing fight managers who are not guild members from getting bouts for their boxers.
